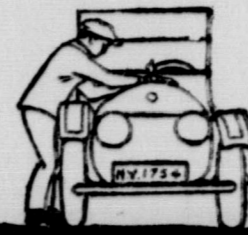

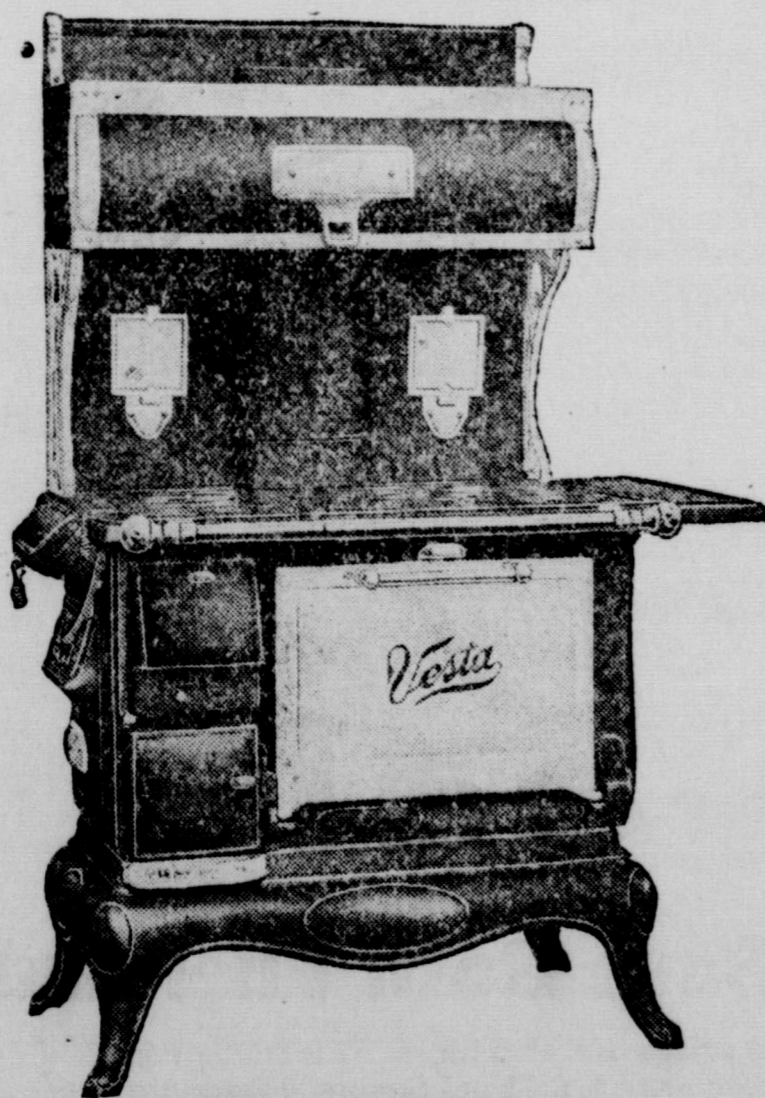

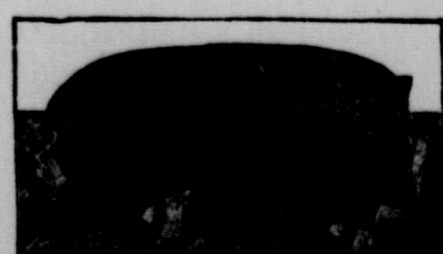

From all reports one is justified in believing that the teaching profession has suffered more than any other one in the United States for the last year or two. Inefficient teachers have had to be substituted for competent ones in many places on account of poor salaries. This has created an injury which must be borne by the children of school age and consequently the whole country is to suffer by reason of a forced lowering of the standard of education. In view of this it is incumbent upon every voter in Texas to take the first step towards remedying the situation in this state by voting for the amendment.

A statement issued by The Texas Public Health association says that \$20,000,000 a year is wasted on victims of tuberculosis on "fake cures." These "cures" number no fewer than a thousand and have all been tried out and proven not only not effective as cures, but harmful in that they engendered false hopes and consequently deprived the victims of an opportunity to get well because of delay in taking the only remedy that will cure at all—fresh air, proper diet and rest.

