We can be assured of an excellent administration of the pool, once it is completed. The City has leased it to the school, and the personnel available will give good discipline and well-trained supervisors that will insure safety. The pool will be modern in every respect which will provide all of the latest devices in making the pool clean.

Celebration for Women of Foard County on April 29

The Wesley campground, scene of the Foard County Federation of Women's Clubs' all-women's celebration, is approximately seven miles east and seven miles north of Crowell.

Two main routes to reach the Wesley grounds will be marked with red arrows. The first route will follow the U. S. Highway 70 east of Crowell to the county marker just north of the big barn on the Oneal Johnson farm. Turn north for about seven miles, then west for 1.4 mile and north again to the Pease River battlefield monument directly in front of the George Wesley home. Drive in just east of the house and follow a private road to the campground just north of the house.

The second route is by farm road 98 to the town of Margaret, then on north, following the railroad until in sight of the Crowell water works pumps and reservoir. Turn east and cross the railroad tracks. In front of the Ab Dunn home, turn south to the marker at "Old" Margaret. Then drive directly east to the Pease River battlefield marker, known locally as the "Cynthia Ann Parker monument" and turn north onto the private road mentioned above.

All Foard County women are urged to attend this "dinner on the ground" meeting which begins at 10:30 a. m. Friday, April 29.

Methodist Pastor to Attend Conference in Memphis, Tenn.

Rev. Grady Adcock, pastor of the Crowell Methodist Church, will be one of 14 representatives of Texas Methodist Churches' representatives at the denomination's biennial conference on ministerial pensions, April 26-27 in Memphis, Tenn.

First and Second Grade Children of Crowell and Thalia Schools and Negro School Given Polio Vaccination April 20

Plans for a community polio vaccination program, which have been underway for many weeks, were scheduled to go into action Wednesday in Foard County. At that time Dr. M. M. Kralicke and his assistants were to give the first shots of a series required for protection against paralytic polio to about 150 first- and second-graders whose parents have requested the inoculation. These shots were given at the Crowell and Thalia grade schools, including the colored school.

Vaccine for this program, which is being operated by state and local health officials, is being supplied by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Sheriff Sherman McBeath made a trip to Austin Tuesday to pick up the vaccine. At the same time, physicians will be making arrangements for the vaccination of children not included in this program, using vaccine purchased through usual channels. Vaccination in both instances is entirely voluntary.

Red Cross Quota Still Short \$38.31

Since the paper was published last week, the treasurer of the Foard County Red Cross annual drive, Miss Margaret Curtis, has received two \$5.00 contributions. This leaves a balance of \$38.31 of the county's quota of \$1,335.00.

Nearing Time to
 Control Mesquite
 More rain is needed in the
 Texas mesquite country this spring
 for aerial applications of herbi-
 cides to give good kills of mes-
 quite.
 Without proper soil moisture,
 the use of aerial sprays may be
 disappointing, says Joe Burkett,
 County Agent, adding that large
 kills also rest heavily upon time-
 liness of application. Spray mes-
 quite when the plants are in full-
 leaf, usually 50 to 80 days after
 leaves appear in the spring, he
 explains.
 Burkett recommends use of
 either a low volatile ester of
 2,4,5-T, or silvex, at rates of one-
 half to two-thirds of a pound in
 one gallon of diesel oil and three

gallons of water to an acre.
 Aerial herbicidal sprays usually
 are the cheapest form of mesquite
 control. But once the brush is
 gone, the job isn't done. Burkett
 says if the permanent benefits of
 brush control are to be realized,
 deferred grazing and proper
 stocking of livestock is essential.
 More information on the chemi-
 cal control of mesquite is contain-
 ed in bulletin L-127 revised
 "Chemical Control of Mesquite."
 This publication is available from
 the County Agent's office.

New Non-Shattering Sesame Variety Ready

Rio, a new non-shattering variety of sesame described as "completely adapted to mechanical harvesting" soon will be available to farmers, says Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Released jointly by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Rio is now in the hands of certified growers and seed in quantity should be available for planting this fall.

Rio is better adapted to Texas growing conditions than other strains of non-shattering sesame but is expected to serve only until still better varieties are developed in an extensive sesame breeding program, say experiment station researchers.

