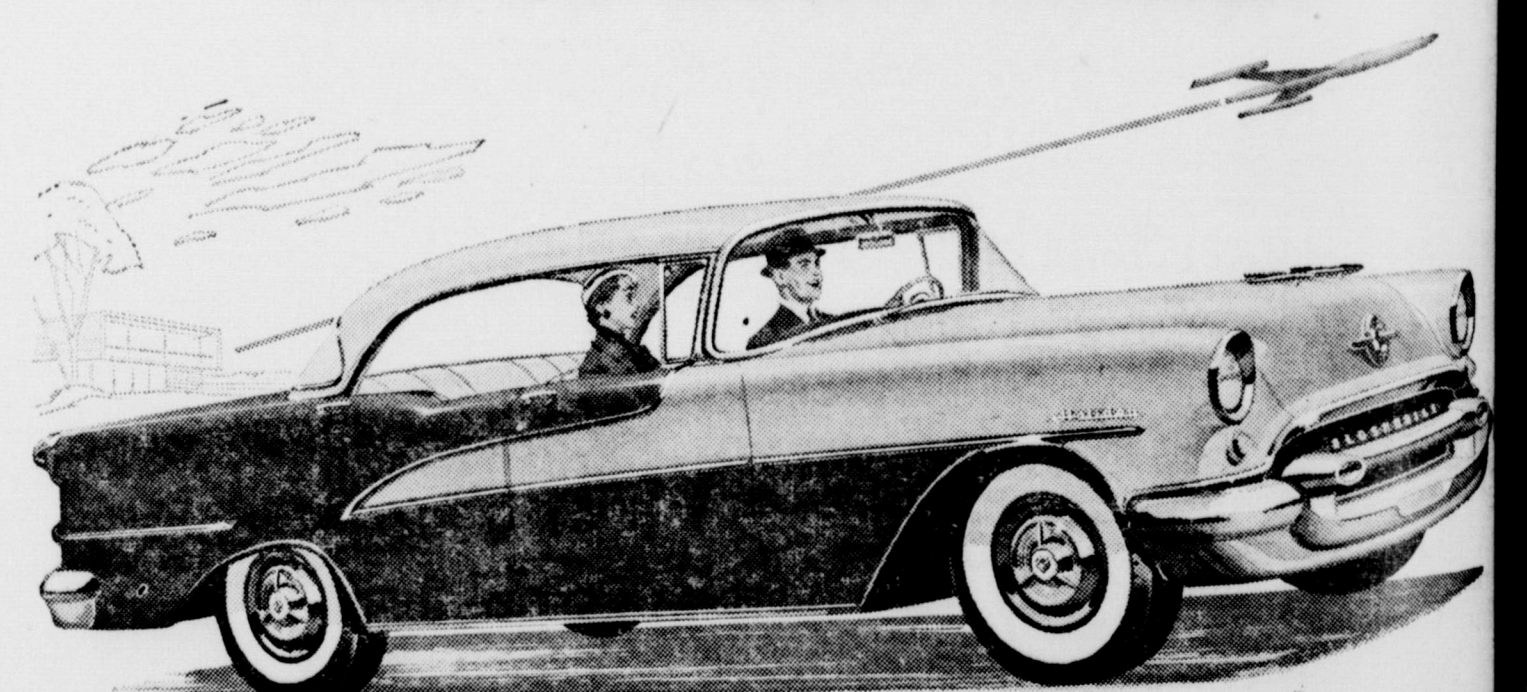

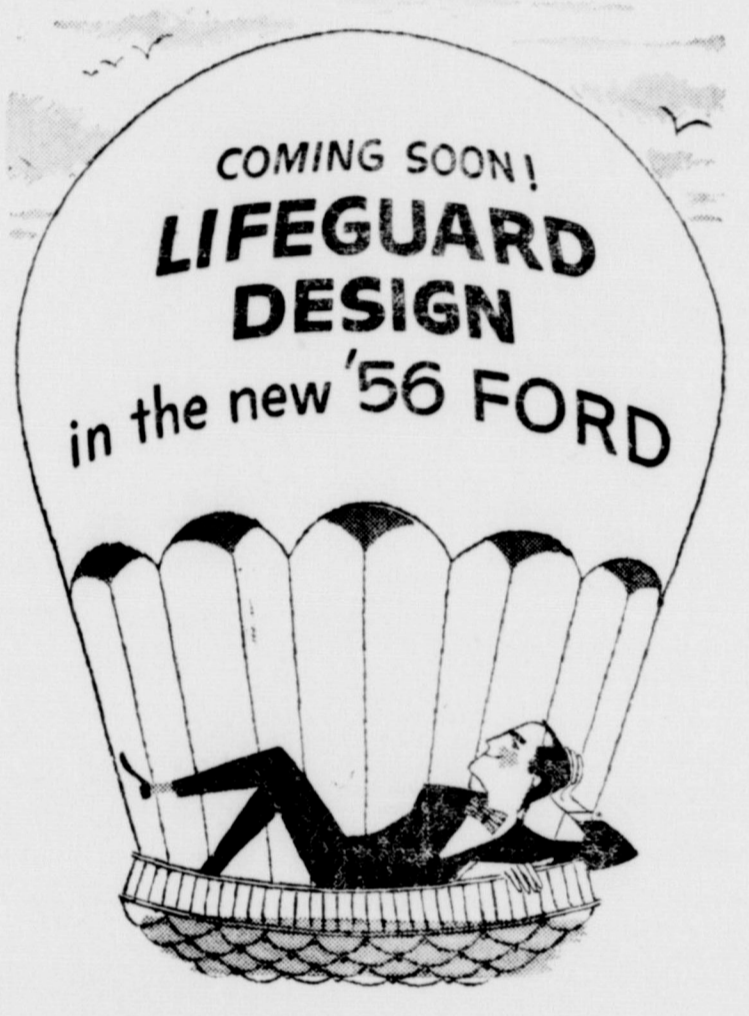

Austin, Tex.—There is an election coming up next week — in which the "candidates" are not known.

It is the election of Texas' new Democratic national committee — to replace ousted Wright Morrow.

A nominating committee will make a recommendation on Sept. 21. Its choice will be revealed at a meeting of the State Executive Committee in Fort Worth on Sept. 22.

Discussed for the place have been former Cong. Lloyd M. Bentzen Jr. of McAllen; Cong. Joe Kilgore, also of McAllen; Rep. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield; and James E. Wheat of Woodville. Wheat now is secretary of the State Executive Committee.

Possibility that State Chairman George W. Sandlin might get the nod also has been discussed.

Gov. Allan Shivers has indicated his desire that the new committee be someone who will work with the National Committee.

National Chairman Paul M. Butler said that the new member must have voted for Adlai Stevenson in 1952 and be acceptable to Governor Shivers, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, and U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson.

State Chairman Sandlin will address a meeting of the Democratic Club of Fort Worth on the same date the committee meets. He will reply to the speech made to the same group by Morrow just before the state committee voted Morrow out. Morrow has severely criticized Sandlin. The invitation to speak was extended Sandlin in order to show that the club, while conservative, was not dominated by the ultra-ultra conservative backers of Morrow.

**Candidates Active**

Friends of Agri. Commr. John White met in Austin over the week end to encourage his entry into the governor's race. White is one of several under consideration by the Loyalist forces.

Brown Bailey, Midland attorney and leader in the effort, said the group conferring with White was not allied with any political faction. "We simply want White to run," he said.

Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba is the only announced candidate for governor so far. He's busy building his fences. Active also is State Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, although as yet unannounced. Another possible is James P. Hart, former chancellor of the University of Texas. And Will Wilson, associate justice of the supreme court.

Not to be overlooked is Coke Stevenson, former governor. It appears there may be a build-up urging him to enter. Stevenson has been inactive politically since his 87-vote defeat by Lyndon Johnson in the Senate race seven

years ago. Look for House Speaker Jim Lindsey of Texas — in the attorney general's race. Also being talked for that job, if Hart runs for governor, is Will Wilson. He would not run against Hart.

**New Veterans Land Plan**

Texas' veterans land program is off to a fresh start.

Under new laws the board places responsibility for administration squarely on the shoulders of the land commissioner. Ex-officio members, the governor and attorney general, are charged only with policy-making functions.

