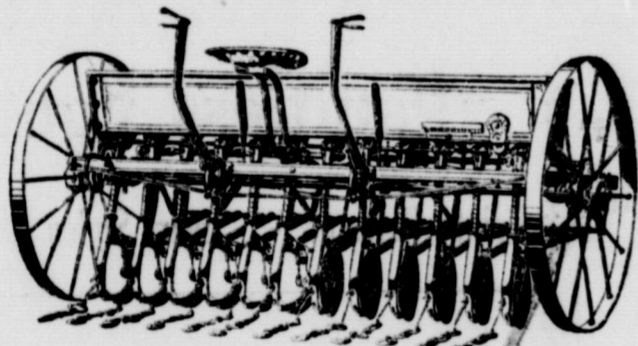

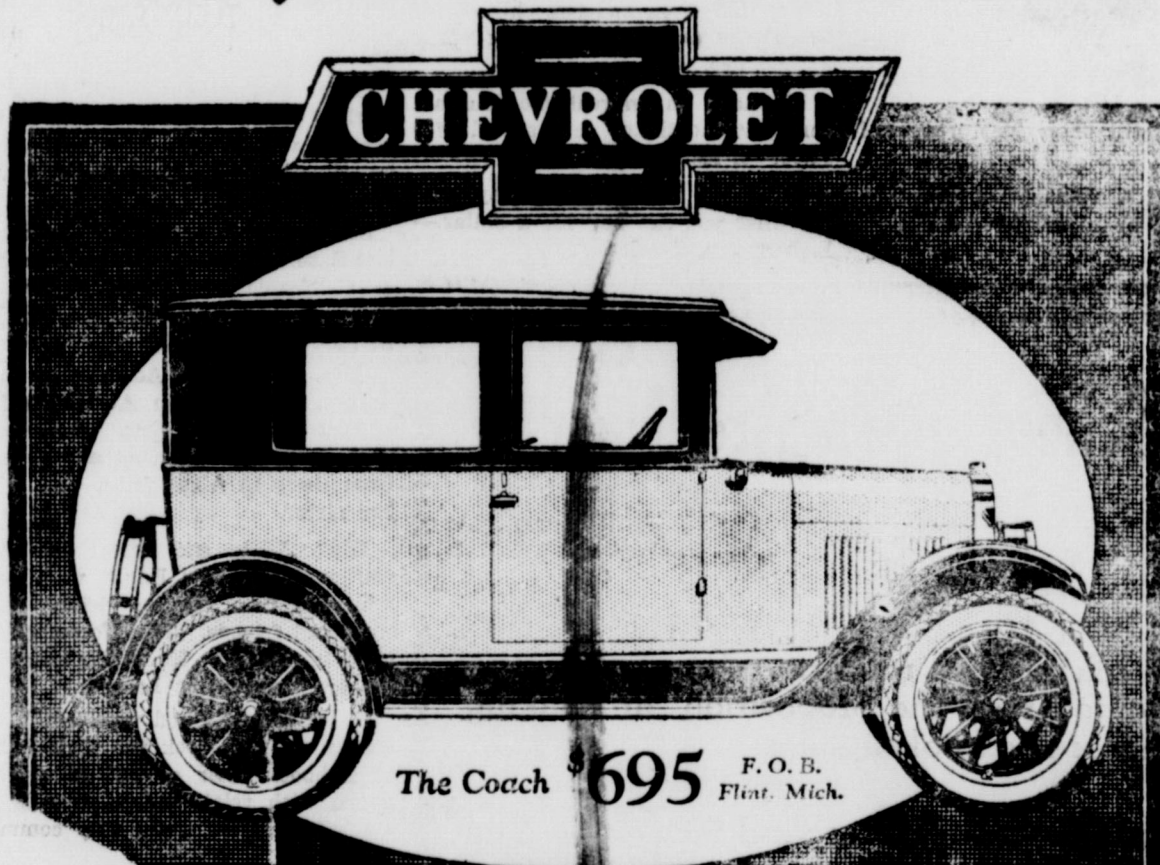

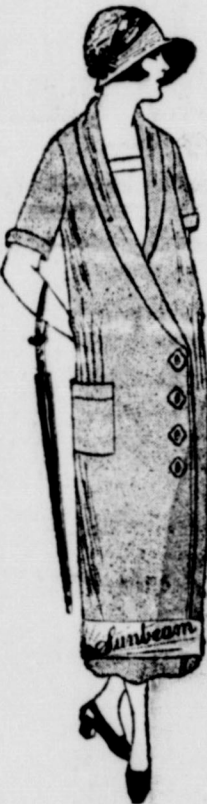

It is thought that Crownover set fire to the house on this last trip. The house belonged to him, and was rented to his brother-in-law.

It is thought that, after leaving the house the third time, Crownover wrecked his car. The car was found in a nearby ditch.—Vernon Record.

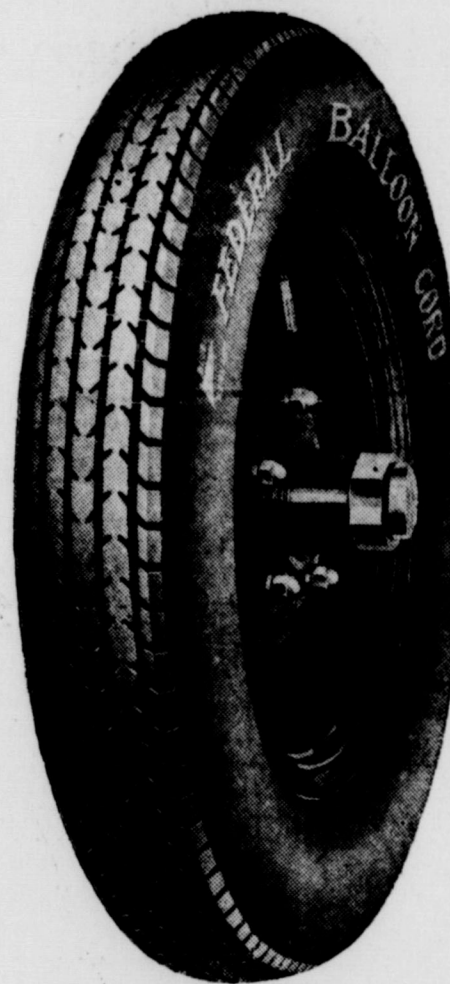
