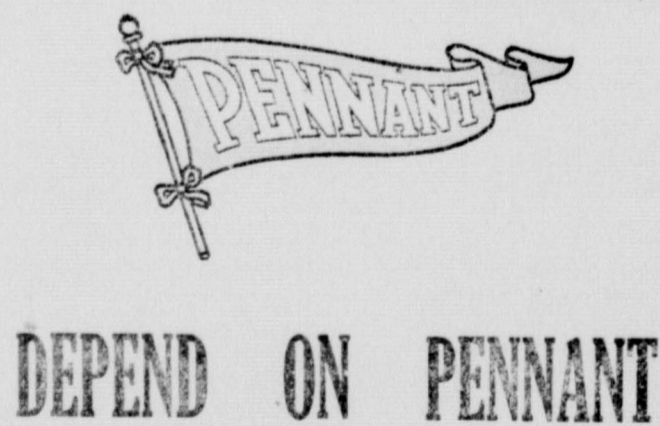

Mr. and Mrs. S. I. Shultz of Vernon spent Friday night with the former's parents and Saturday with Mr. and Mrs. Dave Shultz.

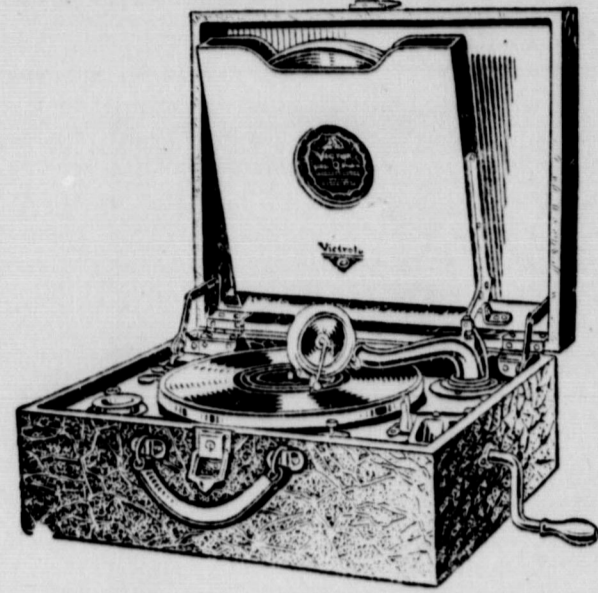
Mr. and Mrs. Ray Pyle helped to paper W. G. Chapman's house near Thalia Monday.

Perhaps few can realize what it will mean to Foard County in future years to have introduced some of the best Jersey blood to be found in the State. Not only has our county agent spent much time and energy in getting such stock brought to our county, but the banks are to be commended for the co-operation they have shown in the matter. This step will doubtless meet the approval of the people generally, and, if so, the venture will have a better show of making a success than it would otherwise. Jersey cows have made many sections famous because of the material prosperity they have brought. No better place can be found in Texas than Foard County for the development of the cream business as an industry. The introduction of thoroughbred Jerseys at this time is the laying of the foundation for that prosperity.

The growing practice of parking cars all day Saturdays in front of the business houses is such as to attract the attention of every observer, and when one considers the inconvenience it causes people who come to town to trade, as well as the annoyance caused by double parking, he sees the necessity of a city law in the immediate future that will correct this condition. It will be a season of enjoyment to those who come and will help lift the burden from these men. The rodeo will be only one of the attractions. The displays by the merchants of Crowell will be an attractive feature. Don't fail to come.

Not only are the crops better but the land has been kept from washing and the moisture kept in the ground. 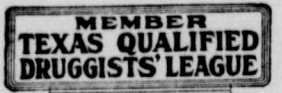

since January 1. These bring the total building permits this year to approximately \$85,000.

**Woodson**—The Woodson Chamber of Commerce, in co-operation with the Throckmorton Chamber of Commerce, has voted to establish mile posts on the state highway leading from the city, on which advertising and road directions will be placed. This is in line with the road marking campaign sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

**Clouderoft, N. M.**—Hon. R. C. Dillon, Governor of New Mexico, will be a distinguished guest at the Pecos-Inter Mountain District Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held in this city on July 9. The regional gathering calls together delegates from almost a score of Eastern New Mexico towns.

**Lubbock**—The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce is making elaborate preparations for its sixth annual "Traveling Men's Stag Party and Jubilee" to be held June 25. An attractive program has been arranged for the event, and plenty of entertainment is being provided for.

