

TOO MUCH CHICKEN

Our friend Ed Bomar over at Henrietta, a lifelong ranchman, thinks there is a little too much chicken in this country and urges the News to turn its attention to things more thrilling than chicken and jersey cow boosting. But he sends two bucks along anyway and says let 'er come on. This is his admonition: "Why don't you start some scandal, have some woman kill her husband and stir up something for your front page besides chickens. These chickens and Jersey cows in the next five years will have the beef interest killed. If you are hungry get a beefsteak and a cup of coffee. Milk and butter are the filthiest things there are to eat, and 65 per cent of the chickens hatched have T. B. Better let them go. Well send the paper anyway."

A few days ago a good friend of ours predicted a long dry spell. At the time the sky was cloudless and it was warm and pleasant. It has rained again. All prophecy of weather conditions in West Texas is a failure. Even the moon and stars indicate nothing as to weather here. All we ever know about it is what the past has been and what the present is. The ground is still full of water and it rains when it gets ready.

It has been figured out by actual test that it costs 9 cents per ton per mile to move freight by truck over a hard-surfaced road, while it costs 27 cents per ton per mile to move over the average dirt road. All the costs are taken into account, time, gas, oil, wear of machine. Pretty strong argument for hard-surfaced roads for home use. Another argument is that users of hard-surfaced roads are satisfied with them and prefer them at the cost of construction.

Crowell has reached a stage in its growth and development where there might be danger in some of holding our city property so high that outside capital would be turned aside and go to other towns for investment. No harm could be done in this matter if it merely turned aside those who might seek investments simply for future profits. But we believe we should invite investments that aim to help develop. Crowell is not on a boom and should not be unless conditions become such as to warrant it, and nobody is going to pay ridiculously high prices for lots on which to build.

MUSIC MEMORY NOTES

The following paragraph was clipped from an article, "an approach to musical appreciation" by Clifford Bloom, which appeared in the January number of "Better Homes and Gardens."

Confidence is the one big asset of the optimist. It is confidence that moves mountains, drives off fear and enlarges the vision of the future.

Without confidence, the whole business structure would fall. When people deposit money in the bank, they have confidence in the banker else they would keep their money hidden at home. When merchandise is sold, the purchaser believes that it is as represented, or he would buy elsewhere.

Swaim, that there be submitted to the qualified voters of said city who are property taxpayers therein, the following proposition upon the question of issuing Funding Bonds as hereinafter more fully set out, such election to be held on the 9th day of February, 1927. The motion was unanimously carried by the following vote:

Aldermen H. E. Ferguson, E. Swaim, L. A. Andrews, M. L. Hughton and J. C. Self voting "aye" and no one voting "no."

Thereupon the following election order was adopted:

It appearing that the City of Crowell has outstanding and unpaid warrant indebtedness, consisting of valid and legally binding obligations against the said city, in the amounts and the description hereinafter more fully set out, to-wit, as follows:

\$13,500 Warrants issued by the City of Crowell, dated September 1, 1924, in denomination of \$500.00 each and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

\$1,500.00 Warrants, Series B, issued by the City of Crowell, dated September 1, 1924, in denomination of \$500.00 each and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

\$34,000.00 City of Crowell Waterworks Extension Warrants, dated March 25, 1926, in denomination of \$1,000.00 each, and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

\$7,000 City of Crowell Funding Warrants, dated July 20, 1926, in denomination of \$1,000.00 each, and bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

Aggregating \$56,000.00.

Therefore, be it ordered by the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, that an election be held in the City of Crowell on the 9th day of February, 1927, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said city for their action thereupon.

Proposition

Shall the City Council of the City of Crowell, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Crowell, Texas, in the amount of \$56,000.00, maturing serially within forty years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 5 1/2 per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund with which to pay the principal at maturity, for the purpose of funding \$56,000.00 outstanding warrant

indebtedness existing against the City of Crowell, Texas, by cancelling the evidence thereof and issuing such bonds to the holders thereof, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925?

Said election shall be held in the City Hall building in said City of Crowell, and the following named persons are hereby appointed judges and clerks respectively, of said election:

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the manner of holding the same shall be governed by the general laws regulating general elections, so far as applicable, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers in said city shall be entitled to vote at said election.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue such bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the Issuance of Bonds," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the word "Against the Issuance of Bonds."

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary of the City of Crowell shall serve as a proper notice of said election; and the Mayor and City Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to cause such notice of election to be posted at the hereinbefore named polling place in said City of

Crowell for thirty full days prior to the date of such election and also in some newspaper of general circulation which has been regularly published in said city for at least one year before the date, which notice shall be published once each week for thirty full days before the date of said election, the date of the first publication thereof to be not less than thirty full days prior to the date of such election.

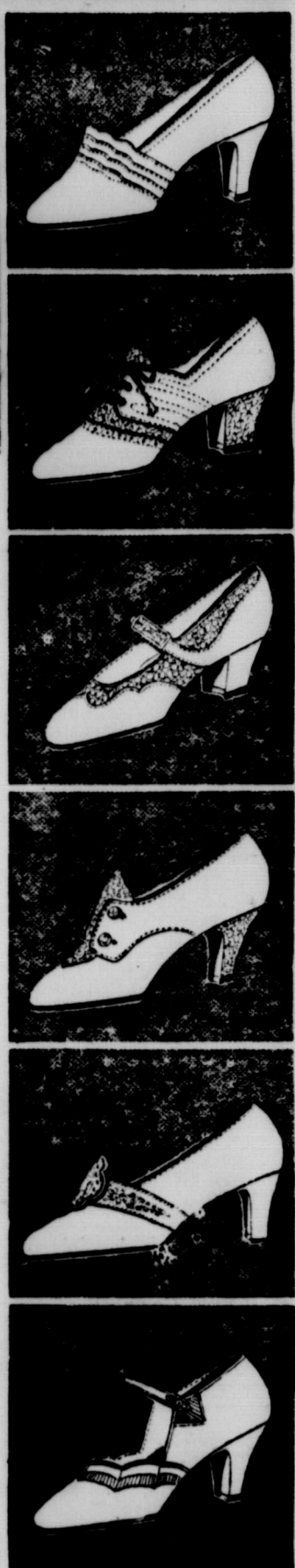

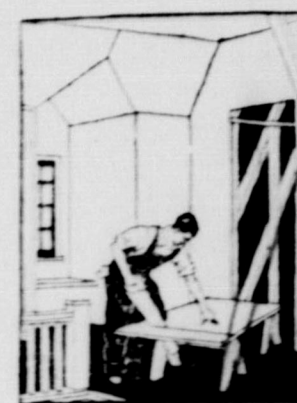