Rio can be cut with a wind- rower, allowed to dry and then combined directly from the wind- row.

Seed yields in experimental plantings at College Station have ranged up to 1,489 an acre under favorable growing conditions. It produces slightly higher yield under favorable conditions and lower yields under poor conditions than the shattering types. It also matures later than the shattering varieties now grown in Texas.

At some locations, the new variety has been resistant to Alternaria leaf spot but it shows no resistance to bacterial leaf spot.

The oil content of Rio is acceptable to the oilseed processing industry, averaging about 49 per cent. The crude protein content of the meal also is favorable. Meal remaining after oil extraction averages approximately 55 per cent crude protein.

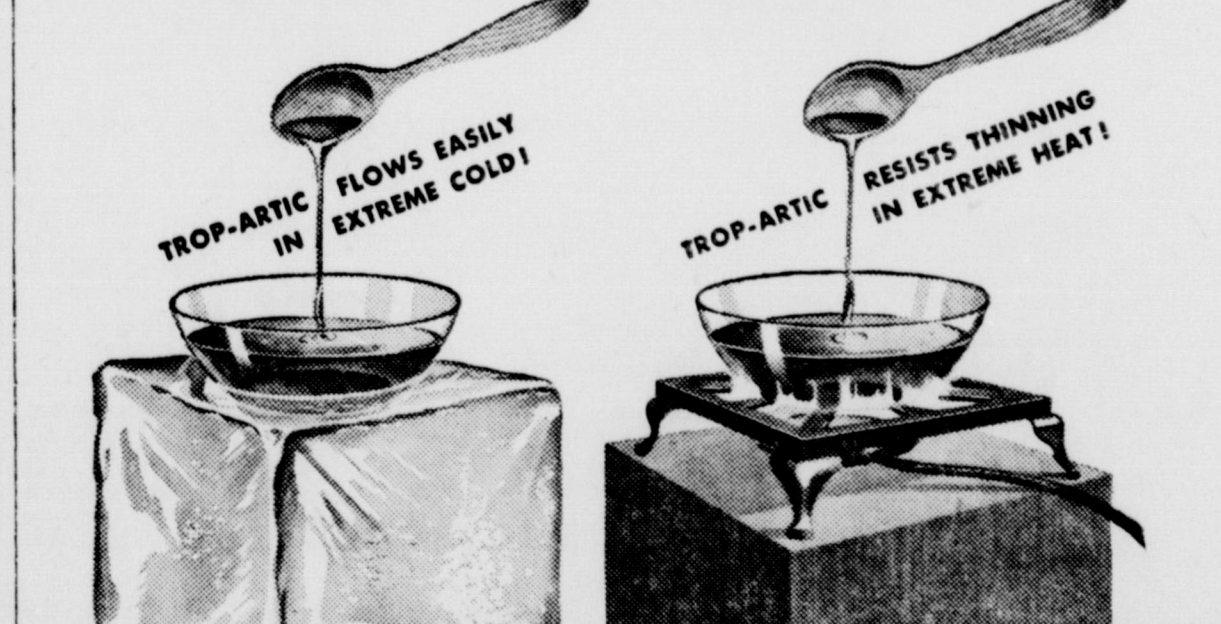

New Non-Shattering Sesame Variety Ready

Rio, a new non-shattering variety of sesame described as "completely adapted to mechanical harvesting" soon will be available to farmers, says Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Released jointly by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Rio is now in the hands of certified growers and seed in quantity should be available for

planting this fall. Rio is better adapted to Texas growing conditions than other strains of non-shattering sesame but is expected to serve only until still better varieties are developed in an extensive sesame breeding program, say experiment station researchers.

At some locations, the new variety has been resistant to Alternaria leaf spot but it shows no resistance to bacterial leaf spot.

The oil content of Rio is acceptable to the oilseed processing industry, averaging about 49 percent. The crude protein content of the meal also is favorable. Meal remaining after oil extraction averages approximately 55 percent crude protein.

Seed yields in experimental plantings at College Station have ranged up to 1,489 an acre under favorable growing conditions. It produces slightly higher yields under favorable conditions and lower yields under poor conditions than the shattering types. It also matures later than the shattering varieties now grown in Texas.

