**Quanah Voted
Hardeman County
Seat 73 Years Ago**

February 7 marked the 73rd anniversary of the election which made Quanah the county seat of Hardeman County in 1890.

The petition ordering the election caused hard feelings among the residents of Margaret, the county seat; resignation of a judge and an influx in the laundry business in Quanah.

The story of the election is told in a history compiled by former Hardeman County School Superintendent J. Paul Jones.

He tells of the feeling in Quanah that it should be the county seat because of its location on the new Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, while Margaret was 20 miles south of the rail line and across the Pease River.

In December, 1889, a petition was presented to the County Commissioners and an election ordered to allow Hardeman County residents to choose between the two towns. Mr. Jones' history relates some amusing incidents of the pre-election campaign.

There were not many qualified voters in Quanah, but the law as construed then, held that a man was a citizen of a town if he "had his washing done" there for six consecutive weeks. Consequently, the laundry business flourished in Quanah during the six weeks before election date, Feb. 7, 1890.

The Jones account adds that "every employe of the Fort Worth and Denver from Fort Worth to Texline qualified as a citizen of Quanah by election day," also that the three saloons in Quanah kept open house and offered free drinks all day to those who "voted right."

Residents of Margaret did not accept quietly the call for an election. County Judge J. J. Combes issued the election order, and Margaret citizens immediately asked an order to remove him from office and arrest him. Their plan was to depose him in open court and have appointed a successor who would oppose Quanah's bid.

District Judge G. A. Brown of Vernon granted the order, but the men who went to arrest Judge Combes were reported to have become drunk and talked of their mission, so Quanah residents were warned.

Riders from Quanah summoned the County Commissioners, who on Jan. 11 convened in Margaret. Judge Combes resigned and T. H. Faulkner was appointed in his place by the commissioners. The election went on as scheduled.

Commissioners court records of Feb. 10, 1890, state that 688 votes were cast for Quanah, 164 for Margaret, and one for Chillicothe.

Transfer of the county records, in two fireproof safes, was not made without animosity, and ill feeling between factions in the two towns continued for years. People at Margaret talked for a while of illegal voting in Quanah, but the election results were finally taken for granted.

Perhaps the feeling died sooner because Margaret did not long remain in Hardeman County; in 1891, the Texas Legislature created Foard County and it included the area south of Pease River which had formerly been in Hardeman County.

**Fewer Grasshoppers
Expected in 1963**

Grasshopper infestations in the Western and Midwestern states may be much lighter in 1963 than last year, according to a report of the USDA.

The report says the 16 range states surveyed had a total of 7.8 million acres of infested rangeland last fall as compared to 13.5 million acres a year earlier. The USDA's Agricultural Research Service, which conducted the surveys in cooperation with the states, considers an infested acre one that has a population of eight or more adult grasshoppers per square yard. Infested acreage in Texas was listed as just over 67,000 acres. In 1961 the acreage exceeded a half million acres.

Last year's cold, moist spring along with an unusually wet summer is given credit for reducing the grasshopper population, the USDA says. In spite of good prospects for fewer grasshoppers this year, ARS encourages ranchers to continue control measures against this pest.

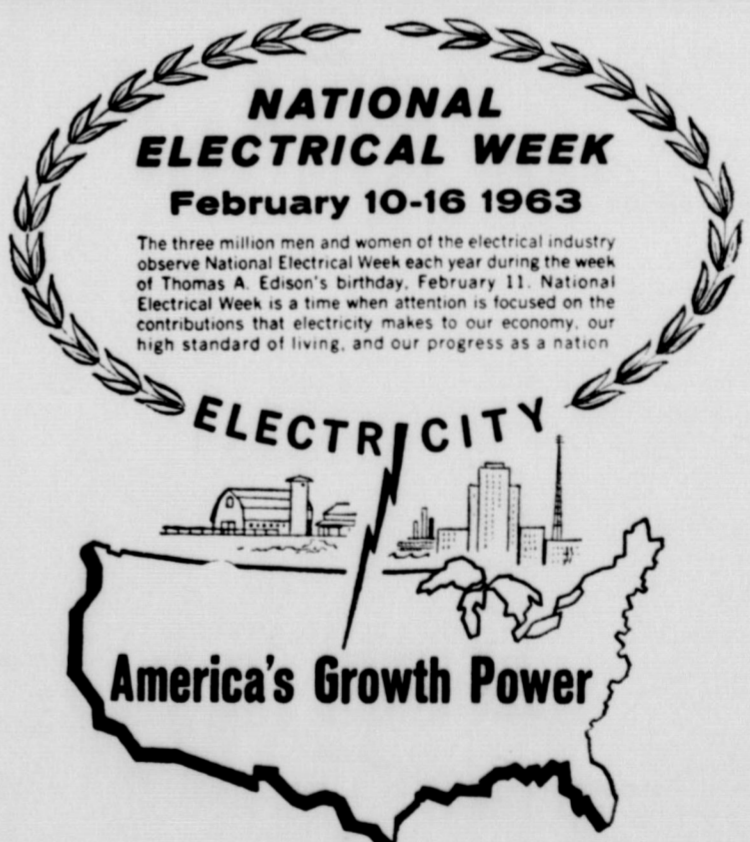

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Friday, Feb. 17, 1933, issue of The Foard County News:

