Wheat Referendum Election Carries by Vote of 239 to 20

In the wheat referendum election held in Foard County last Saturday, June 25, marketing quotas were approved by an overwhelming majority, 239 for and 20 against.

Since two-thirds of the nation's wheat growers voting in the referendum approved, marketing quotas will continue in effect for the 1955 crop, and price support of 75 per cent of parity will be available to those who stay within the wheat acreage allotment for their farms.

Had more than one-third voted disapproval, marketing quotas would not be in effect and price support would have been available at 50 per cent of parity for those farmers who stayed within the wheat acreage allotment for their farms.

Prospects for Two Good Wells Stir Oil Interest

Oil activity in Foard County reached a feverish stage this week as hundreds of acres of land have been leased and royalty has sold for a high price.

It is reported that the initial gauge on the Lucerne Corporation, Dilworth Hager and Magnolia Petroleum No. 1 Maude E. Rasberry Caddo discovery, nine miles northwest of Crowell, flowed 137 barrels per day through 17-64 inch choke from 6,137-60 feet. It is producing from open hole and the production is expected to increase to at least 150 barrels per day.

Although no information is available, the Panhandle Oil Co. Effie Bell No. 1, about six miles south of Crowell, is reported to be a good well and has caused much of the leasing activity that has been in progress here this week. It is expected that this well will be brought in within the next day or two.

Fletcher Oil & Gas Drilling Corporation has staked the No. 1 M. L. Hughton as a 7,000-foot Knox County wildcat test, 1 1/2 miles southwest of Truscott. Drilling operations have already started.

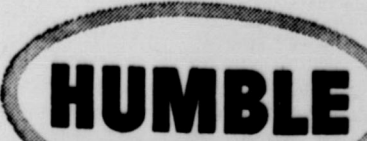

Texas Tech Has Two "Tons of Gold" Stored in Campus Dairy Barn

Texas Tech has two tons of gold stored in its dairy barn, and both tons give milk.

They are, by name, Tech's Sparkling Signal and Tech's Welcome Bilmack, both of whom received "ton of gold" certificates this week from the American Jersey Cattle Club of Columbus, O., for having produced more than one ton of butterfat in a period of four consecutive years.

Tech's Sparkling Signal and Tech's Welcome Bilmack are the first two Tech cows to receive the "ton of gold" certificate, according to Dean W. L. Stangel of the Division of Agriculture.

During the four-year period, Tech's Sparkling Signal produced 38,204 pounds of milk with a butterfat yield of 2,232 pounds. Tech's Welcome Bilmack, during the same period, gave 35,883 pounds of milk with a content of 2,168 pounds of butterfat.

Both cows are native Texans, having been born on the College farms. Signal was born in September, 1947, and Bilmack in November, 1948. They have been kept with the Tech dairy herd since their birth and have had no special care or extra feed. Both cows were milked by machines operated by Tech students.

According to the Herd Improvement Registry Test, which supervises the production records, Signal is classified as "excellent," the best rating given. Welcome Bilmack is classified as "very good," the second highest rating given by the registry.

Guardian of Tech's two tons of gold is W. T. Hayden, dairy herdsman for the College since 1950.

Farm and Ranch Real Estate Taxes Continue Upward Trend

Real estate taxes on farms and ranches in Texas were 3.2 per cent higher in 1954 than in 1953—the eighth straight year of increase.

The average tax per acre for the state in 1954 was 28.8 cents compared with 27.9 cents the previous year, according to L. P. Gabbard, agricultural economist at Texas A&M College.

While this slight increase was taking place in taxes, agricultural prices in Texas declined. The price index of agricultural commodities in the state dropped from 273 in 1953 to 265 in 1954. The change in the tax-price ratio was from 1.14 in '53 to 1.21 in '54—a relative increase in tax burden of

slightly more than six per cent.

"In other words, it took six per cent more farm commodities to pay taxes last year than it did the previous year," Gabbard said. The tax burden has increased 57 per cent during the four year period 1951-1954.

Gabbard cited a high degree of variation in real estate taxes among type-of-farming areas and from one year to another in the same area. In 1954 the average tax per acre in the irrigated Upper Rio Grande Valley was \$4.55 while in the High Plains and Trans-Pecos areas adjoining, it was six cents an acre.

The economists found that taxes declined 10 per cent in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and increased 16.6 per cent in the Coastal Prairie area in 1954 compared with 1953. Variations among counties were even greater.

New Sanitation Standards on Wheat

Farmers who put wheat under the 1955 price support program must be prepared to meet more specific standards of grain sanitation.

Under the revised program of the Food and Drug administration, wheat does not meet the minimum requirements for food if it contains more than two rosette pellets per pint, or comparable amounts of contamination, or contains two per cent or more, by weight, of kernels visibly damaged by insects. Wheat not meeting these standards must be disposed of for non-food uses.