Mexico will make a hit with Texans at the Dallas Fair. Mexico has an exhibit there. In many respects that is a great country and they need the United States and we need them. If Mexico had a stable form of government and a properly educated citizenship she would soon develop into one of the richest countries in the world. She is rich with undeveloped oil fields, rich in agricultural possibilities and mineral resources and is not staggering under the burden of a mighty war debt.

Cotton reports from different portions of West Texas tell different stories. In Jones County the yield is the best in years and the staple was never better. It is estimated that Jones County will have about 50,000 bales. In Cottle County much of the cotton is all stalk and no lint and many fields are being plowed up for wheat. There are spots like that in Foard County.

According to the theft bureau figures more than \$2,000,000 in automobiles have been stolen in Texas since Jan. 1. The number is more than 1200 and while more than 800 have been recovered, the loss to the owners in recovering cars and the damage sustained to the machines has been considerable.

The coal situation at Vernon is reported to have received no change for several weeks. That town is short more than 100 cars of fuel necessary for the coming winter. Appeals have been made to the Interstate Commerce Commission and to the Texas Chamber of Commerce, but no coal has yet been routed over the Fort Worth & Denver.

Excavation work has commenced for the foundation of the new hospital at Vernon. The building will cost between \$44,000 and \$45,000. It is planned to finish the building by January 1.

DECLARES FARMERS FACE GRAVE CRISIS

New Orleans, La., Oct. 18.—Anarchy is threatened among Southern cotton growers unless Southern financiers and business men rally immediately to their support. W. B. Thompson, prominent cotton man, declared today.

Thompson sounded the warning in explaining his reasons for appealing to J. Skotowe Wannamaker, president of the American Cotton Association, to call bankers, business men and citizens together to aid the farmers to hold their cotton for a stable market.

"The action of the Federal Reserve Board in refusing to loan the cotton farmers of the South money with which to finance their business has created a grave crisis," said Thompson. "It is one which few people realize. While I am not in favor of 'night riding' or the depredations of this set of men, it shows the gravity of the situation."

"The farmer has always been the 'bulwark' of the American Republic. He is fast being driven to desperation and these men who depend on the soil for their livelihood and who have never been affected by Bolshevism or other isms are fast being driven to anarchy."

"It is high time that people act. Something must be done to aid the farmers. The Federal Reserve Board and the Secretary of the Treasury are fighting them and through their propaganda have practically ruined the business of the farmer. The continual cry from Washington that the price of cotton is going down has driven the buyers from the market. The condition in the trade is desperate."

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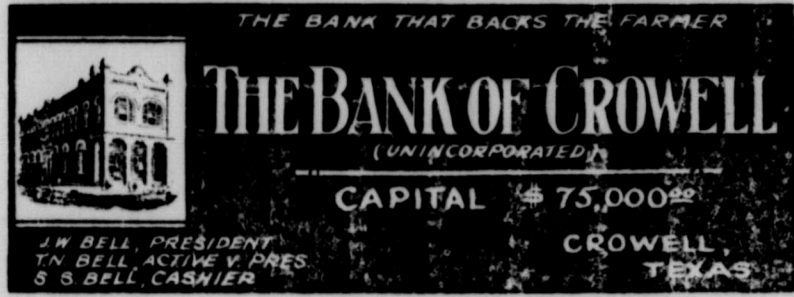

### YOUR VOTE FOR THE SCHOOL AMENDMENT MEANS A VOTE FOR EDUCATION

1. On the fate of this Amendment depends not only the honor of Texas, but her future material, intellectual, and spiritual welfare. For the Amendment not to carry would mean that a majority of the people of the State are opposed to public education. It would mean that they are either in favor of closing the schools entirely or of having them taught by incompetent, untrained and inexperienced teachers. For the Amendment to fail to carry would be a veritable calamity that it would take the State years to get over and, for this reason, every man and woman in the State who cares at all for his honor or welfare will do all in his or her power to get others to understand the Amendment and to vote for it on November 2.

2. The Amendment does not raise taxes, but merely gives the people the right to vote what they want for the support of their schools. It is a local option measure and gives the people the power to support their schools or not support them as they may choose. This privilege is now enjoyed by only fifty of the larger cities of the State and is denied the common independent school districts. When you vote for the Amendment, you vote to make the will of the people supreme and not to handicap such will by outside authority.