**Merkel**—Contract has been let by the City Council for paving ten blocks in the business section of Merkel, and for a \$23,000 extension of water works. The paving contract calls for two and a half inch concrete base. Additional work will be done on water at a later date.

**Throckmorton**—Throckmorton has met the proposal of the Texas and Pacific Railroad for a branch line from Breckenridge with the raising of a \$50,000 bonus. The line will be begun about July 1.

**Ranger**—Enlargement of the Oil Belt Power Plant, southwest of Ranger, is to begin this month. The improvement will increase the voltage from 30,000 to 50,000 horsepower, and will require the services of 400 men for a period of nine months.

**Slaton**—Rapid progress is being made on Slaton's paving program which embraces work on seven blocks. Other paving to follow this project is being talked of and funds are available for this purpose.

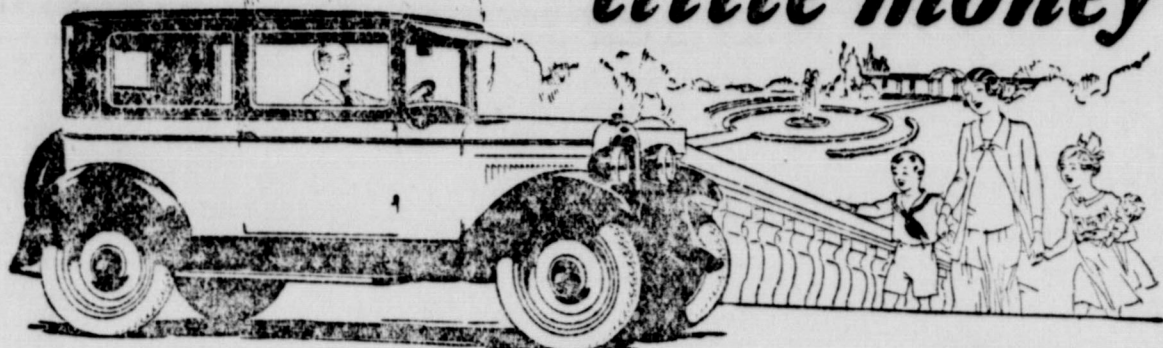

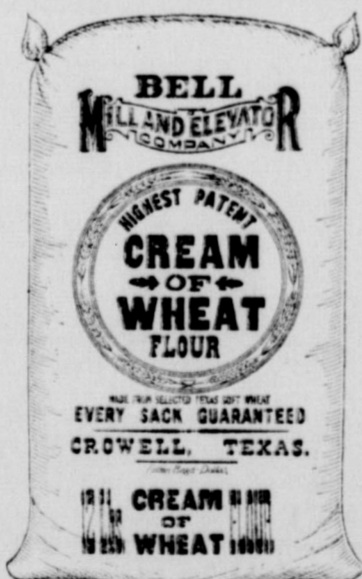

#### HONOR FOR ALL

Within a fortnight two Americans flew across the Atlantic ocean in monoplane without stopping, thus demonstrating more forcibly than ever before that air ocean travel is a possibility of the very near future.

Capt. Lindbergh proved that it could be done in the face of doubts on the part of the most seasoned aviators. Clarence D. Chamberlin, two weeks later, made a greater distance in a non-stop flight just to prove that Lindbergh's feat was no piece of luck.

Lindbergh won the proud distinction of being the first to make a non-stop flight from the United States to a European capital. Chamberlin was second, but went farther, establishing a new non-stop distance record. Chamberlin several weeks ago established a new endurance record with the Bellanca monoplane Columbia, which he piloted to Germany, by remaining in the air fifty hours.

Though Chamberlin was disappointed, as he had planned to be the first to cross the Atlantic, there is honor enough to go around. For two Americans to establish the fact that airplanes can be successfully flown from the United States to Europe is more than a personal achievement; it is a national triumph which these two daring aviators will have to share with their country.

After Lindbergh's successful flight, the fact that immense seagoing planes are being constructed was revealed. Though minute details regarding the enterprise have not been given to the public, it now seems a safe venture that ocean travel by air from continent to continent will be well established within a few years.

To Lindbergh and Chamberlin much credit is due for their contributions to the cause of flying over water, but the pioneers of ocean air travel must not be forgotten—those who tried and failed or only partially succeeded—for their efforts helped to make possible the spectacular achievements of today.


