## City Council Meets with Greenbelt's Fiscal Agents

Tuesday of last week, the City Council met with Jack Morris, fiscal representative of the R. A. Underwood & Co. of Dallas, fiscal agents of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, to discuss the water rates of the water contract.

Morris presented three different suggested rates for the city to discuss, from which would come enough income to purchase the water from the Authority and retire the bonded debt now against the city's water system.

Although no definite rate structure was adopted Tuesday afternoon, councilmen were encouraged over the rate structure prospects. The proposed rates will be published at a later date.

In a survey of water users, it was found that more than 25 percent of the residents use only 2,000 gallons per month and 25 percent use only the minimum of 4,000 gallons.

The City of Crowell will appear before the State Water Commission in Austin on September 18 to present its reasons for being a member of the Greenbelt Authority.

## Water Hearing for Crowell to Be Held in Austin on September 18

The next step in the City of Crowell's attempt to become a member of the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority will take place in Austin, on Wednesday, Sept. 18. At that time, the Texas Water Commission will have a hearing at the Sam Houston State office building on the question of whether the City of Crowell would be benefited by the improvements, works, and facilities now owned or operated or contemplated to be owned or operated by the Green Belt Authority. All persons interested may appear at the hearing and offer evidence for or against the intended annexation.

It is also the intention of the Texas Water Commission to call an election to be held in the City of Crowell for the purpose of submitting the proposition of whether or not the all the territory now contained in the City of Crowell should be annexed to Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

## Time to Enlarge Ponds

Prolonged droughts prove the need for depth in livestock ponds. The average evaporation of a farm pond in this area is six to eight feet per year. The deeper the pond is, the better the grade of water is for livestock and fish. This year many shallow ponds have become stale and boggy, endangering livestock. Some are dry and many fish have died. This causes overuse of the pasture where water is available. If you have some shallow ponds that are dry, consult your local Soil Conservation Service personnel or local contractors and get an estimate of what it would cost to clean out and deepen your pond. The more water storage you have, the more security you have to remain in the cattle business.—by Ray Duckworth.

## Vehicle Inspection Stickers for 1964 Now Available

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced this week that the new 1964 vehicle inspection sticker became available Sept. 1 at all official inspection stations in Texas.

"During the summer months, the department has conducted in-

tensive re-training schools for owners and mechanics of inspection stations." Garrison said. "These men are now qualified to serve the public in their vehicle inspection needs."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected one of the 5,000 official stations between now and April 16, 1964. Operators of vehicles not displaying the new sticker by that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to have their vehicles inspected at earliest possible time and point out:

"Since the vehicle inspection program began in Texas, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle accidents has been reduced from 13 per cent in 1962 to five per cent in 1963. We have every reason to hope that a continued voluntary compliance with this law, accidents can be further reduced."

### ASC Committee Election Set

Farmers of Foard County are being urged to take part in the election of their local ASC community committee, which is scheduled for September 12. Ballots have been mailed to all known eligible voters. The present ASC county committee will tabulate the ballots and announce the results immediately.

An announcement by Ray Hysinger, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee Chairman, points out that this annual election is one in which all eligible farmers have an opportunity to select the best men available for this work as ASC committeemen. By doing this, they help assure good service to themselves and sound administration of ASCS farm programs in their community and county.

The ASC community committee to be elected consists of three regular members and two alternates. The chairman, vice chairman, and regular member of the elected committee will serve respectively as delegate, alternate delegate, and second alternate delegate to the county convention where the ASC county committee will be chosen.

A person may vote in the community election if he or she is of legal voting age, is a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper, and is taking part or is eligible to take part in one of the farm programs administered by the committee. Also eligible is a person not of legal voting age, but in charge of the farming operations on an entire farm. In the case of joint ownership by two or more individuals, each is an eligible voter.

There are some limitations on voting. If a voter has an interest in a farm, or farms, in more than one community in a county, he may select the community in which he wishes to vote, but the vote may be cast in only one community of the county. Voting by proxy is not allowable. In the case of partnership farms, the vote may be cast by either partner, and a corporation's vote may be cast by an authorized officer of the corporation.

Because of the vital part that the ASC community and county committees play in the farming affairs of the county, Chairman Hysinger said, it is important that each farmer give serious consideration to the men elected to these posts. It is highly desirable that the committeemen be currently active farmers who are best qualified for the committee work and who will be representatives of the various sections and types of agriculture in the community.

All information concerning the election on Sept. 12 may be obtained by contacting the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County office.

## Foundation for a Peaceful World

Lindbergh's historic 1927 Atlantic crossing took 33 hours and 39 minutes.

That seems almost a horse-and-buggy speed in the light of today's 600-mile-an-hour international jet transports—to say nothing of payload, comfort, safety and dependability. But we're still in aviation's infancy. A few years from now the New York-London time will be 2½ hours. Cruising speeds will be 1,500 miles an hour—far beyond the speed of sound.

This isn't a Jules Verne dream. Pan American World Airways has placed orders for such planes, named the Concorde, from a British-French combine. Pan Am will receive one of the first planes produced, and Air France and British Overseas Aircraft Corporation will receive the other two. This sequence will be continued until each line has six.