3. Some people may object to the Amendment because it does not place a limit on school taxation. In answer to such objection, it may be asked that, if the people themselves are not to determine how much they may vote for their schools, who is to determine for them? The people are, or are supposed to be, supreme and they certainly are not in favor of letting others dictate to them as to how much they shall expend for their public schools, when every right and liberty they possess depends upon public education. They who control the schools control the liberties of the people, and the man or woman who vote against this Amendment because it does not limit him in the amount he may expend for education is, at the same time, voting for voluntary servitude.

The wealthy property holder who is able to educate his children in private schools and is unwilling to help educate the children of his neighbor may, in a way, consistently vote against this Amendment, but the common man who votes against it is voting against himself. However, if the wealthy property owner has vision enough, he will see that the value of his property depends upon public ed-

ucation, and there is not a far-sighted man of wealth in the country who would not give nine-tenths of all his possessions to avoid the conditions of such countries as Mexico, Persia, Turkey, Russia and China, where they have no public schools.

4. If the Amendment carries, the Legislature will, at the next session, enact a law making it effective. Then it is up to the people of each district to say whether they will raise the school tax rate in their own particular district or not. As conditions now are, the only way to get more money for the schools is by increasing property valuations and, as a result, such valuations have been increased, in many cases, beyond what property is actually worth and wholly out of proportion to the valuations of the State and County. If we raise the rate, we can lower valuations to where they will not be out of proportion to what they are in the State and County. However, the ratification of the Amendment in itself will in no way affect the present school tax rate in any district. That rate will remain what it is until the people of the district change it by a majority vote.

5. If the Amendment should fail to be ratified by the people, the schools of Texas would be completely demoralized. The four million dollar appropriation made by the Legislature last spring was a temporary expedient to tide us over until the ratification this fall, the people thus expressing themselves as opposed to more money for the schools, the Legislature certainly would not go contrary to the will of the people and make another appropriation. The schools would thus be without funds, the best teachers would continue to leave the State and soon only the poorest teachers would remain. Even last year (1919-20) 50,000 children in the State did not attend school because no teacher of any kind could be found for them, and more than 400,000 children of the State were taught by incompetent, untrained and inexperienced teachers. Such a situation is a disgrace to the State and the people who love education will do all in their power to wipe out such disgrace by working and voting for this Amendment.

6. Texas now stands 39th among the states of the Union in the amount she spends for public education. Only one other state has as low a tax rate—Virginia. Nearly every state is increasing its expenditures for education and, if Texas does not do so, she will soon stand 48th among the states instead of 39th. It would certainly be a disgrace for that State that stands first in size, first in agricultural products, third in oil, and seventh in wealth, to stand last in education.

Coal production is reported to have reached the required amount, being now 12,000,000 tons weekly, and the supply should now depend entirely upon transportation.

