Cochrain, a man about 40 years age, lived with his wife and five FOARD COUNTY'S COTTON ildren on a farm owned by him out twelve miles north of this town. was well known in the community at he was under an indictment for urder in the state of New Mexico and released on bond of \$20,000 to appear for trial at an early term of ourt. He frequently spoke of this to his neighbors and expressed uneasiness as to the outcome.

During the night of March 9, 1919, Dr. Jordan, a local physician, reseived a telephone call from Mrs. Cochrain, who stated that she thought er husband was dving. "I went immediately to the farm," says the doctor in recounting the incident, "and found Cochrain in bed. His side was painted with jodine and he told me he felt like he was smothering to death. He had complained to me a few days earlier of a pain around his heart. I did not give him any medicine at that time, but returned to town and wrote out a prescription which I left at the drug store with instructions to have it sent out the next morning. I inquired the next morning if it had been sent and the druggist told me that it had not as news had come in that Cochrain was already dead."

Sympathetic neighbors, the current version goes, went to the Cochrain farm and volunteered assistance but their offers were refused by members tenant and disappeared. of the family, who proceeded to Aspermont, bought from a local dealer a coffin box and casket, and returned furnished bail for Cochrain in the Rev. SCHOOL AMENDMENT Austin, Teras, Oct. 1920 .- Hon. B. orchestra would be an easy thing F. Looney for six years Attorney General of Texas, has made the following statement concerning the proposed educational amendment to be voted upon November 2nd, 1920

"I am heartily in favor of the adoption of this Amendment. In my opinion it would be a tragedy sad and criminal for the Amendment to fail. Our rural school system has all but collapsed; it must be recusitated; the remedy is simple-more money in our school enterprise. The profession of teaching must be established on an enduring financial basis, or else we will never have the schools we must have in order to do justice to the children of Texas whom God has committed to us as guardians.

"Our Democratic form of government, in which each individual exercises a part of the sovereign power, will falter and ultimately fail unless the individual units, or a controlling majority, are enlightened so as to be equipped mentally and morally to properly exercise this power of gov-
