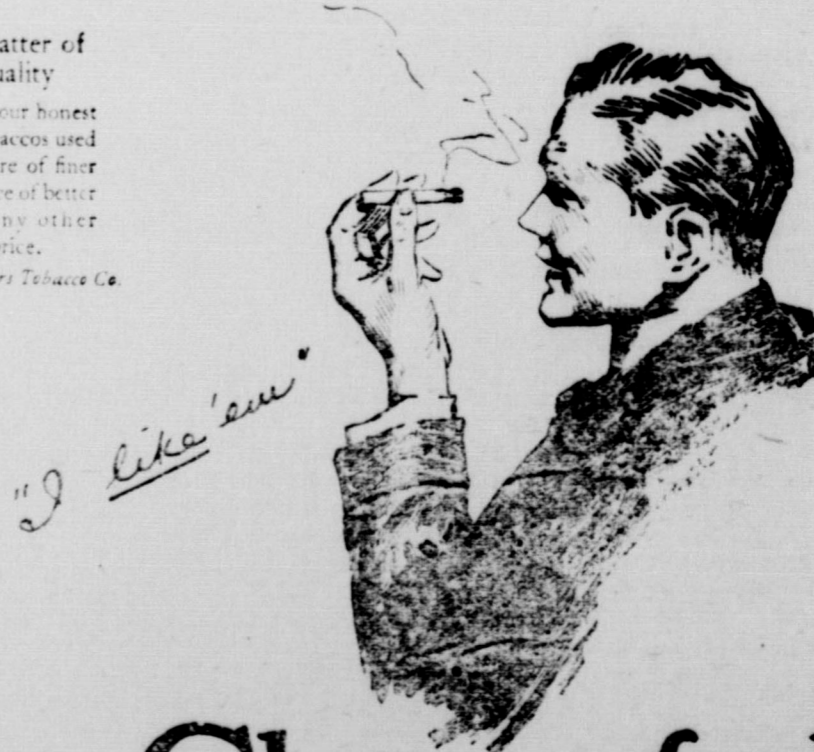

Mr. Johnson Raises Issue

"When the need for them (the Ku Klux) has passed away," says W. A. Johnson, candidate for Lieutenant Governor of Texas, the clan will pass away. In this tacit commendation of the Ku Klux Mr. Johnson raises an issue which is likely to be presented to every candidate for every office of any importance in Texas this year. In view of the fact that the Ku Klux are bound to each other and to certain secret ends by a solemn oath before Almighty God, and in view of announcements by known leaders of the organization that a resort to the ballot box by the clan is contemplated by its organization, it is no more than fair that all Texas citizens, whether members of the clan or not, have an equal opportunity to know exactly where each candidate stands.

The political possibilities or a situation under which the secret members of an oathbound order may combine secretly to work for the election of one of their number, whose relation to them is also secret, are too obvious to require comment. Similarly, the opportunity of such a political mechanism is excellent for carrying out politically a sweeping and crushing revenge against those who have dared to oppose or criticize the clan or its objects. Under this guise it becomes a Camorra society with a range of action even greater than that of its Italian counterpart.

For these reasons it seems that Mr. Johnson very properly introduces the issue. If Mr. Johnson, for example, is not a member of the Ku Klux Klan, the voters have a material right to know it and to act accordingly. If Mr. Johnson—still for example—is a member of the Ku Klux Klan, the

