

## 1,590 Foard Countians Take Type I Oral Vaccine

A total of 1,590 Foard County and area residents took the type I Sabin oral vaccine against polio with the completion of the first series Sunday afternoon. A total of 408 took the sugar cubes saturated with the vaccine last Sunday. These, added to the 1,182 who received the vaccine on the preceding Sunday, bring the total for the two Sundays to 1,590.

Mrs. Fred Brown of Thalia furnished the sugar cubes free of charge that were used on both Sundays.

Local doctors, Walter Stapp and Martin Kralicke, were well pleased with the good turnout in Foard County's mass inoculation drive, and expressed the hope that the cooperation will be continued when the other types are given at a later date.

## Charles L. Gafford Appointed to Post of A&M System

Charles L. Gafford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Gafford of Crowell, has been appointed Assistant Director of Information and Publications for the Texas A&M College System, it has been announced by Chancellor M. T. Harrington.

Gafford will fill the position vacated by Norman DuBeau, who was promoted Sept. 1 to Director of Information and Publications for the System.

The A&M System Information and Publications Office is responsible for writing and editing various publications that concern the four colleges, the experiment stations and extension services, the Forest Service and other agencies that make up the A&M System as a whole; the reporting of activities of the Board of Directors and Chancellor to the citizens of the state, and in assisting in the production of the Chancellor's Annual Report.

A graduate of Crowell High School, Gafford did his undergraduate work in architectural design and allied arts at Texas Technological College and also received his Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Southern Methodist University where he majored in advertising.

He served on the public relations staff of Fred Greene, public relations director for Zale's Jewelry Co., Inc., and a prominent figure in the Southwestern public relations field.

During 1960 and 1961, Gafford was public relations director for Commercial Metals Co., one of the three world's largest dealers and brokers in scrap iron and metals, headquartered in Dallas.

Prior to joining the staff of the A&M College System, he served as an artillery survey specialist at Fort Polk, La., during the Berlin crisis.

Chancellor Harrington stated that, "the System is fortunate to have Mr. Gafford for this position. His background, particularly in financial reporting and publications work and his familiarity with the significance of developments in business and industry will be of great value to the A&M College System in meeting its responsibility to the State."

## Wildcats Lose 24-16 to Matador

The Crowell High School football team lost another practice game at Matador last Friday night by the score of 24 to 16. The Wildcats did not look as sharp as they did in their victory at Memphis the week before. Then, too, they had strong opposition at Matador. The Bullfighters, led by ace quarterback, Gary Lancaster, and a full senior backfield, gave the Crowell boys a good lesson in football. Wildcat blocking was not up to par and they were unable to stop the quick opening plays that continually picked up first downs for the Matadors.

The Crowell team had its chances to at least tie the contest, but "Lady Luck" did not smile on them. The Wildcats failed by two seconds to hold the Matadors scoreless in the first half, and fumbles on two kick-offs placed the Crowell boys back in the "hole" at times when it hurt.

Crowell scored the first touchdown of the game when the right side of the Wildcat line opened up a nice hole to send fullback Dale Doyal on a 78-yard scamper. Halfback Bob Borchardt ran the extra points over. This score stood up until the last play of the first half. Matador quarterback Gary Lancaster intercepted a pass and ran it back 29 yards. He later went five yards for the TD as the clock ran out on the second quarter. He then passed to his right end, Charles Lancaster, for the two points that tied the score.

Lancaster scored another touchdown in the third quarter, after Crowell got off a short punt to their own 34-yard line. Lancaster scored from one yard out. He ran the extra points over to put the Bullfighters out in front.

Kenneth Barton, fullback, scored Matador's last TD on a one-yard plunge. This drive started on their 38-yard line. The Wildcats came to life late in the contest and gave good blocking to send halfback Bob Borchardt across on a punt return. This TD run was from Matador's 25-yard line. This made the final count 24 to 16 in favor of Matador.

Some of Crowell's new boys have begun to find themselves, and the experience they are picking up should enable them to help produce another 11A district championship. They are Bill Harris, center; John Carl Borchardt, Otis Johnson and James Corder, guards; Mike Shrode, tackle; Ronny Clifton, end; and Dan Mike Bird, Bill Fitzgerald and Freddie Wehba, backs. Bird is the only freshman playing regular, but several of the others have been looking good in practice. Three other boys, junior Jimmy Pendergraft, and sophomores, Toy McCurley and Mike Gamble, have also been improving. Junior Hopkins, all-district end from last year's team, has been injured and unable to play. He should be ready by the middle of the season.

