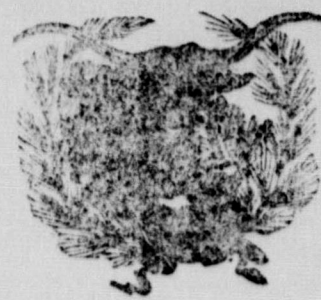
Georges Clemenceau, the "Tiger of France," honors us by his presence

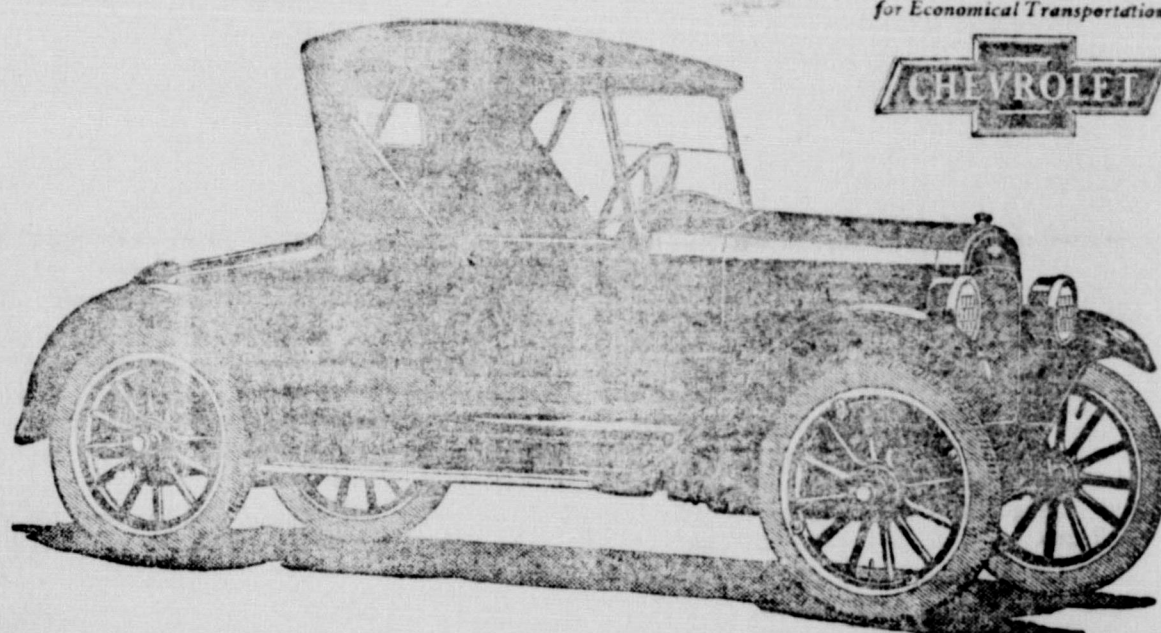

### Importance of Animal Food for Laying Hens

By F. W. Kazmeier

In the fall and winter when the question of producing eggs is quite a problem, it will pay everyone to investigate the importance of animal food for laying hens. As has been stated in previous articles the white of the egg is made largely out of protein, and animal protein appears to be better for this purpose than vegetable protein. To give additional in-

formation along this line we shall discuss the various animal proteins available for feeding to laying hens.

#### Beef Scrap

Beef scrap is a by-product of the large packing houses, and contains both meat and bone, which have been boiled and dried. On account of having been dried it contains but very little moisture and carries a protein content between 45 per cent and 65 per cent. Good beef scrap is light colored with a sweet smell and no offensive odor, like inferior meat scraps. A way of testing beef scrap or meat scrap is by pouring boiling water over a small quantity and noting the odor. An offensive odor denotes a decomposed product or very poor quality beef scrap, that should not be fed. It is only fit for fertilizer. Beef scraps and meat scraps are practically the same. Beef scrap contains a large per cent of protein and is very low in fat and carbohydrates, only about 13 per cent and very low in ash, or about the amount found in good wheat bran.

In feeding meat scraps, or beef scraps always investigate the quality. Inferior meat scraps causes all kinds of digestive troubles and diarrhea. Of all the available kinds of animal food beef scraps is perhaps the most convenient to store, feed and handle. The value of meat scraps is in the protein content it contains. It is of course animal protein which is more valuable for all kinds of poultry than vegetable protein. Animal protein is vegetable protein that has passed through an animal once.

#### Dried Blood

Dried blood or blood meal is generally not as good for feeding to poultry as meat scraps, even though it is much richer in protein. It is so very rich that it must be fed very carefully. It is too concentrated and not sufficiently bulky. It also lacks in palatability. In drying the blood part of the protein is so coagulated as to make it indigestible. Blood meal is a refuse from slaughter houses, being nothing but the blood saved, boiled under very high pressure and temperature, and then dried. It is black in color and will partly dissolve in water. It some times contains much undesirable foreign matter.

#### Milk Products

The best form of animal food for all ages of poultry is milk in any form or by-product. Skim milk has been substituted for meat scraps and the results have been very satisfactory. The feeding of sour milk is very satisfactory for two reasons. One for the animal protein it contains, and the other for the lactic acid. The lactic acid has the power of destroying certain microscopic disease germs found in the digestive system of all ages of fowls. It is a wonderful feed for chickens. Any kind of milk or milk by-product is worth as much or more fed to poultry than any other kind of livestock. The various forms of milk can be fed as drink or mixed in the mash.

#### Skim Milk

Growing chicks require large quantities of protein and ash as bone and muscle forming material and in the case of the laying hen the same material is used to make the white of the egg. Skim milk is composed largely of water and animal protein. One hundred pounds of skim milk contains about 9 3-4 pounds of solid matter, which is rich in egg making material especially the white of the egg.