The same program based on minimum sanitation standards was in effect several years ago. Most of the wheat that leaves Texas farms is clean grain—well above these standards, W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, points out. The trouble lies with a relatively few exceptions, resulting from careless handling and storage.

Farm stored wheat offered as security for price-support loans will be sample-tested at regular intervals and at time of delivery to the CCC. Except for the question of resale eligibility, the new requirements do not apply to

"Keep Off the Gas—Slow Down and Live!"

"Keep off the gas—slow down and live!"

This life-saving advice was given to drivers this week by E. C. McFadden of Dallas, vice president of Employers' Casualty Co. and president, Texas Safety Association, Inc., which is sponsoring this month's speed control program in cooperation with the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"The thrill that speed-minded motorists get out of demonstrating the speed potential of their cars is short lived—and so, frequently, are they," Mr. McFadden warned. "Excessive speed is often a short cut to eternity!"

In 1953, nearly three out of 10 drivers in fatal accidents were violating a speed law at the time of the accident, Mr. McFadden said.

He listed three of the main dangers of driving at a speed too fast for conditions as follows:

1. If an emergency arises when you're driving at higher speeds, you have less time in which to

act to avoid an accident.

2. As speed increases, braking distance increases at a greater rate. When you double your speed, you quadruple your braking distance. Average brakes can stop a car within 21 feet at 20 miles an hour, but it takes 84 feet to bring a car to a stop at 40 miles an hour.

"All of which proves," Mr. McFadden concluded, "that it's a good policy to make haste slowly on the highway. Let the other fellow be a Hurry Bug. Slow down and you'll live longer."

Air Bases Bring Business to Nearby Communities

550 Texans to Be Drafted in August

A Texas draft induction call for 55 men for August was announced this week by Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy director of state Selective Service.

The call, Texas' share of a national call for 10,000 men, is identical with the quota for July. Quotas have maintained an almost constant level for several months.

Local board quotas for August induction into the Army will be mailed about July 5 or 6.

There will be no physical-mental examinations of men for military service through the draft boards in August, except in isolated cases, Colonel Schwartz said.

With the exception of volunteers, the August induction call will be filled only with men who on August 1 are at least 21 years of age, said the deputy state Selective Service director.

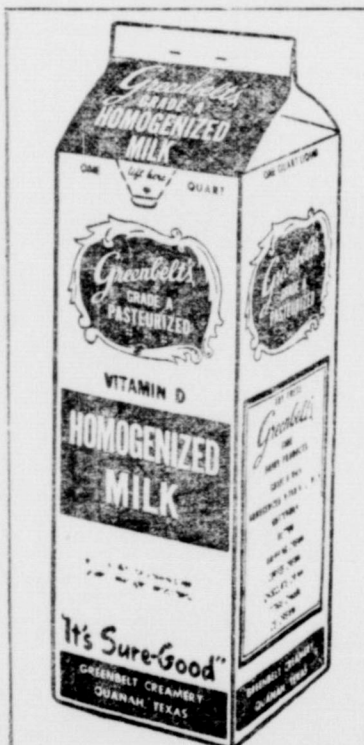

News from the Congress

by Congressman Frank Ikard

The announcement by Secretary of Defense Wilson that E. B. Anderson would resign as deputy Secretary of Defense within the next few months was generally received with a feeling of deep regret by everyone here in Washington. Anderson did an outstanding job as Secretary of the Navy and more recently as the number two man in the Defense Department has come to be recognized as one of the finest administrators in the country. There is no one in the present Administration more generally respected for his ability, integrity and intelligence than Anderson. His leaving public service will be a great loss to the country.

If the Congress is to adjourn by August 1, July must necessarily be a very busy month or there are many important pieces of legislation that have to be acted on before adjournment. The following list will give you some idea of the work yet to be done by this session of Congress.

The adoption of the Federal Highway Program must yet be considered, but a bill has not been reported by the House committee. The Committee on Ways and Means is at this time considering possible changes in Social Security. The hearings have not concluded on this measure.

The Secretary of the Treasury has asked that the increased national debt limit be extended for one more year. Of course, this will require congressional action. The President has insisted that

we revive the Armed Services Reserve Bill which was killed in the House and sent back to committee several weeks ago.

The Education and Labor Committee is presently holding hearings on the possibility of increasing the minimum wage and has not reported a bill as yet.

The amendments to the National Gas Act, which are of utmost importance to all of us from Texas, will have to be acted on by both the House and Senate.

Because the first two or three months of any session of Congress are spent with the committees holding hearings on proposed legislation, nearly always measures to be acted upon stack up at the end of a session to where it is usually a safe bet that Congress actually will adjourn about

two or three weeks after the date that is announced. It is therefore, that the safest speculation on adjournment would be nearer August 15 than August 1.
