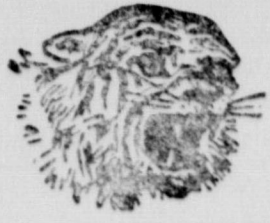
Funeral services will be held this morning (Thursday) in the First Methodist Church in Vernon with Rev. H. Doyle Ragle, pastor, officiating.

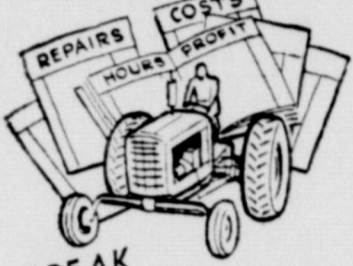

April Draft Calls for 244 Men

The state quota for Texas draft board in April calls for 244 men. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced last Friday.

The state's April call of 244 compares with a quota of 228 for March and 296 for February. The April call is the state's share of a national quota of 6,000 men, all for the Army.

Col. Schwartz also announced that local boards would send no men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in April.

Local board quotas for the April call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The April quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on April 1 with the exception of volunteers, or those termed officially delinquent under the law, who may be younger.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Tex. — Although the Texas Youth Council lost its fight for a legislative appropriation of \$100,000 to add more officers to its Juvenile Parole System, it just won a battle for the benefit of orphans in state institutions.

Attorney General Will Wilson turned over the deed to a \$200,000 Bell County ranch along with a check for \$12,446 to Dr. James A. Turman, Youth Council director. Presentation represented the outcome of a four-year court battle. Heirs of the late Mrs. Fannie Haynes contested her passing the property to the state.

Dr. Turman said the orphans of Texas will receive all benefits from the 4,160-acre ranch on the Lampasas river. It will be used as a summer camp and activity center for orphan's homes. Youth Council will raise cattle, pigs and sheep there to help feed the thousands of children in its care.

HEARINGS SHOCK TURMAN — Speaker of the House James A. Turman, candidate for lieutenant governor and former educator, expressed concern about the House Textbook committee, which he appointed.

Turman was shocked when he heard that a witness in an Amalillo textbook hearing alleged that Rep. Ronald Roberts of the committee was a "communist."

"I am afraid the committee members have been too nice and open about letting anyone appear to talk about any sort of censorship," Turman said. He is worried about the committee setting too far astray of its goal of studying the textbook situation in Texas.

In an Independence Day address at Washington-on-the-Brazos, he advocated the teaching of Texas history in all grade levels, and declared, "I think it is a mistake—a sad mistake—for our educational system in Texas to relegate our great state's history into a sort of grammar school fairy-tale."

The speaker may be tempted—or forced—to touch on the subject again Wednesday when he is

Two Minutes With the Bible

Until When?

One of the greatest prophecies of Scripture is found in Psalm 110, where David wrote: "The Lord said unto my Lord, Sit Thou at My right hand until I make Thine enemies Thy footstool."

In Matt. 22:41-46 our Lord explained that this was a prophecy about Himself, David's Son and Lord. Men might hate Him and cry "Away with Him!" They might nail Him to a tree and laugh and sneer at Him, but God the Father would respond by saying: "Here, come sit at My right hand until I make your enemies your footstool."

We should never forget that according to Bible prophecy God's response to man's rejection of Christ was to be judgment and wrath. In Psalm 2, the question is asked, why do the nations rage and the people imagine a vain thing—that they can get along without the One whom God has appointed to be King. The Psalm depicts God laughing at their attempt to thwart His purposes and predicts that "the Lord shall have them in derision" and "speak unto them in His wrath."

At Pentecost all was ready for the judgment to fall. Christ had been crucified and "the last days" had begun as Peter declared in Acts, 2:16, 17, quoting from the prophet Joel. But strangely, while some of Joel's prophecy was fulfilled, or began to be fulfilled at that time, the rest of it was not for God did not—and has not yet—sent the prophesied judgment.

Thank God, in infinite grace He interrupted the prophetic program, delayed the remainder of its fulfillment and revealed to the Apostle Paul His secret purpose to offer to His enemies everywhere free grace, through faith in the crucified, risen Savior.