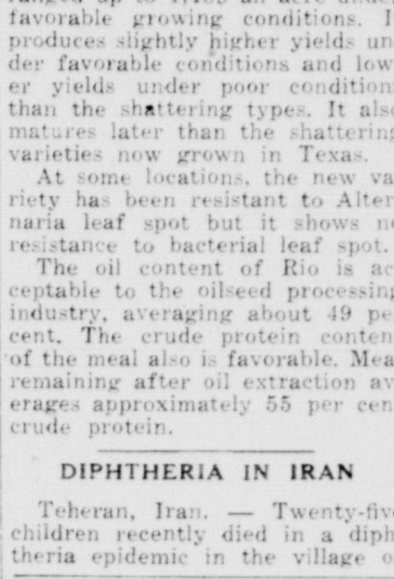

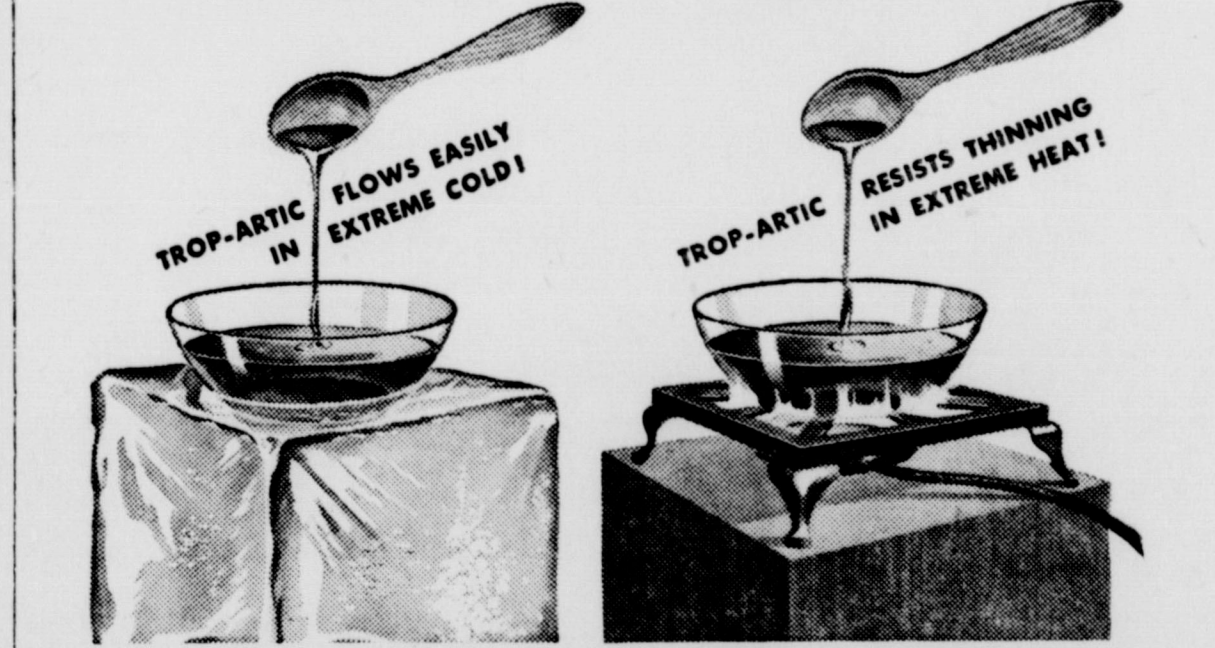

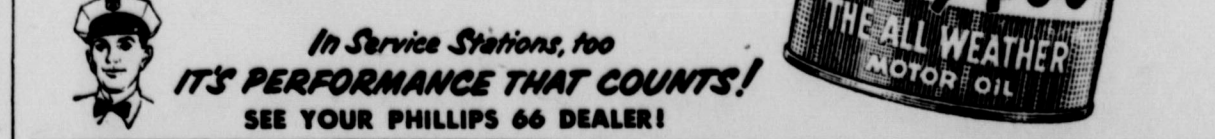
