## Local Post Office Gets ZIP Code

Bairds five-digit ZIP Code is 79504, Postmaster Roy Gilbreath announced today.

"Everyone in Baird will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," Postmaster Gilbreath said.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Gilbreath stressed the importance of all citizens of Baird learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Gilbreath said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code: Roy Gilbreath, Postmaster, U. S. Post Office, Baird, Texas, 79504

The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. Gilbreath said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. Gilbreath said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Mr. Gilbreath said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

## Premier Oil Co. Stock Bought By McWood Company of Abilene

McWood Corp., an Abilene based firm has signed a contract to acquire all of the outstanding stock of Premier Oil Refining Co. of Texas, Ray McGlothlin, McWood president, announced Monday.

Premier is presently a wholly owned subsidiary of Western Natural Gas Co. of Houston.

The sale must be approved by shareholders of Western Natural Gas Co. before becoming effective.

McWood Corp. will commence operation of the Premier properties under a lease arrangement effective July 1.

Properties and facilities included in the transaction are two crude oil gathering systems aggregating approximately 900 miles of pipeline located in West Central Texas and East Texas; four crude oil refineries located at Baird, Fort Worth, Longview and Brownsville; and approximately 60 owned or leased service stations.

The refinery at Baird is presently closed. A McWood official in Abilene said there was "no comment" as to whether the Baird refinery would be reopened.

## Commissioners Add To County Revenue

An additional tax revenue for Callahan County of between \$3,800 and \$4,000 per year is the result of many days of work by county commissioners, who completed sitting as a board of equalization Friday.

Prior to beginning the equalization proceedings, the commissioners studied the tax rolls of the county for several weeks. During the study, a decision to set a minimum valuation of \$6 per acre on raw land within the county. The increase as set by the equalization board amounted to some \$475,000 in taxable renditions.

Judge Byron Richardson joined the commissioners in pointing out that the revenue increase would be insufficient to take care of added costs of county government and compensate for loss of valuations in oil and utility properties. They shall continue studying the problem, they reported.

## Californian Is Accident Victim

A 56 year old Riverside, Calif., woman died of internal injuries at 1:10 p.m. Wednesday in Callahan County Hospital here, less than an hour after she had been hurled 68 feet through the air from a car which was plunging down an embankment.

Victim of the one-car accident, which occurred 1.6 miles east of here on U. S. Highway 80, was Mrs. Emma Stephenson.

Mrs. Stephenson was a passenger in the auto driven by Mrs. Christine Etheridge Tillman, 54, of Covington, Tenn. Both women were believed to be traveling to Tennessee.

Highway Patrolman Bob Favor said the left rear tire of Mrs. Tillman's Falcon went flat about 12:15 p.m., causing the car to skid sideways across the highway for some 200 feet before plunging down the south side of a 250-foot "fill" between two hills on the Lyman Henry ranch.

More than half way down the incline Mrs. Stephenson was thrown from the car and landed headfirst in a clump of mesquite trees at the foot of the fill, Favor said.

She was rushed by a Godfrey ambulance to the Baird hospital.

Mrs. Tillman, who remained in the car as it came to a halt on its right side, was treated for numerous cuts and bruises, but was not seriously injured.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — On July 1, every article of outer clothing that costs less than \$10 will go up two per cent.

That is the date the extended state tax law goes into effect. All outer clothing now exempt will become taxable.

Smart shoppers will take advantage of the last days of June to stock up on clothing for the family. Buying of school togs may take place earlier than ever before.

Legislature made many changes in the sales tax law. Most of the changes affect reporting procedures of merchants. An important one, however, raises the state sales tax on automobiles from 1½ to 2 per cent.

As of July 1, if you buy a new car costing \$3,000, for example, you will pay a state tax of \$60.

If you trade in an old car the salesman will deduct the trade-in amount from the total, then figure your tax on the difference. In other words, if your trade-in came to \$1,000 toward a \$3,000 car, you would pay two per cent — or \$40 — on the difference.

"LAYAWAY PLAN" — At the last minute Gov. John Connally signed the \$3,000,000,000 state budget bill. He criticized the bill for emphasizing "bricks rather than brains." But he knocked out \$12,400,000 worth of "bricks" — i.e. construction items — before he affixed his signature.

Connally said he would guard the \$12,400,000 as a "layaway plan" for higher education.

Hopes that his decision on the 1964-65 appropriations bill would decide the special session question fell through. He said he does not want to call a special session, but will not hesitate to do so if he becomes convinced that excellence in higher education is threatened by a shortage of funds for teaching salaries, research and libraries.

VETOES — When the governor's deadline for signing bills arrived, he inked into law most

of the 554 measures passed by the Legislature.

But he vetoed a few, including:

SENATE BILL 270, revising the antiquated 1856 Code of Criminal Procedure. Connally nixed the controversial code revision, after learning that the copy sent him for signature was not the one passed by the Legislature.