In His Ephesian letter the apostle asks whether they have heard of "the dispensation of the grace of God, which is given me to you forward; how that by revelation He made known unto me the mystery" (Eph. 3:1-3). Now, thank God, His eternal purpose in Christ is no longer a secret. While the day of grace lasts we may be "justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

Survey Being Made on Areas Needing Quail After Carla

Surveys now are being made in the coastal areas hit by Carla last September, in an effort to determine quail losses. Following this, a restocking of quail from the Tyler State Game Farm will begin as soon as mature birds are available, according to W. J. Cutbirth Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

In many areas along the middle and upper coast of Texas, quail were annihilated during the Carla disturbance last year. Some landowners have reported a few birds migrating into the area, but generally the breeding stock is very low, according to the reports. A check is now being made of these areas. They will be restocked with birds from the hatchery on a no-cost basis, in those areas where the need is shown.

In other areas, individuals desiring quail for restocking now can file their application with the Game and Fish Commission. Birds will be available for this purpose at 50c each, which is approximately half the cost of production, according to Cutbirth.

When applications are filed, the area is inspected by Game Department personnel as to availability of food and cover. If these two items are found ample, authorization then is issued for the purchase of quail for restocking purposes. These applications should be sent directly to the Game and Fish Commission in Austin.

Some quail also will be available without charge this year for restocking by 4-H and FFA Clubs, under a program recently adopted by the Game and Fish Commission.

'Temporary' Is Much-Abused Word

"Of the many fine words whose meaning has been perverted by the political stresses of our times, surely one of the most abused is 'temporary'—especially in the field of public finance. When it comes to taxes, most of us have become calloused to this misuse. We have 'temporary' taxes dating back to World War II and beyond, and few are naive enough to believe that any relief from them is in the offing."—Bedford, Va., Bulletin-Democrat.

Teachers Find Retarded Eager

Patience, love and understanding plus reading, writing, arithmetic are paying big dividends in the education of 43 children currently enrolled in "special education" classes in Richardson.

Started three years ago, this school within a school offers maximum specialized instruction for retarded children—both trainable and educable.

Much credit for the success of these classes goes to Mrs. Jo Hitt who began the first class in Richardson in 1959 with eight students. Prior to that time, the Richardson schools had been sending students in need of such instruction to special classes at Highland Park and private schools in Dallas.

5 More Teachers

Mrs. Hitt explained that since five additional teachers have been employed, they have 29 students. Mrs. Hitt said that the teachers recognize that these children need a great deal of love as well as work. All phases of academic work are offered on a set schedule to those children who are educable. They are started at the age level they are on and progress according to their ability.

Morning subjects include academic subjects and language development with time out for play and a milk-break. After lunch, teachers offer arts, crafts, and music.

"Most of the children have an IQ of less than 70," Mrs. Hitt said. "When taken out of the frustration of trying to keep up with regular classes, these students find they can function better and can compete with each other in these special classes. The children know their limitations, and it is remarkable what a little patience will

do."

"We look at the child first, and not at his handicap," Mrs. Hitt stressed.

Classes are divided into two sections, trainable children with IQs of 35 to 50, and educable children with an IQ from 50 to 70. Each section is divided into two groups according to chronological ages; primary, ages 6 to 9; intermediates 10 to 17.

Psychologist Aids

Recently a Denton psychologist gave his services free of charge to work with parents of these children to help them understand how they can help. Tests were also given to some of the children.

Mrs. Hitt feels that these special education classes have an important role to play in the educational field. "They are rather new all over Texas," she said, "but I feel there is a great deal of hope for us. People are beginning to accept us and as a whole they are in favor of special education. Some families have moved to the Richardson school district just to get this training for their children."

Mrs. Hitt commented that all the special education teachers formerly taught in regular classes but now prefer to work with these exceptional children. "We find it very rewarding and very challenging," she continued.

Other Fields

In addition to this work with retarded children, the Special Education Department offers services in three other fields. Three speech therapists work with a total of 240 children in the various public schools. Just two months ago, the school district employed its first teacher for home-bound students. Two deaf children are being sent into Dallas for special classes at the Stonewall Jackson School. This is part of a county-wide program set up by the state legislature last fall.

Lake Lowering Not Practical in Texas Area

Lowering of lake levels in Texas in a fight on trash fish is an impractical proposition because of insufficient water for necessary refill, according to Marion Toole, inland fisheries coordinator.

He points out that in many states the water level can be lowered several times during the spring month, exposing carp and burrito spawn to sun. This would kill the eggs and prevent heavy spawns of rough fish.

Carp spawn on submerged aquatic vegetation. A drawdown of about four feet is required for each spawning period to expose the adhesive eggs attached to the vegetation. Since carp spawn during a season of about five weeks, a drawdown of about 20 feet would be required to eradicate most of the spawn.