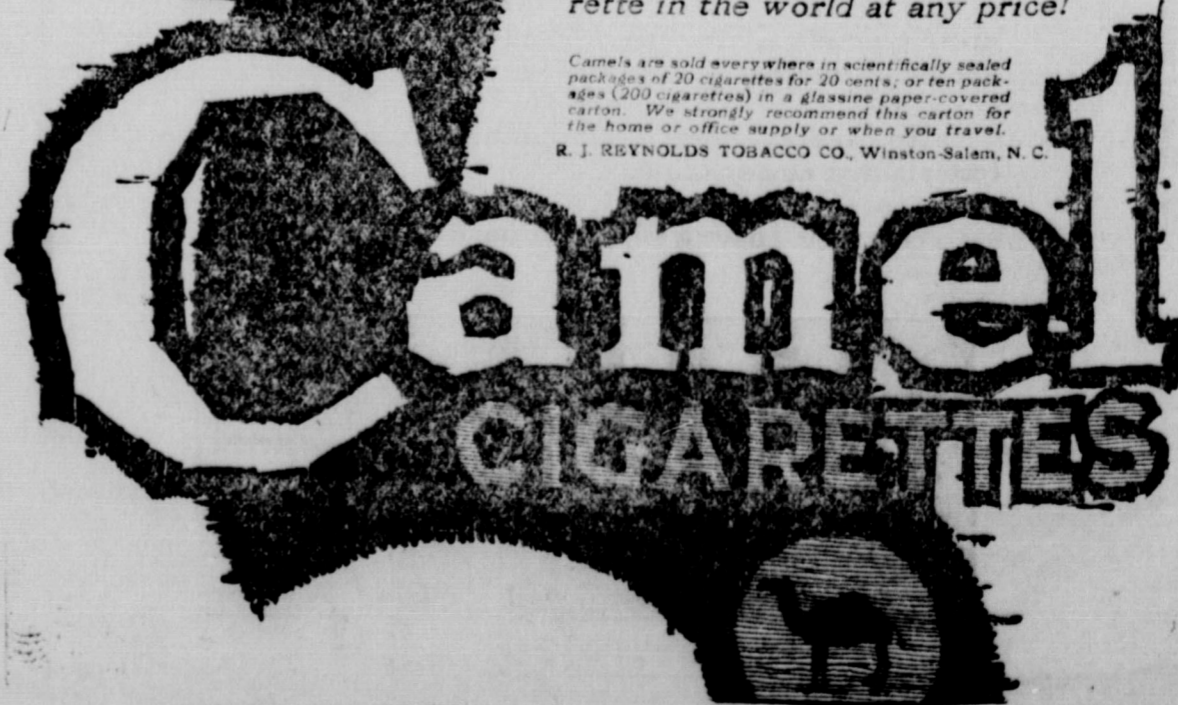

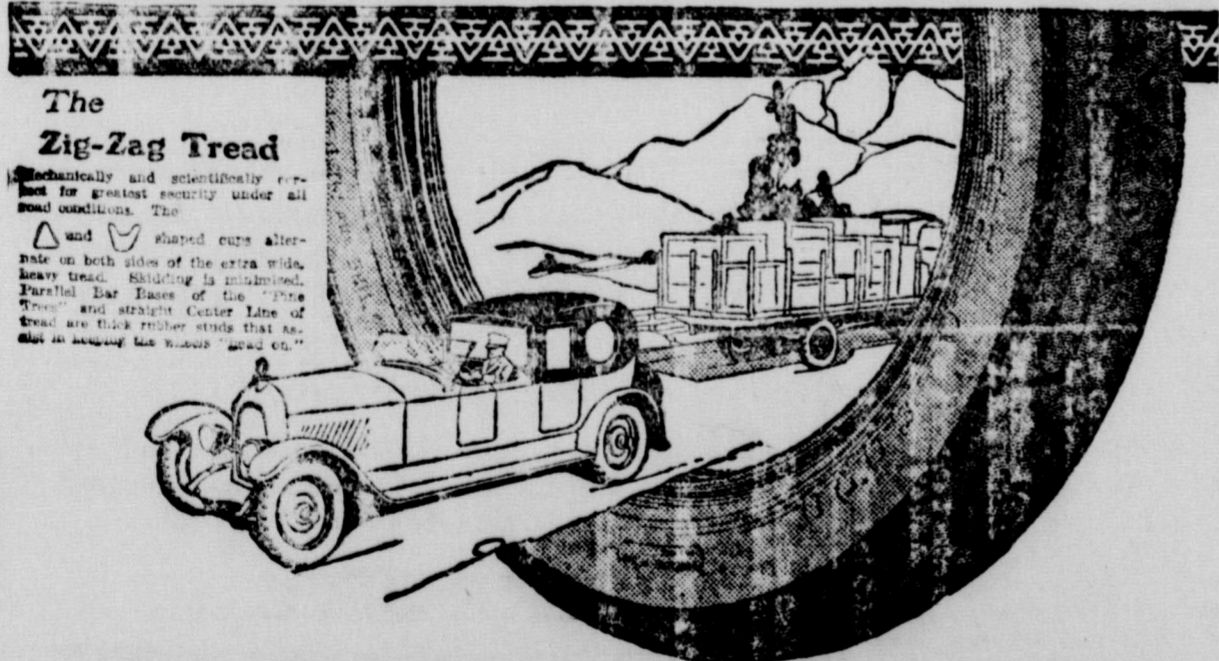

They ask Terry. And Terry always knows.
