



PAINTED OVER COURT FINERY

Ruse by Which Nuns Had Queen De picted as a Member of Their Religious Order.

Through a chance discovery in the garret of a ducal palace in Madrid, a three-hundred-year-old romance of a wonderful Velasquez has been revealed. Hidden for three centuries as picture of a nun, this portrait of Queen Isabella of Spain, the first wife of King Philip IV, has recently been restored in London

In the disguised picture practically nothing but the face and hands of the original was left uncovered, and the secret was first guessed at owing to the paint peeling away from the nun's hood, when there was revealed the

fringe of a lace collar. Princess Isabella of Bourbon was married to Philip in 1615, and in 1624 was staying in the convent of the nuns belonging to the order of the Descalzos. As a mark of the kindness she there received she presented the nuns with this Velasquez portrait of her-

Later Isabella wished to enter the convent, but the pope would not consent. The inmates of the convent called in a painter, and secretly instructed him to paint out the queen's court dress and the lace handkerchief in her left hand, and to present her in the complete garb of a professed nun.

Its political phase might be termed graft, and that form of squeeze is what makes the military governors of the provinces and the politicians of Peking and Canton so fat. Most Chiese politicians would have been ac-

ceptable in the eves of Julius Caesar. and squeeze is the reason for some of the corpulence in China.

Squeeze is the Chinese translation of "as much as the traffic will bear." It is a factor in Chinese business, as much as supply and demand, or profit

Tapestry in History.

No such colors can be produced today, nor none that are so unfading. When tapestry making waned in Brussels. France develeped the art, and under Henry IV and Louis XIV the Gobelins were famed for their perfection of workmanship and color.





ANCIENT AND MODERN LIGHT

Users of Electricity Today Read With a Smile of the "Link Boy" of Old England.

street lights in the large cities of the world were almost unknown. In old England "link boys," carrying torches. were hired by gentlemen to light the way for them when they went out in the evening in London. When lampposts were placed in the city streets the link boys' occupation was gone. With progress of time lanterns lighted by candles or by oil were succeeded by gas or by electric lights. Every city of the civilized world normally has its principal streets lighted at night, and the link boy today is as superfluous as the sedan chair.

In a similar way the famous caves of the world, such as the Mammoth cave of Kentucky and Luray cavern in Virginia were formerly lighted by candles carried by guides who conducted travelers. But today practically all these subterranean places that are visited by sightseers are equipped with electric lights, and instead of carrying a bag of candles the guide merely turns on or off a series of electric switches as he conducts a party through the cave.

Railroad tunnels were formerly unlighted, excepting the lights in the trains that passed through them, but today tunnels, as well as stations, are lighted by electricity.-Boston Commercial Bulletin.

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
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

WHALE IS CHAMPION JUMPER

Mammal Easily Holds All Records When It Comes to a Question of High Leaping.

If you were asked the question "What animal can jump the highest?" you would in all likelihood, guess wrong. It is the whale!

Oh, yes, the whale is a mammal, not a fish, and he can jump out of the water to a height of 25 feet with the greatest ease. This is about twice as high as the tiger, who can manage about 121/2 feet to 13 feet. A dog has been known to clear 10 feet, and the horse follows next with 7 feet 81/4

Man's record high jump was made in 1914 by a Californian, who reached feet 75-16 inches. In 1913, the tremendous neight of 5 feet 5% inches was attained for the standing high jump, though in 1892 a man reached 6 feet, with weights, at this jump.

As regards the long jump, without weights, the record, 24 feet 11% inches, was made in 1901, and it has

The longest jump backwards, with weights, is 12 feet 11 inches, and the holder of this record also holds that of the standing long jump, without weights, with 12 feet 11/2 inches.

Of animals, one might expect the kangaroo to hold the record, but he can only manage 15 feet-ten less than man-though, talking of long jumps, how about the grasshopper? He can jump 200 times his own length.



It is not difficult to distinguish between spruce and hemlock in the forest, when one learns to notice the following points: The spruce has stiff pointed leaves (or short needles), its the cones-smaller than those of the pines-hang down on the branches. The hemlock, on the other hand, has sists of two separate ribs each 12 soft flat needles, often two-ranked, that is, growing on two sides of the stem, so that the sprig has a flattened appearance; hemlock bark scales look red, when broken off, and the dainty little cones stand erect on their branches, falling apart soon after ripening, so that no old cones long remain on or under the trees where they grew. Mexican With Much "Gilt" Nears La Belle France.

Twelve Million France in His Jeans Will Compensate for Discomfort of Passage—Is Said to Have Betrayed Carranza.

stoker with 12,000,000 francs in his jeans-enough to pay for at least one square meal and the couvert charge in any Paris restaurant-is nearing the shores of France today bent on having his fling in the land of "light wines and dancing" while his franking privilege holds out.

Being a member of the high Mexican traitocracy the man is traveling incog, and not even his nom de stoke can be made public at this time. All well-informed Mexicans in this city, however, know his name and his history, and the only mystery is how the hotel bell hops and taxi drivers of New York ever let him get away with all that gilt-edged tippage, says the Evening Post of that city.

As an indication of the exalted position he formerly held, it need only be said he was the man who had personal charge of the safety of Carranza when the late president made his recent exit from the Mexican mise en scene. It is not known just where he was when the body fell but soon afterward he arrived here in town with money enough to set him up for rest of his natural (Mexican)

on Herald square where the visitor stopped recognized him and is said to have given him the Mexican equivalent of the chautauqua salute, but the man who had done so much to make Carranza safe for the undertakers failed to reply in kind. He even put himself down in the hotel register as somebody else-but those who knew knew.

For days and days the generalissimo-for he was one of those-tried vainly to get the necessary O. K. to book passage for France. The city was filled with representatives of all Mexican governments, but none of them would do the honors. The Carranza agents turned him down because they didn't exactly like the way he had looked after the safety of their chief. The Obregonzistas refused to function either because they didn't like his technique or because they thought he had more money than an ex-safety commissioner ought to have with but one president to his credit. Something of the same train of thought is said to have affected the de la Huertistas.

At about this point those who had reason to feel friendly towards the ex-generalissimo came forward with the suggestion that he ship as a stoker. At first he was not inclined to take the tip, but when they told him how nice and warm it would be down in the stoke hole and how near he would be to the part of the ship where the revolutions take place he decided it was worth trying-once.

Stokers were scarce and full-fledged Mexican traitocratic stokers were extremely hard to get, so he had no difficulty in landing a job. All the fine jewels and precious silk shirts which he had bought while here were cashed in before sailing. When he took to the high seas he had nothing but his stoke clothes and the 12,000,-000 of French currency.