Since the refilling of Texas lakes is uncertain because of lack of rain, this might prove very disastrous. The agencies operating the Texas reservoirs refuse to permit this type of management.

Quite a few of the lakes are down considerably anyway because of drawdown for irrigation and power generation. In Austin, Lake Austin has been dropped 12 feet to permit the annual cleanup of the lake and work by adjacent landowners in preparing docks and boating facilities.

Lake Austin then will be refilled from Lake Travis, which in turn gets its water from other lakes on the Highland Lake chain.

Another benefit in lowering the water level of the lake is the aeration of the exposed portions of the lake bottom, which tends to increase food production for the fish, according to Toole.

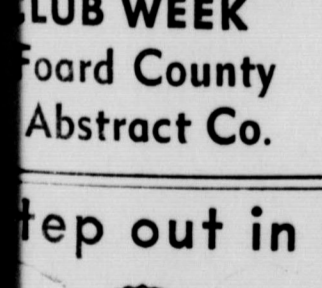

George Moffett Makes Statement Relative to Race

George Moffett of Chillicothe, Wednesday released his formal announcement for re-election to the State Senate from the 23rd District, composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties.
In his statement Senator Moffett points out that he was the sole author of Senate Bill 6 (60th Legislature) which made Midwestern University at Wichita Falls a state school.
"Education is the foundation for progress, and in the years to come Senate Bill 6, probably will mean more to this entire area than any bill ever passed by the Texas Legislature," said the Senator.
As a leader in agricultural legislation he has introduced and passed a dozen bills helpful to farmers and livestock producers, and will bring better food products to consumers. He vigorously sponsors scientific research to discover new uses for cotton. He states, "The best long range solution for the cotton surplus problem is to find more ways to consume it. Texas is making more progress in this field than any other state."
Senator Moffett was joint author of the bill at the last session to place the construction and maintenance of both the state's main highway and farm road systems on a sounder financial basis.
His statement mentions that he has never sponsored a tax bill, and has supported revenue measures only when there was a real need for more funds to support the state's hospitals, highways, public schools, colleges, old age assistance, and other justifiable purposes. He favors amending the new sales tax law for smoother and more convenient operation.
Moffett also emphasizes that Texas has better roads with a 5c state gasoline tax than any neighboring state, even though they have either a 6c, 6 1/2c or 7c state tax on gasoline. He calls attention to the fact that Texas has no state income tax while all adjoining states do have. He is opposed to such a tax.
He cites reliable figures which show that the total taxes collected per person, per year in Texas, are lower than in any neighboring state. The figures are: Louisiana \$140.00; New Mexico \$130; Oklahoma \$122; Arkansas \$92; and Texas \$84, which is the lowest average tax collected per person per year, in any of the above states.
He favors correcting the auto insurance merit plan.
He is opposed to race track gambling.
Senator Moffett is a life-long resident of this senatorial district and a life-long Democrat. In his legislative races he has always received over 85 per cent of the votes in his home county. He further states:
"I deeply appreciate the favorable consideration of the voters in previous elections. I sincerely desire to serve you again and respectfully solicit your vote in the Democratic Primary on May 5, 1962."

A. E. Wells, superintendent of Abilene Public Schools, is president of the district. Other officers are Keith Swin of Iowa Park, vice president; Robert King of Haskell, secretary; and Johnnie Mae Long of Wichita Falls, treasurer.
The convention will begin at 7 p. m. Thursday, March 8, with a dinner meeting of the House of Delegates at Abilene High School cafeteria.

Bank Official Praises Agricultural Contributions

Farmers and ranchers were urged last week to be proud of their profession and of the contributions they are making to the nation's economy, at the 28th annual stockholders' meeting of the Memphis Production Credit Association, held Friday in the Childrens City Auditorium.
W. H. Calkins, vice president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, told the 400 stockholders and guests of the agricultural credit organization that less than 10 per cent of the nation's population is able to produce more than enough food and fiber to feed and clothe the nation's entire populace.
"We're the only nation in the world that can do this with such a small segment of population," Calkins said, pointing out that more than 50 per cent of Russia's population is engaged in agriculture, yet the country suffers an annual production shortage.
The FICB serves as discount agency for all 36 PCA groups in Texas.
In other business, W. W. George of Turkey was re-elected to a three-year term. Holdover directors are President J. C. Emmert of Wellington, Vice President John Glover of Childress, W. C. McClendon of Fritch and L. M. Bartlett of Wellington. George was re-elected by acclamation.
President Emmert gave a report for the board of directors and urged the stockholders to be proud of their association and the progress it has made as a source of agriculture credit for farmer and rancher stockholders in a nine-county area.
In the financial report, General Manager James Van Pelt of Memphis pointed out that the association had a loan volume of more than \$3,250,000 in 1961, and the association has capital, surplus and reserves of \$474,784.
Jinks Wilson, Matador, chairman of the nominating committee, made his committee's report and presided at the director's election.
A new committee of W. C. Hight of Lake View, C. M. Conner of Turkey, J. D. Spray of Matador, Robert Nippert of Quanah, Homer Biddy of Paducah and Duane Henard of Wellington was elected for 1962-63.
The Memphis PCA, owned and operated in its entirety by farmer and rancher stockholders, provides short and intermediate-term credit in Donley, Collingsworth, Hall, Childress, Motley, Cottle, Hardeman, Foard and Eastern Briscoe counties.