Roy Barry, formerly of Crowell, is performing in sensational style for the Oklahoma City polo club.

President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt escaped without injury and Anton Cermak, mayor of Chicago, was seriously wounded, probably fatally, when a gunman fired a stream of bullets into the Roosevelt party at Miami, Florida, Wednesday night.

The local office of the Texas Natural Gas Co. was moved this week to the brick building just north of The Foard County News.

Twenty-six victories and no losses—that's the record of the Crowell Wildcats at the present time. This is the largest string of consecutive victories ever scored in Crowell history and definitely brands the local quintet as the outstanding team in this section of Texas and southern Oklahoma.

Born to Mr. and Mrs. Bob Abston Friday, Feb. 10, a girl, Bobbie Ruth.

A truck of the State Highway Department, carrying a large magnet, has been at work on the highways of Foard County this week. It was at work in Crowell Thursday picking up nails and other metal objects on local streets.

William Wisdom scored Crowell's 1,000th point for this basketball season with a field goal late in the game at Wichita Falls Saturday night. The counter at that period of the game brought Crowell's score to 38. Naturally, William, nor any of the other Wildcats, realized this at the time and they calmly went about scoring 11 more points before the game was over.

The Spring Lake Country Club of Crowell has been included in the membership of the Texas-Oklahoma Golf Association, which was organized at Vernon last week. Electra, Vernon and Frederick, Okla., are the other members of the organization at present.

The first annual conference of the 13th District of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers will be held in Crowell on April 11 and 12.

A cured and canned meats show together with a 4-H baby beef show will be held in Crowell Friday and Saturday.

For the fifth consecutive year, Crowell has been named by Texas Interscholastic League officials as the site for the one-act play tournament of District No. 3.

"Grand Hotel," starring Greta Garbo, John Barrymore, Joan Crawford, Lewis Stone, Jean Hersholt and others will be shown at the Rialto Theatre next week.

Robert G. Dunlop, President of Sun Oil Company, says "Investment in the U. S. economy has failed for the past ten years to keep up with the expansion of population."

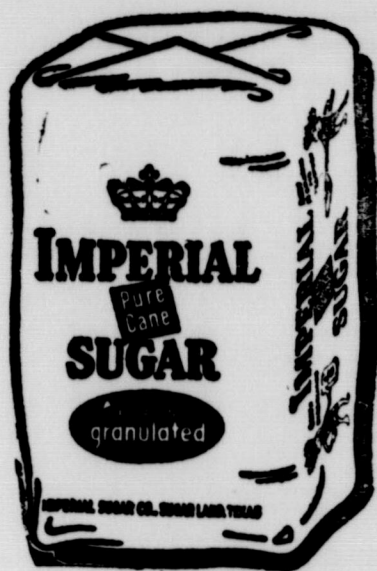

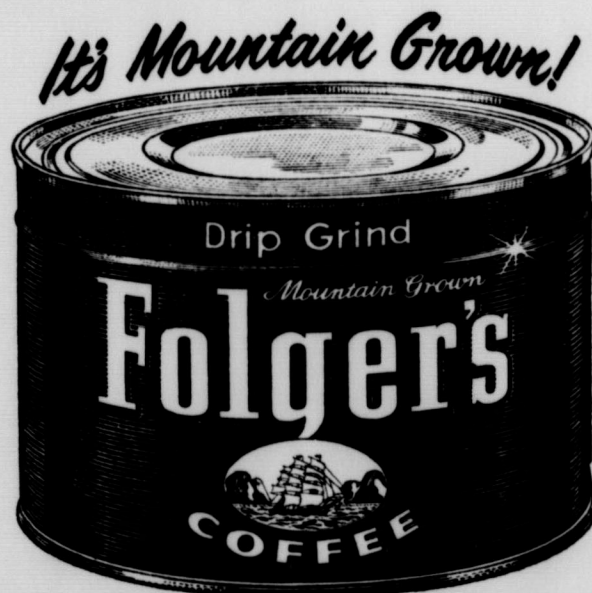