### Results of Aptitude Test Received

Last year the sophomores took the Flanagan Aptitude Classification Tests. The compilation of the score has been received, and the students have been quite interested, and often amazed, at what the test indicates that they may choose for a future occupation because they have a natural ability in that field or show an ability to learn it easily.

There were several sections of the test including the following: inspection, mechanics, tables, reasoning, vocabulary, assembly, judgment, planning, arithmetic, ingenuity, scales, and expression. From the scores made on these tests, the type work that a student might be fitted to do successfully was computed.

In each of the fields of nursing, sales clerking, and salesmanship, there were five students who showed special interest or ability. The boys who showed a high potential in nursing were "horrified" until they learned that that field includes being an anesthesiologist, an industrial nurse, an armed service nurse, etc., and not just a "bed-side" nurse.

Fields including the next high-

est number of students were plumbing, electrical works, telephone operation, farming, business, law, social work, construction work each claimed a few students.

A most interesting part of the study was based upon four tests: reasoning, vocabulary, judgment-comprehension, expression. The results of these tests were computed as a college aptitude test and indicate the likelihood of a student's being able to do college work successfully.

Of the students likely to enter college, 85 per cent ranked on this section.

Perhaps this Flanagan Aptitude Test in its various phases, did point out to each student and his parents something that should be considered in making a wise choice of occupations.

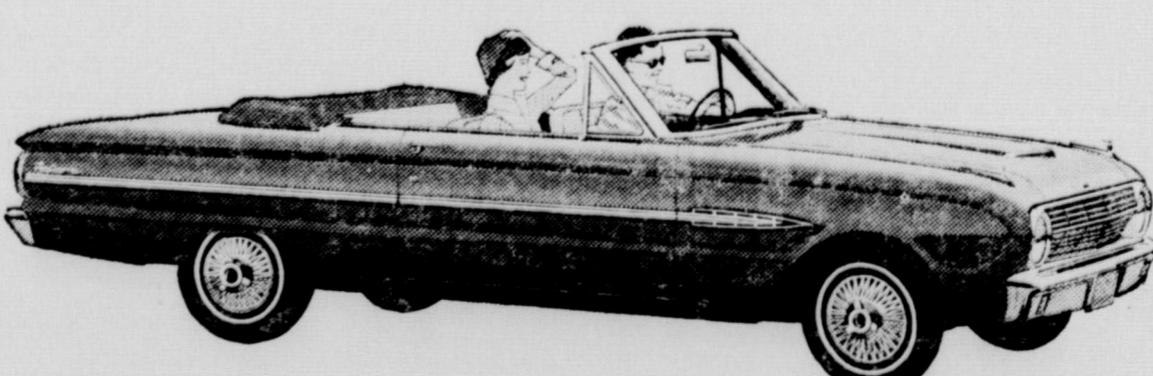

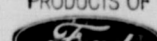

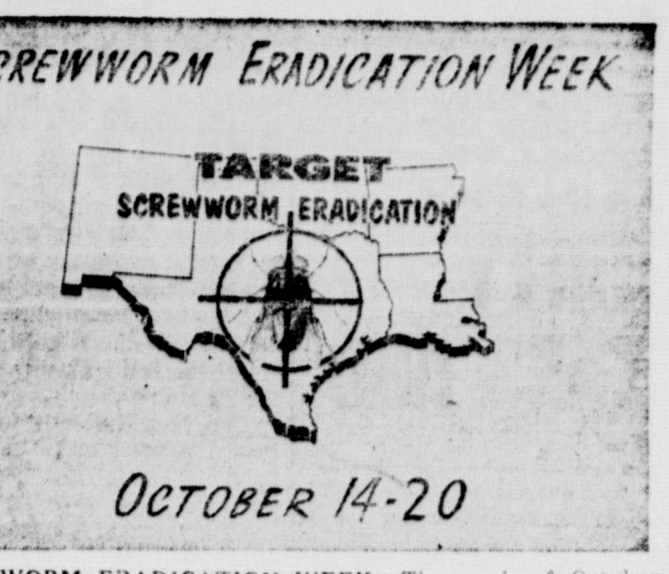

### Fly Release Indicates Success

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program are hopeful that a recent absence of screwworm cases reported in certain counties within the sterile fly release area reflects the effectiveness of the program.