V. A. to Release \$75 Million for Direct Home Loans

The Veterans Administration announced this week that \$75 million will be distributed to field offices on July 2 for the purpose of making direct home loans. Approximately \$25 million will be obtained from principal repayments received from borrowers who have direct loans and the balance will come from Treasury borrowings under current authorizations.
VA officials estimate that it will be possible in May to notify field offices of their respective allotments. Then VA Regional Offices will be authorized to furnish direct loan applications to veterans on their waiting lists in advance of the distribution on July 2.
The VA decision to make \$75 million available to field offices in July was made after a continuing review of direct loan activity since October 1961. The VA said that additional allocations would be made during fiscal year 1963 but that the amount and timing would be determined at a later date.
During 1961 the VA made 23,488 direct loans for a total of \$244.9 million. These loans were made to veterans residing in rural areas and in small cities and

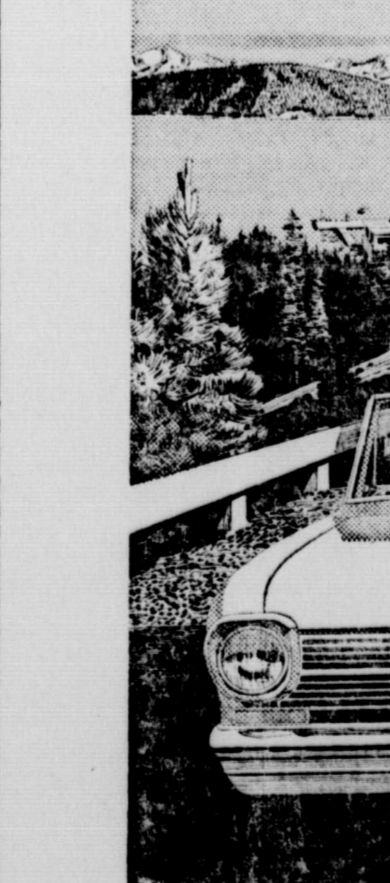

Experts Back Versatile Youths

When 400,000 men and women volunteer their time and know-how to help 23 million 4-H Club members "learn, live and serve," the results are no less than spectacular.

For instance, the Head, Heart, Hands and Health youths finished nearly 4 million projects in more than 49 different categories just this past year.

In almost every instance, the completed project benefited the entire family and in many cases, the community as well.

The information comes from the Cooperative Extension Service which directs 4-H Club work.

Further proof of the far-reaching effect of 4-H was found in 1,900 record books maintained by state award winning club members. The records were reviewed in the headquarters of the National 4-H Service Committee last November, said Norman C. Mindrum, director, for the purpose of selecting boys and girls for scholarships and trip awards to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Miss Sheila Nixon, 20, of Pomona, California, winner of a \$400 Ford scholarship, commented: "The awards we win in 4-H work aren't totally ours. Many people have helped us win them."

Another national champion, who won a Sears Roebuck Four-

tion scholarship for leadership, is 20-year-old Hoosier farmer Wayne Buck. He has a 4-H record so long "it would fill a book." Now a student at Purdue University, Buck credits 4-H training with teaching him how to accept responsibility, and to better understand the world and the people in it.

President Kennedy expressed a similar feeling when he said in a recent message to 4-H members: "I would commend you especially for your constructive and worthwhile efforts in learning to live and work cooperatively with others."

In the beginning, 4-H Clubs were intended for farm youngsters, and offered only projects in crops, livestock, home canning and cooking. The present program embraces a wide range of agricultural, home economics and scientific programs. With the exception of a few such as livestock, tractor and field crops, the projects can be carried on in town as well as on the farm.

