#### NOTE FOR CONFEDERATE WIDOWS.

MR. EDITOR:—Camp Albert Sidney Johnston has asked me to reply to a card in your issue June 29th, signed F. S. Bell. Before I could write the reply, F. S. Bell bloomed again, on the same subject in the Dallas News, and thinking perhaps, that there would be other similar volunteer crops, I have waited to harvest them all at one time, and in doing so, will state in the beginning that all references either to Mr. Lanham or Mr. Bell will be intended to apply to them in their official capacity, and not to them personally, as I maintain that the official life of every officer is and should be, subject to inspection and criticism of the public, as he fills the place of a public servant; it is as if he had entered the proverbial "glass house;" but he should stick close to the "moral," and not "throw stones." Our Camp had read to them Mr. Bell's card of explanation, but failed to see wherein he explained but rather felt as if he had made it the occasion to shy at them a stone; they seemed to think, that the very reasons, that he gave for Gov. Lanham's veto of the bill, were made stronger ones for his approval. They recognized the hand as that of F. S. Bell, but the voice as that of F. S. Bell, Revenue Agent, and thus we see the motive for all of this "gushing" he had picked up the "political plum" thrown him by Gov. Lanham, and in so doing had become his "man Friday." Gov. Lanham, and Revenue Agent Bell, two tax-eaters, with their noses in the public trough, will get into it with their feet to keep themselves from being shoved out, or to keep any worthy cause from shoving in.

He (Revenue Agent Bell) says that it is accepted, that this sum, (\$10,000) would not be sufficient to build the walls for a home, etc. Yet that is all that the noble Daughters of the Confederacy asked them to give; they proposed by their own work and efforts to raise the balance; they have evidences of their ability, to do what they undertake, all over this Southland of ours; in the many monuments erected to their noble dead; they have done and are still

doing for their dead, a work that stamps them with a nobility of character showing them worthy of their sires; and now they have turned their helping hands to the aid of the living; the relics of their noble dead, who in poverty, distress and want, are tottering on the verge of the grave, the mothers and the wives of a soldiery, whose deeds of valor, have sanctified a cause that was lost. Ah, it is well that "mercy weaves the veil of futurity" or how otherwise could the nerve and bravery of those devoted soldiers, stand such a test as fore-seeing their loved ones treated as they now are? With a faith inspired, by the fact that they had an "Old Confederate" Governor and a Legislature in sympathy with them this noble band of Daughters circulated and got signers to their petition, asking the Legislature to assist them with this "pittance, that would not build their walls." The Legislature to their glory, responded to their appeal, but this Confederate Governor could see in it no "public calamity," but vetoed it without any comment. Now compare this action with that of his action in the "Banking Bill" that came before him in just as unconstitutional shape. Was it turned down in the same manner? Not much it wasn't. It was juggled with, and lobbied with, and then returned to the house and they were told to hurry up with it and it would be approved before adjournment, and it was, and from the approval of that bill I will predict the opening of a Pandora's box, and the outpouring of the greatest flood of evils, that ever swept over our state. Not a great many years ago an effort was made to repeal the Homestead law, which I am glad to state failed. This Banking bill is the entering wedge for that very purpose now. The only argument for its existence, was that it could use collateral that National Banks could not, and that is reality. They will soon plaster all they have the power to over with mortgages, and then they will want the Homestead. There is no true prosperity where there is universal borrowing, a country with such people is close on to bankruptcy. Revenue Agent Bell says that for another reason Gov. Lanham vetoed

the bill was that a deficiency of \$800,000 stared the State in the face. Where was that deficiency when he approved the District Judge grab? And at the same time, he became inspired with the gift of prophecy and says "that it is within the certainties" that the next Legislature will do what this one could not, and donate some vast sum, sufficient to construct a building worthy of the purpose. What are these poor, worthy decrepit women to do during this interval of two years? Die and rot, unnoticed by an official, whose duty it is to relieve all public calamities. Revenue Agent Bell says that these increased revenues are to come from the increased taxes on different corporations. Does he not know that these taxes, great or little, are carried by these corporations in their expense account? And their tariffs are increased accordingly, that every dollar wrung out of them is represented by the sweat of some farmer, laboring man or mechanic? You increase the tax on banks and they raise their rate of interest to cover it. You do the same to railroads and the Railroad Commission permits them to meet it with an increase of tariffs, and the classes I mentioned above pay these taxes, as well as their own, and yet this is the kind of service the public servants of the people, give the people. The true way to avoid or to remove a deficiency is not to raise the taxes, but cut down expenses, root out these political "platform demands," and pay the public servants what they are worth, and not what they can get by political graft.

The Dallas News tendered the 29th Legislature, before it convened, some

valuable advice along this line, but they did not seem to heed it. It advised the abolishment of the office of Secretary of State and Revenue Agent, showing them both to be absolutely useless, and simply political plums for the Governor to hand out. If this advice had been heeded don't you know that this reply would have been unnecessary? Revenue Agent Bell says that the raising of the Judges' salary was a platform demand. How about the anti-nepotism and the free pass bills, they were both in the platform? Such a bill as the public demanded; that there should be no nepotism, was not passed. Nepotism frowned down by an outraged people, still exists, even in the Governor's family, and the free-pass bill was juggled out of existence. Yet these lawyer politicians howl about the platform demands, increasing the pay of an already overpaid class of lawyers, posing as District Judges, and call it a platform demand. They will see to their sorrow that the people did not demand it, they are the ones that pay the bills and not the platform.

Mr. Editor, I know I am getting lengthy, but bear with me a while longer. With an experience and observation of nearly sixty years, I have come to the conclusion that kinds of democrats, a democrat for office and a democrat for principle. When I see a man slap himself on the chest and howl out that "I am a democrat who never scratched the ticket" I size him up as a tax-eater or a poor deluded fool, a man who has reformed his principles for the sake of office, or the hopes of one, and when such tax-eaters crowd

around the public trough there is very little show in getting them interested in any worthy cause. They are too busy trying to make the "pigs take their feet out of the trough." Politics has become so disgusting in its methods that I am forced to believe that the cause of our noble Daughters of the Confederacy went down in ignominy and defeat because the Daughters "have no vote" and that "the hand that rocks the cradle" has ceased "to rule the world." WORTH KEEPING.

This paper notes with deep regret a number of persons dying from the bites of rattle snakes in different sections of Texas. Most all cases are young children, and in a good many instances they are bitten on the foot or hand. In such cases the following remedy is said to be a splendid antidote for the rattler's bite, provided it is used immediately after being bitten:

Take a pan or a bowl and pour in enough kerosene oil to cover the wound. It will draw the poison out immediately and in the course of a few minutes turn perfectly green, then pour out the oil and refill the bowl, being careful to put in enough oil to completely cover the wound. Leave the foot or hand in the oil as long as the oil turns green. Then put on a poultice of plain table salt and saturate the salt thoroughly with oil. Keep this up for an hour and there is scarcely any danger of fatal results.

Cut this out and preserve for future reference.—Merkel Mail.