In early July all counties within the sterile fly release area, which includes over 60 counties in southern Texas, reported some screwworm cases. Since that time, the number of counties in the release area reporting now screwworms has increased to more than 20 counties at the beginning of September.

Officials are hesitant to give complete credit to fly release since that period of hot weather usually results in fewer screwworm cases anyway, but they are watching the situation very closely to see if it does represent a definite trend.

Reinhardt said they also plan to visit the Islands of Crete and Cyprus, where the Lubbock firm has placed earth-moving machines. The couple also plans to tour Rome and possibly Milan, Italy, before returning to the U. S.

The Hancock executive was to deliver a speech before foreign representatives of the export division of LeTourneau-Westinghouse, distributor of Hancock products, at Peoria, Ill., while en route to New York.

He said the machine sold to Israel will move 20 cubic yards of earth per load and will travel about 30 miles per hour. He said it probably will be used in irrigation work, since the country is planning to move water inland from the Sea of Galilee.

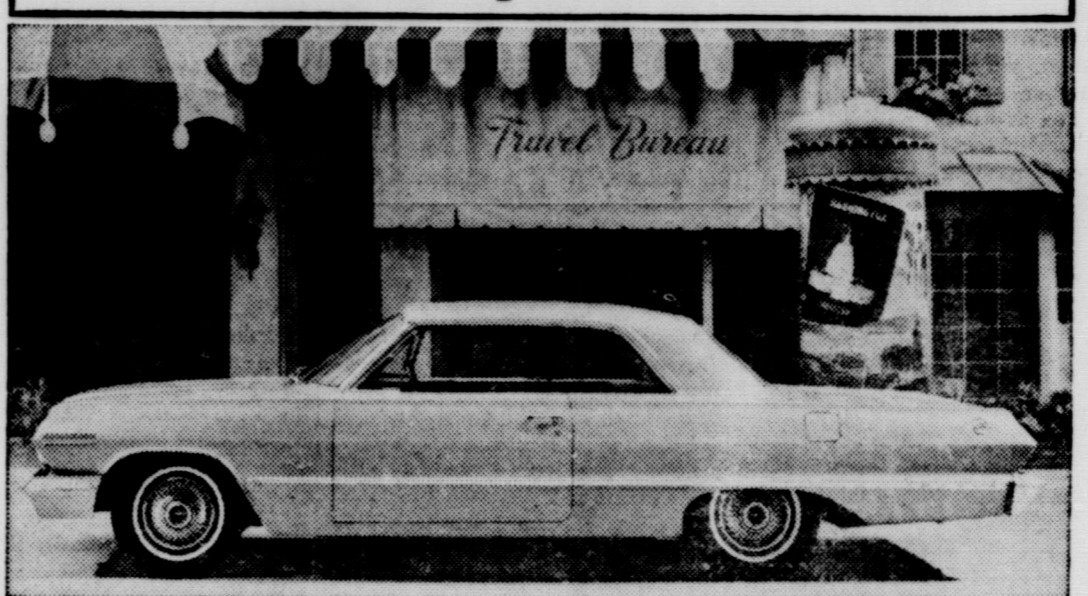

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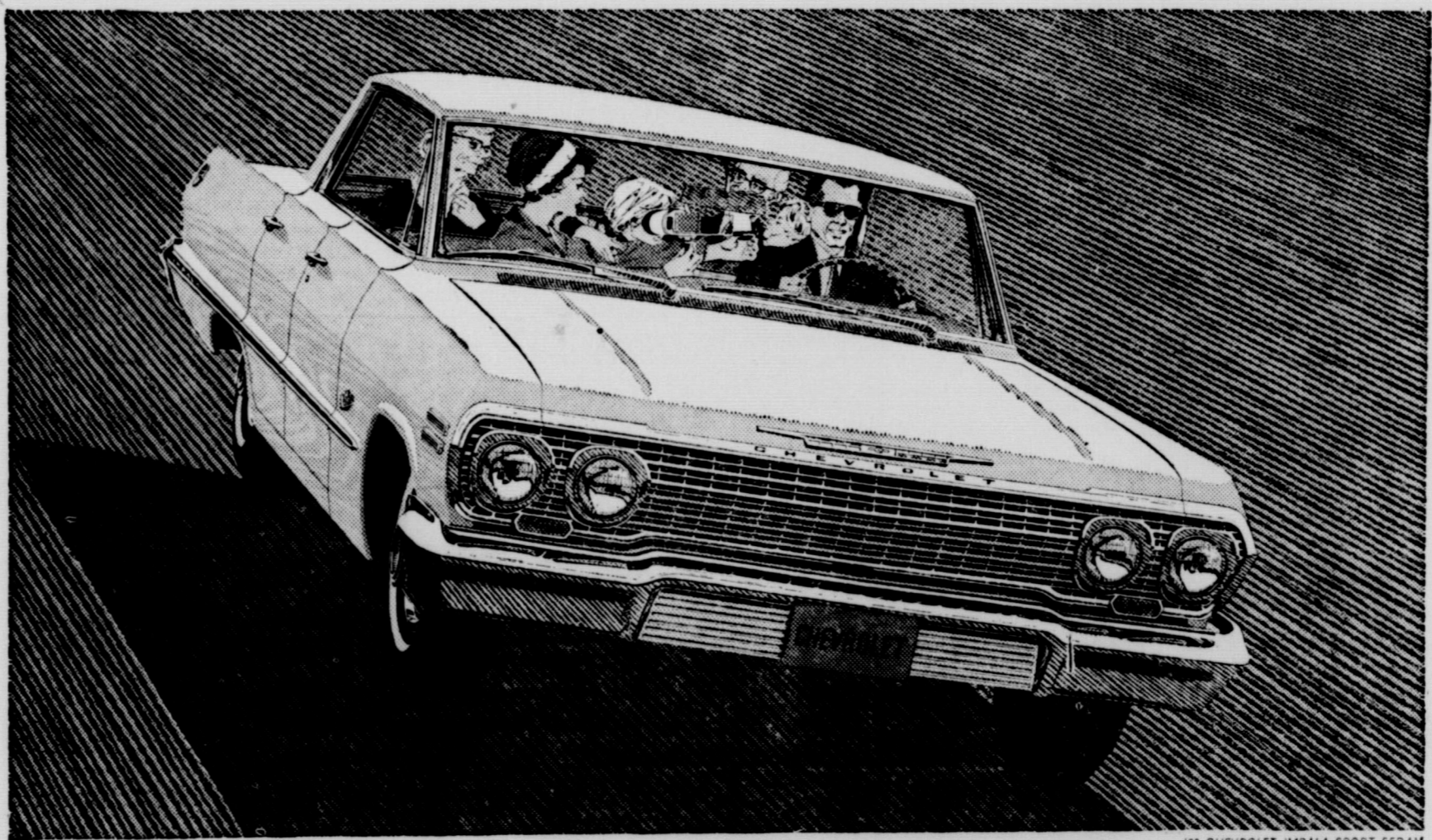

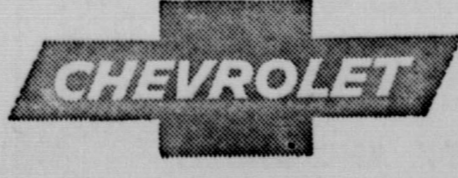

## Armyworms Begin to Appear

Fall armyworms, which do best during cool, wet weather, being reported in many areas of the state, Joe Burkett, extension agent, says. The worms feed primarily on pastures, and native grasses during this time of the year, may later be a problem on small grains, sugarcane. They cause more economic damage to fall planted small grains and lawns in Foard County than any other crop.

The worms eat the tender stems of the plants, attack and cause whitening in fields of grain or pastures. They are the first signs that the season are present.

For the best control of the armyworm, insecticides should be applied at the first sign of outbreak and when the worms are small. For information, the extension agent suggests anyone interested contact him.