At the Indiana Experiment Station, two experiments were conducted to establish the feeding value of milk for poultry, especially laying hens. One lot was given milk and their regular ration. The other lot was fed the regular ration, but no milk. The pen fed skim milk laid more than three times as many eggs at less than one third the cost per dozen. It clearly showed that the feeding of milk to laying hens pays and pays well.

#### Green Cut-Bone

Green cut bone varies in protein content from 12 per cent to 25 per cent. It contains a large amount of water, which of course reduces its food value in proportion. It carries much beneficial mineral matter. It supplies the same mineral matter as oyster shell. It is a good feed for laying hens, but must be fed carefully, because on account of the moisture content it heats and spoils very rapidly. When green cut bone can be had for less than two cents per pound it may be fed at a profit. The feeding of about one-half ounce daily per fowl is sufficient. Overfeeding of this feed may cause serious digestive disorders. Green cut bone should be ground and fed the same day. If kept in a warm place it will spoil over night. It should be fed regularly or not at all. Feeding it spasmodically is not desirable. To keep it, spread out in a thin layer in a cool place. It is not wise to plan on cutting green cut bone by hand. It is too much of a job and most people soon will discontinue the practice.

#### Experiments

The University of Missouri conducted a series of experiments in which they found that a pen of 25 S. C. White Leghorn hens that were fed sour milk in addition to the regular ration laid a total of 3275 eggs. The pen fed meat scraps in place of the sour milk laid 2668 eggs in the same length of time and the pen fed no milk and no meat scrap and no animal food of any kind laid only 1373 eggs, in the same length of time. In other words the milk fed flock laid almost three times as many eggs. The beef scrap fed pen laid almost twice as many eggs in a year as the no animal food fed pen. This series of experiments should clearly show to everyone the importance of feeding laying hens plenty of animal food. It also brings out the importance of milk in a laying hen's ration. Milk is simply a wonderful feed. As time goes on no doubt poultry raisers will learn to appreciate the feeding of milk to laying hens. In dollars and

cents the above experiment showed a profit of \$28.26 for the milk fed pen, a profit of \$19.78 for the beef scrap fed pen and a total loss of \$1.00 for the no animal feed fed pen. It pays to feed laying hens animal food. These figures were based on 1916 prices for market eggs.

#### Prepared Egg Mash

In the manufacture of poultry feeds, the feed manufacturers have recognized the value of some kind of animal food. For this reason one of the best ready made egg mashes on the market today is made out of ground oat meal for a foundation and has dried butter milk and meat scraps for animal protein. It is needless to say that such an egg mash does make hens lay almost every possible egg they are capable of producing.

#### Jack Rabbits

In some sections of West Texas especially people kill jack rabbits and feed them to their laying hens. This constitutes a very desirable form of animal food. The only difficult thing

in connection with feeding it, is the fact that it is more or less uncertain how much they are fed. Some hens may not get enough and others too much. For this reason we recommend using a little judgment when feeding this kind of animal food. Fresh animal food like jack rabbits, may be fed raw in the winter but in the summer we advise feeding it cooked. The hens must be fed sufficient to do any good. A good plan is to feed all they will eat in about two hours every afternoon, every other day. As long as the voidings show a good consistency you are not feeding too much animal food. As soon as hens are over fed on animal food, they will develop a looseness of the bowels. In specifying amount to feed in two hours, above, we were going on the assumption that the rabbits were fed, cut and hung up, but not ground up fine. If fed ground, feed the same amount as indicated in the feeding of green cut bone.

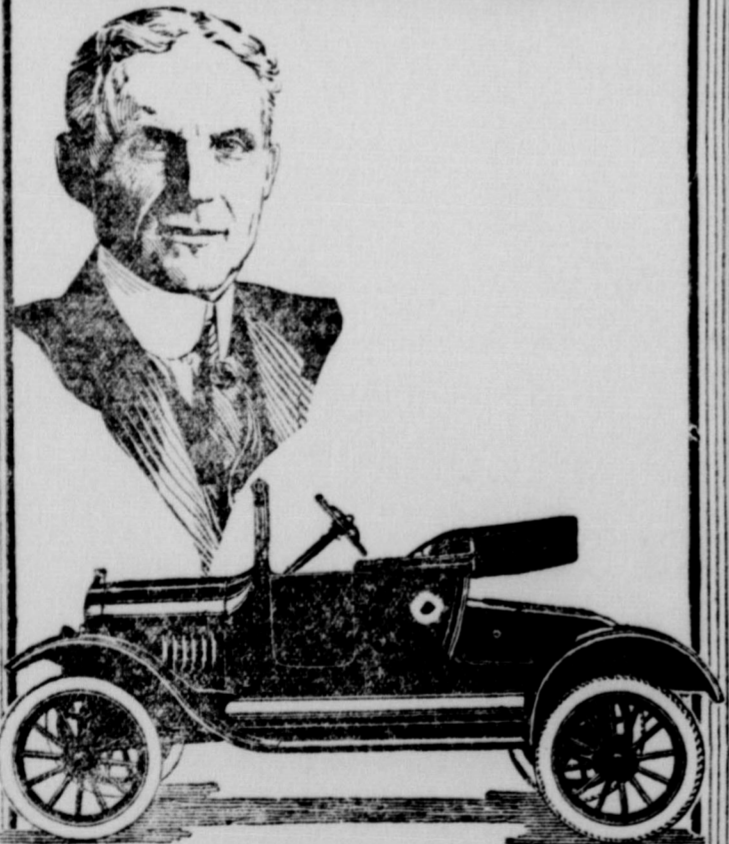