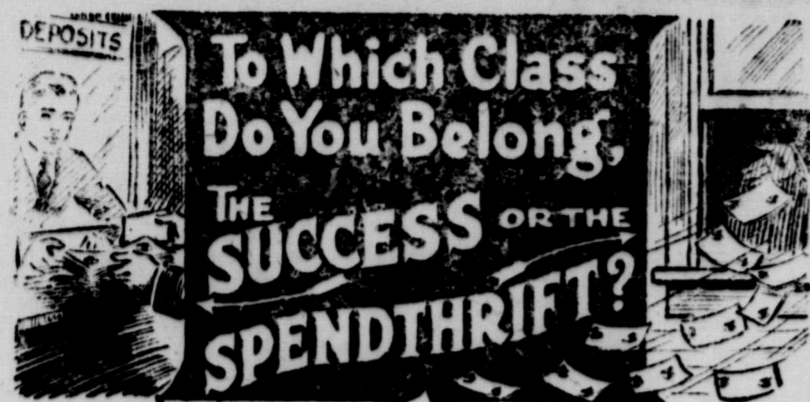

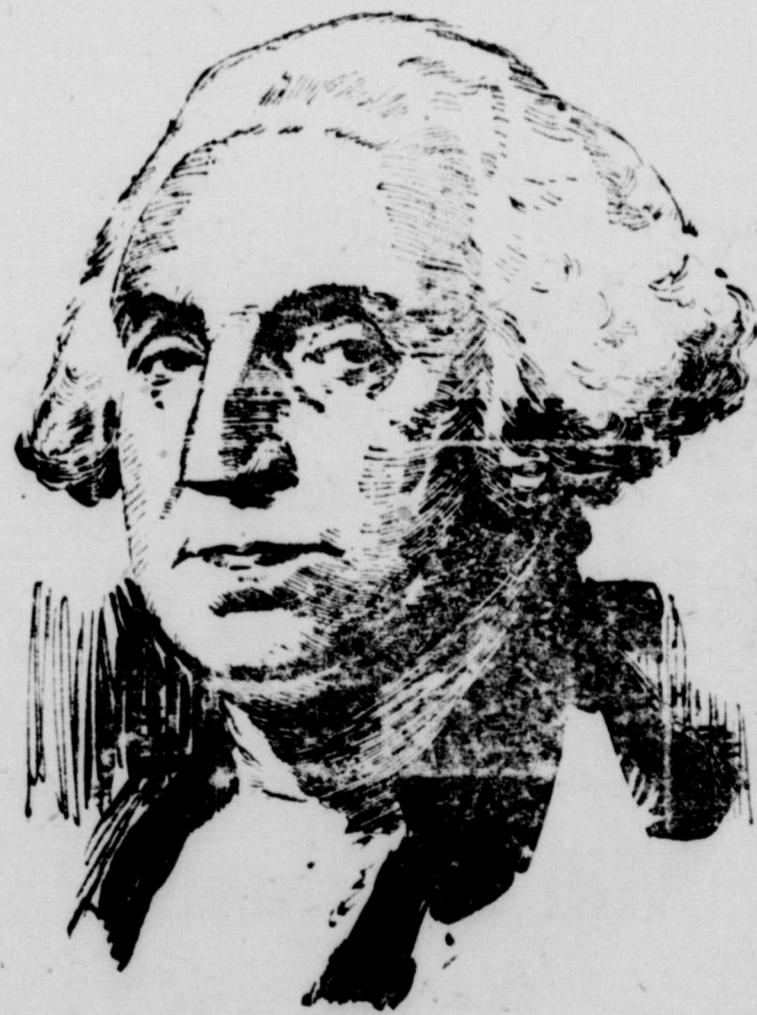

Investigation by Congress of the alleged illegal hangings in the A. E. F. is termed "a farcical burlesque" by the American Legion at Mineral Wells, Texas. "This abortive investigation is an insult to every loyal American," a resolution reads. "We believe it is time members of the board began devoting their efforts to matters of import instead of in the hearing of unsupported and absurd complaints made by a few obviously disgruntled and irresponsible newsmongers." The American Legion Weekly of February 10, prints an article by an ex-captain in the Signal Corps, quoting General Bullard's order to shoot "on the spot" any person advising surrender during battle, but flatly denying that evidence of any such instance has been substantiated.

Need More Like Him

District Judge R. E. L. Roy of the Seventeenth District at Ft. Worth last Monday morning made some pertinent remarks concerning the laws and enforcement and the way that good citizens try to get off the jury. If every good citizen who is selected on the venire, would not try to get off, but would serve and help to see that justice is meted out to the guilty and the innocent turned loose there would be less cause to criticize the law breaking that is running rife in every community in the Nation at this time. The judge's example might well be followed by other judges over the state, and we believe that when good men will serve on the juries it will have a tendency to reduce the breaking of laws and give the morals of a community an uplift. Judge Roy, in talking to 200 veniremen made the following remarks:

"If you are a bolshevik, if you are an Anarchist, if you don't believe in the laws of the country in which you live, then you may be excused from jury service."

There was a pause after the court's remarks. Only two asked to be taken off the jury list instead of the usual large percentage of requests. These two had legal excuses.

"I believe we have a bunch of Americans here this morning," Judge Roy remarked as the men through their silence, signified their intention of giving their services as jurors.

"If this land is not fit to live in, you are responsible." "It is not the fault of your sheriff, of your district attorney, or of the courts. So long as juries turn loose those who are guilty, so long will your life and property be unsafe. It is the sacred duty under the law for you to serve your country as jurors, and if you ask to be excused, you ought to be ashamed of yourselves."

The judge also sounded a warning against conviction of the innocent.—Quannah Tribune-Chief.

The real truth is touched in these statements. This paper has made the statement time after time that the enforcement of law rests with the citizens. No stream will ever rise above its fountain head, and the citizens of the country are the fountain head of law and order. It's a serious charge that they are responsible in a very great measure for conditions that exist, but we can't help it. We shall have better conditions when men are willing to assume the responsibilities of citizenship and not prefer to get behind a sheet to act.