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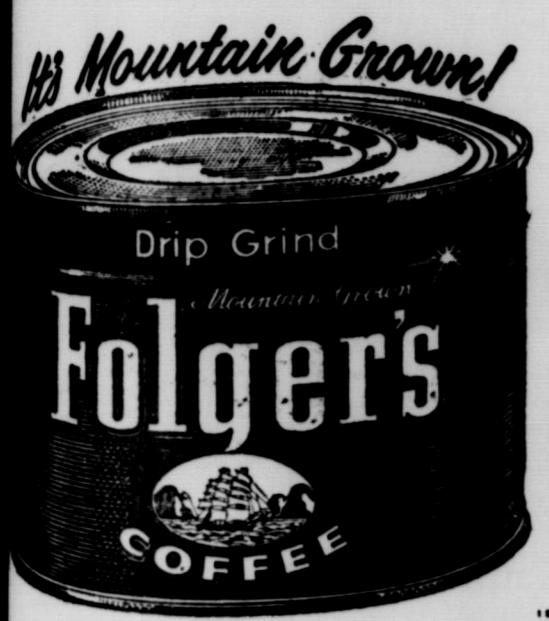
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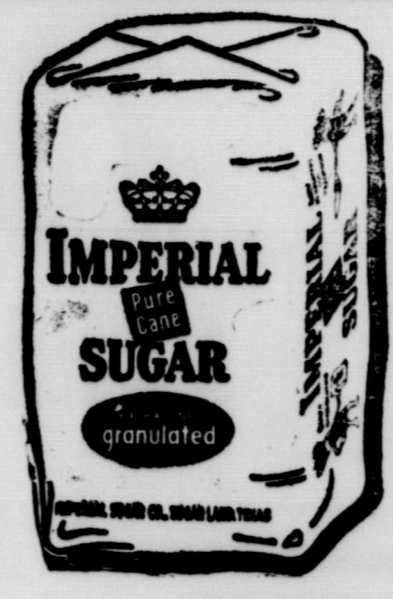

**\$152 Million Made Available for Rural Housing Loans**

An additional \$152 million has been made available for rural housing loans, Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman announced this week.

This action makes a total of \$182 million available through the Farmers Home Administration for this type of credit during fiscal 1963. The funds come from the \$430 million authorized by the Housing Act of 1961, to be expended within a four-year period. Approximately \$95 million was obligated during fiscal 1962.

"These funds will help 20,000 rural families who do not now have adequate housing to obtain credit to finance a new home or improve the home they already own," Secretary Freeman said.

"The rural housing program is also a driving force in rural areas development. The construction carried on with the funds provides work for local carpenters, masons, plumbers and electricians and steps up the sales of building supply dealers and other merchants in small rural communities. The wages received by the workmen and the profits retained by the businessmen are in turn circulated through local trade channels, invested in local enterprises. The effect of the housing dollar is multiplied many times before its force is diminished."

Under the Rural Housing Program the Farmers Home Administration has made in Texas over 2,700 loans for over \$20,440,000. There have been no losses on these loans. As of December 31, 1961, these borrowers had paid over \$5,966,000 on principal and \$2,879,000 on interest, which leaves only about \$14,474,000 owed on principal. 655 of these borrowers have already paid their loans in full ahead of maturities.

**Underground Water in Knox and Haskell Counties Improves**

Underground water in Haskell and Knox Counties has improved remarkably in both quantity and quality since 1900, contrary to usual experience in other areas of West Texas where irrigation from wells has developed.

This is one of the unusual discoveries reported in Bulletin 6209 just published by the Texas Water Commission. The bulletin, prepared in cooperation with the U. S. Geological Survey, is available for free distribution at the Commission's office, Box 2311, Capitol Station, Austin.

Another oddity is that although water from the Seymour formation, principal aquifer in the two north-central Texas counties, is good for irrigation and most domestic uses, it is in many places bad for babies. Investigation had disclosed, the bulletin reports, that use of the water in preparing infants' feeding formulas may produce "blue babies" because of a high nitrate content. In 62 samples of water the nitrate content ranged from 21 to 138 parts per million, far above the 10 to 20 parts per million the Texas Board of Health considers the safe maximum.

Geologists making the survey found that wells drilled into the Seymour formation in 1900 were dry or produced only small amounts of salty water. By 1956 the aquifer produced enough soft, potable water to irrigate 10 per cent of the acreage under cultivation in the two counties. Water levels have risen in wells and in some places marshes have developed.

It is believed that these effects are due in part to more rapid recharge resulting from increased cultivation and the use of terracing and contour farming and other water-conservation methods.

The report states, however, that the water supply from the Seymour formation probably will not indefinitely support the demand for irrigation, though a longer period of record is needed to support the conclusion. Several procedures for obtaining maximum beneficial use of ground water are recommended.

The Seymour formation is the surface formation in nearly 50 per cent of Haskell and Knox Counties, and is the only major source of ground-water supplies for irrigation. The Permian red beds which appear at the surface in the remaining areas were reported to furnish only small quantities of generally poor quality water.

Field work on the county's ground-water geology was done during 1956 and 1957. The report contains tabulated records of 1,159 wells and springs, of which 936 were used for irrigation, and 192 chemical analyses.