4-H Moves to Town
Today, membership in 4-H Clubs is about equally divided between farm and non-farm boys and girls. The main reason for this shift is the disappearance of the small farm from the American agricultural scene.

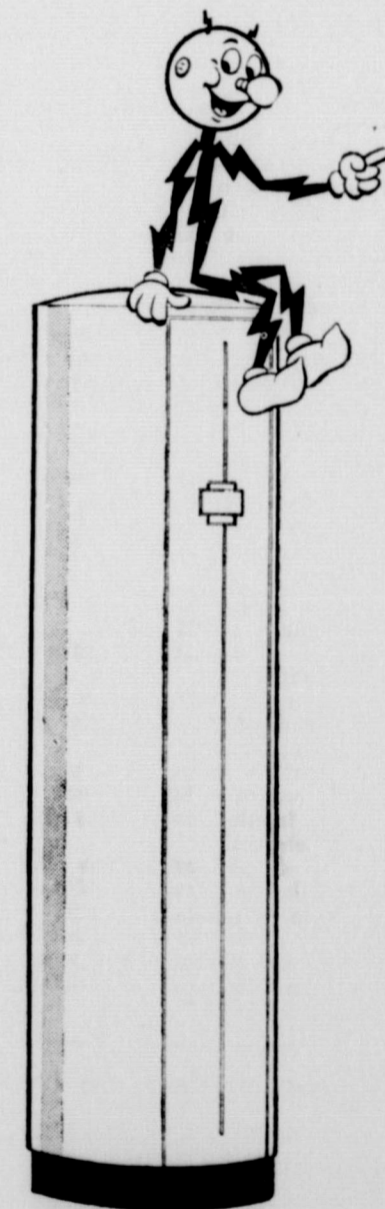

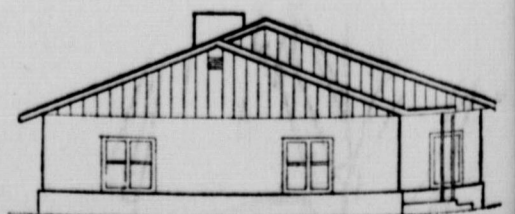

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Contract Let for Building Screw Worm Factory

The final hurdle in getting the Southwest screwworm eradication program off the ground was cleared when the contract for building the giant screwworm factory was approved in Dallas last week. Work began immediately at Moore Air Force Base in the Rio Grande Valley and should be completed by July 1.

By taking this quick action, the plants will be in operation two months earlier than expected and ready to meet the peak screwworm season in mid-summer.

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation trustees okayed the contract at a meeting Monday in Dallas. Brown and Root Construction Co. of Houston is handling the job.

The meeting drew representatives from the Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association, Oklahoma Extension Service, Texas House of Representatives, Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, plus Foundation trustees and the organizations they represent.

Marvin J. Bridges of Buffalo was named executive director of operations for the Foundation, and will be at the building site until construction is completed. Coordinator for the United States Department of Agriculture is Dr. S. C. Gartman.

In summarizing the program thus far, state and Foundation officials cautioned stockmen against "letting down" in their efforts to raise funds. "The real job still lies ahead," they said. At present, less than half of the three million dollar goal has been reached and there will be a stepped up effort to raise the funds as quickly as possible. In many counties "top-up" operations are needed. Others are just getting the drive underway.

Contract Let for Building Screw Worm Factory

The final hurdle in getting the Southwest screwworm eradication program off the ground was cleared when the contract for building the giant screwworm factory was approved in Dallas last week. Work began immediately at Moore Air Force Base in the Rio Grande Valley and should be completed by July 1.

By taking this quick action, the plants will be in operation two months earlier than expected and ready to meet the peak screwworm season in mid-summer.

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation trustees okayed the contract at a meeting Monday in Dallas. Brown and Root Construction Co. of Houston is handling the job.

The meeting drew representatives from the Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association, Oklahoma Extension Service, Texas House of Representatives, Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, plus Foundation trustees and the organizations they represent.

Marvin J. Bridges of Buffalo was named executive director of operations for the Foundation, and will be at the building site until construction is completed. Coordinator for the United States Department of Agriculture is Dr. S. C. Gartman.

In summarizing the program thus far, state and Foundation officials cautioned stockmen against "letting down" in their efforts to raise funds. "The real job still lies ahead," they said. At present, less than half of the three million dollar goal has been reached and there will be a stepped up effort to raise the funds as quickly as possible. In many counties "top-up" operations are needed. Others are just getting the drive underway.