Moreover, when a U. S. company decides to produce a supersonic airliner, Pan Am plans to be first in line with an order. The potentialities inherent in progress of this kind stagger the mind—and they aren't confined to commercial matters. A fast-shrinking world means that nations are brought closer and closer together, and that the stage is set for people-to-people understanding and tolerance on a yet unrealized scale. This is the foundation on which a peaceful world can be built.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Texas' new Parks-Wildlife Commission has reclassified its personnel in keeping with the \$3,500,000 budget set by the Legislature. Reclassification will result in an additional \$10,000 in salary expenses. Commissioners voted to keep all personnel from the old Parks Board and the Game and Fish Commission on the payroll.

Howard Dodgen, former executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, will be retained as a consultant to the board until January.

Commission also approved Executive Director Weldon Watson's recommendation that the state parks system be managed through the five regional offices used by game officials. Regional headquarters are located in La Porte, Rockport, San Angelo, Tyler and Waco.

NEW TREND?—There seems to be a new trend toward refusing federal aid: The Irving School Board spurned an offer of an \$11,000 grant because "of the growing danger of federal control of the school curriculum."

But most school systems still accept educational assistance from the U. S. government. Texas Education Agency, looking at preliminary figures for the 1962-1963 school year, found \$33,700,000 was paid to Texas schools by federal programs.

In some cases, however, acceptance is selective: Both Houston and Dallas, which have local programs geared to prevent student drop-outs, refused cash grants for a similar federal program.

Houston and Dallas also are among the Texas towns which reject federal funds for school lunch programs. Others include Odessa, Goose Creek, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Henderson, Longview, Borger and Alvin.

U. S. AID—Abilene turned down a \$448,750 offer of aid for a \$3,000,000 sewer treatment plant from the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Federal grants for \$3,000,000 worth of sewer treatment improvements in Texas are recommended and administered by State Health Department officials. Funds refused by Abilene were distributed among the following towns: Fritch, Gonzales, Graford, Hidalgo, Markum, Mineral Wells, Richland Hills, Smiley, West Columbia and Windom.

TEXAS' TAX TAKE — Although the Lone Star State accepted less federal money than many other states during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, it received slightly more than it paid out, according to a survey by Congressional Quarterly.

Texans paid about 4.26 per cent of all taxes received by the federal government. It reaped 4.81 per cent of the \$110,000,000-plus federal grant total, or \$500,295,000.

National average of federal aid received was \$56 per capita. In Texas, the assistance averaged \$49 per citizen. Alaskans were high with a per capita average of \$226. Low was New Jersey with \$34 per capita.

Schools and sewage systems were just a few targets of federal aid. In fiscal 1962, this state received \$128,734,000 for highway construction; \$31,120,182 for unemployment insurance; \$62,832,854 for agricultural conservation; \$139,252,153 for welfare assistance, and \$13,350,583 for the national guard, as well as aid in other fields.

SALES TAX RECEIPTS SOAR — State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert announced that sales tax revenues for the fiscal year which ended on August 31 will exceed his expectations.

Earlier, Calvert predicted sales tax income for the state would total \$177,975,013. Now he says it will be \$2,141,429 more, or a total of \$180,116,442.

GAS BILLS VARY — A study of records, which the Texas Railroad Commission keeps on municipal gas rate structures, reveals a wide variance in gas rates across the state.

Lowest average year's bill paid by individual consumers in 1962, among the 22 cities on the commission list was \$41.50. It was paid by citizens of a Corpus Christi suburb.

Highest average annual gas bill was paid by residents of Dallas. One of the lowest average bills was that paid by Amarillo residents. Their average bill for the year was \$53.43.

LAWMAKERS' RETIREMENT PAY—Members of the House of Representatives who have served four two-year terms and state senators who have served two four-year terms, now are eligible for retirement pay under a new law, effective September 1.

When a legislator has completed eight years of service, he re-

ceives a \$100 a month retirement check. It increases \$10 a year as long as he remains in the Legislature.

LAND OFFICE RETURNS MONEY—Land Commissioner Fry Sadler has turned back to the State's General Revenue \$221,275 left over by the Land Office from its fiscal appropriation.

"Reasonable economy of operation," Sadler said, "made the fund possible."

AGRICULTURALISTS IN OPE—Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Sen. C. P. Geyer of El Campo, Dr. T. W. Bennett of Texas Tech and Dr. W. Brunsell, Belgium, to attend conference on agriculture.

Sen. Krueger is vice-chairman of the State Senate's agriculture committee.

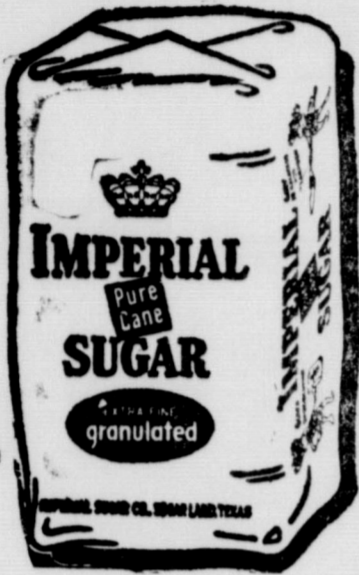