THE F. F. F. ROAD IS BEING MARKED

Stamford, Feb. 13.—Ranking with the Bankhead highway in the development of the territory between Fort Worth and the new Mexican line, the F. F. F. highway is rapidly being made into a smooth, all-year route which is expected to divert much of the traffic now moving over less aggressive vehicle paths of West Texas. The task of making the road through West Texas is occasionally meeting with difficulty due to the large ranches through which it passes. Recently Lewis Hancock, who has charge of marking in the neighborhood of Farrell, met a formidable obstacle. He was attaching one of the signs on a tall windmill in the center of a big sixty-section ranch in Lamb County when an infuriated red bull obtruded. There was nothing for Hancock to do but climb the ladder of the mill. The bull stood guard for hours waiting the descension of the intrepid marker. However, Hancock decided patience in keeping his perch on a round of a ladder was more of a virtue than to argue with the beast. When the sun was gilding the West and the bull had learned the superiority of his would-be victim, and had romped away for his salt and feed, Hancock came down, shaking partly from fear and partly from the icy breeze that had been blowing over him.

But the F. F. F. Highway is being built despite bulls and the occasional apathy of commissioners' courts. Progress on the road has been spectacular and somewhat equal with that which has characterized the Bankhead highway. The F. F. F. is sure to become a real competitor of the more touted system, according to towns of the Plains traversed by this line. It begins at Fort Worth, and, after passing through the following towns, terminates in California: Weatherford, Mineral Wells, Olney, Seymour, Crowell, Paducah, Matador, Floydada, Plainview, Olton, Clovis, Santa Rosa, Las Vegas.

A few instances of whipping the line into shape come to the attention of highway enthusiasts. Tidings come from Olton, county seat of Lamb county, that \$150,000 is being spent on it. The J. W. Jordan Construction company of Plainview has already set to work on the line. The stretch through Lamb county is thirty-five miles. While the road is being constructed a detour is being made for the present traffic. When completed it will be an all-year-around highway over which the autoist can skip at any rate he braves. Marking of the line is proceeding

American Legion News

Ex-service men in Calcutta, India, have applied to the American Legion for a charter.

A complete French village, with a "Hotel de Ville" accommodating 1,000, will be planted at Medicine Park, Okla., as a recreation center for the

American Legion. Posts will build cottages where members may spend their vacation.

Hiring squads of unemployed ex-soldiers, each squad in charge of an ex-nurse, has been suggested to the American Legion in Toledo, O., as a means of tearing down unsightly election posters.

"Nervous" ex-soldiers present a special problem in hospitalization. Neuropsychiatric treatment at Government institutions is under investigation by the American Legion, and a conference of specialists has been called by the Veterans' Bureau.

John J. Payne, released two years ago from a German prison, is being looked for by the American Legion. His mother, at Newburg, N. Y., has not seen him since Christmas, 1920.

Holding aloft a tin can labelled "For ex-soldiers," a man raised \$9,000 in New York streets. The American Legion learned that ex-soldiers got about \$50 of it—the man got a jail sentence.

Gathered at the call of radical New York labor leaders, 600 unemployed men threatened a tear-gas attack on Fifth Avenue financiers. The American Legion was condemned as a "tool of capitalism," and ex-soldiers present were told they should have kept their Army guns to "force the Government to give them jobs."

Brooding over war horrors continues to wreck the minds of ex-soldiers. The American Legion at Tampa, Fla., reports twelve cases of ex-service men pronounced "incurably insane" since Thanksgiving.

Good standing in the American Legion will be the only security required to float a loan from the Legion's rotating fund for disabled and needy ex-soldiers.

History as taught in public schools prejudices children against foreign countries, Alvin Owsley, head of the American Legion's Americanism commission, told educational authorities at New York.

"To sail away for a year and a day!" New York state delegates plan to charter a steamer to take them to the American Legion convention at New Orleans.

District schools in Moffat County, Colo., had decided to close their doors for a period of weeks, due to insufficient funds. The American Legion succeeded in raising \$916 to keep them going, taking the stand that "a shortening of the school term or a curtailment of athletics would be a backward step, depriving children of rightful advantages."

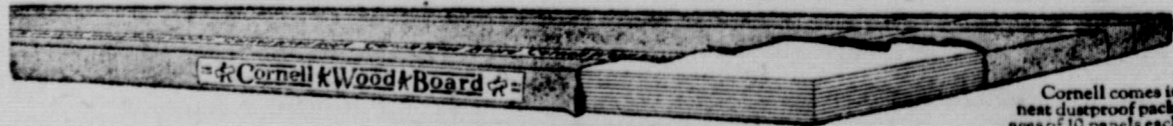