HOUSE BILL 769, exempting from jury service "all owners or operators of milk producing farms where this operation is the exclusive means of earning a living." Connally said, "I believe that dairy farmers occupy an important role in our society and can serve a valuable function as jurors."

HOUSE BILL 1053, providing for election of directors of the Upper Guadalupe River Authority, rather than appointment by the governor. Connally said he vetoed this since there was a technical conflict in its legal language which might jeopardize the district.

HOUSE BILL 975, repealing the requirement that the Angleton Drainage District get approval of the Texas Water Commission before spending bond money for improvements. He said Water Commission approval would assure uniformity of improvements in all water districts.

MURRAY FILE — Income tax reports made by William J. Murray from 1946 to 1962 have been studied by Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. Murray resigned in April as a member of the Railroad Commission, following a conflict of interest charge.

After noting that Murray's taxable income from oil, gas and allied operations during those 17 years exceeded \$1,700,000, Carr stated, "This report does raise a serious question of a conflict of interest between the official duties of Mr. Murray and his private interests."

Carr recommended a Legislative Council study for an im-

proved Code of Ethics for State officials.

Such a code, co-authored by Reps. Jim Nugent of Kerrville, Bob Eckhardt of Houston and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi, passed the House during the legislative session but was killed in the Senate.

Stud yof Murray's finances was made for a Travis County Grand Jury, which will attempt to determine whether Murray violated any laws.

SCREWORM Progress Proven — Up to now, estimates of state and federal animal health authorities that the 1½ year old screwworm eradication program has resulted in anywhere from 75 to 95 per cent decline in the disease have been pure guess work.

But the joint report of the Texas Health Commission and the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the five week period ending June 1 confirmed a 93 per cent decline as compared to the same weeks in 1962.

The clear comparison report showed that during the period April 28 to June 1, 1963, research workers confirmed 480 samples as screwworm infestations, and 1,281 as nonscrewworm. In the same period in 1962 there were 7,013 screwworm cases confirmed and 597 termed non-screwworm.

PROGRAM IN JEOPARDY? — Members of the Texas Screwworm Eradication Committee considered Governor Connally's veto of a \$300,000 appropriation for the eradication program a matter of "serious concern."

They said more than 100,000 livestock producers raised \$1,000,000 toward its \$3,000,000 goal this spring in a 30 day period on the governor's word that the State would carry its share of the \$12,000,000 program.

Committeemen said that unless the \$300,000 vetoed by Connally is restored the entire program is in jeopardy, and possibly the loss of the huge investment producers already have made in the program.

### Veterans Asked To Check Beneficiary

In the event of the death of an older war veteran, will his GI insurance funds be distributed in accordance with his current wishes?

Not in more than 50 per cent of the cases, says Edward P. Onstot, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, Texas, as the result of a recent survey.

The VA had directed a reminder letter to GI policy holders 60 years of age and older to check on the beneficiary choices the veteran had originally made as well as his selection of a lump settlement or payments over a period of time.

Onstot revealed that in 55 per cent of the veterans' replies, changes were requested to bring the insurance settlement in line with the veterans' current wishes.

Most common cases were those in which marriage had subse-

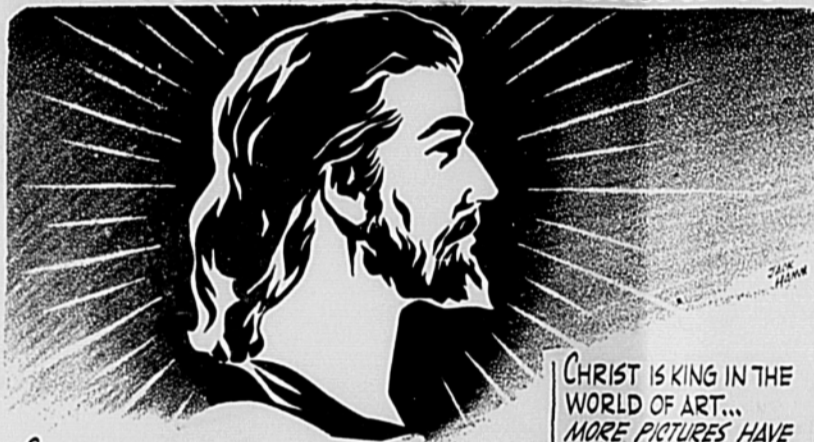

quently taken place but the mother of the veteran was still listed as a chief beneficiary. In numerous other cases, Onstot said, the veteran had re-married but his former wife was still listed as the beneficiary.

Under the law, the VA must make payment to the beneficiary of record as named in writing by the policyholder.

Onstot said the VA will continue to send a reminder to all GI policy holders 60 years or older and will notify other policy holders as they reach their 60th birthday.

Younger veterans whose previous beneficiary has been outdated by death, marriage, divorce, etc., may write directly to the office maintaining their insurance records should they wish to initiate a change, Onstot said. Servicemen may see their personnel Affairs or Finance Officer for the same purpose.