Commr. J. Earl Rudder said he was ready to accept the responsibility.

Local advisory committees, blue-printed in the 54th Legislature's reform laws, are already being formed. These committees, appointed by commissioners courts, will provide a check on findings of state appraisers.

Land purchasers who are delinquent in their payments, have been notified to pay up or forfeit their land. Many delinquencies involve block deals believed to be of questionable nature.

Rudder indicated the board should be able to start considering loan applications again soon. All the original \$100,000,000 was exhausted under the administration of his predecessor, Bascom Giles. Some, however, has been recovered by court action.

Giles has been sentenced to the state penitentiary on charges of accomplice to theft and consenting to accept a bribe.

**Representatives Appointed**

Ten appointments to the Texas Legislative Council, an interim research group, have been made by House Speaker Jim Lindsey. Names were Reps. Ben Gusing of Kingsville, Tom King of Dallas, James W. Yancy of Houston, Joe Burkett Jr. of Kerrville, E. F. Crim of Henderson, Pearce Johnson of Austin, Obie Bristow of Big Spring, Gustin Garrett of Raymondville, W. G. Kirklind of Odessa and William S. Heatly of Paducah.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey will select five senators to complete the council. Its duty will be to study pressing legislative needs prior to the next session.

Lindsey also appointed Wade F. Spillman chairman of the house investigating committee. Its tasks include further land office inquiry.

Other members are Reps. Reagan R. Huffman of Marshall, Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe, Jack Welch of Marlin and Scott McDonald of Fort Worth.

Named to the water resources committee were Reps. Stanley Banks Jr. of San Antonio, Leroy Saul of Kress and Bill Wood of Tyler.

**Storm-Warning Net Set**

Largest storm-warning net in the world is being installed in 16 Texas cities.

Radar sets, obsolete for military use, were donated by the U. S. Air Force. Procedure for use was developed by the U. S. Weather Bureau, Texas Department of Public Safety and the state division of Civil Defense and Disaster Relief.

Installation sites are Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Victoria, Galveston, Houston, Beaumont, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Lubbock, Midland, San Angelo and Amarillo. Others may be added soon.

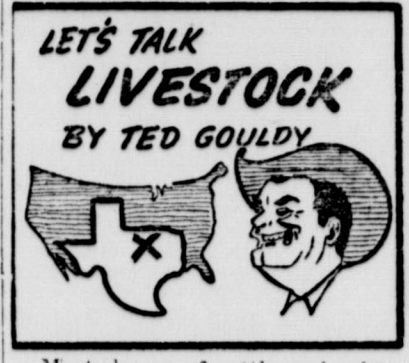

Most classes of cattle and calves drew about steady prices Monday at Fort Worth. Some fed steers were a little stronger, and some sales of butcher calves and stocker calves and yearlings were steady to weak. Top commercially fed steers drew \$23.25, and odd prime yearlings drew \$23.50 to \$25, the latter on a club steer.  
Comparable prices: good and

choice steers and yearlings, \$19-23.50; common and medium \$12-18; fat cows, \$10-12; canners and cutters, \$7-10, bulls \$10-13.50; good and choice slaughter calves \$16-18; few baby beef heavies higher; common and medium grades \$12-15; culls \$9-12. Stocker or steer calves \$20 down; steer yearlings \$18.50 down; stocker cows \$8-13, latter on young, about 3-year-olds weighing close to 800 lbs.

Good and choice butcher hogs topped at \$17 to \$17.50 at Fort Worth Monday. Again the top prices were paid for both meat type and lard type hogs, and some butchers weighing up to 160 pounds and above drew up to \$17.  
USDA reported that on a recent week the cutout values of the No. 1, or meat type, averaged 92 cents above the cutout values of the No. 3, or lard type butcher hogs.

Despite this, salesmen still have a hard time getting slaughter interests to pay the premium that the meat type obviously deserves.  
Sheep and lambs opened fully steady to strong at Fort Worth

Monday. Top on fat lambs was \$13, and some good feeders sold up to \$16.50. Comparative prices included: good and choice slaughter lambs \$17-19; cull, common and medium offerings \$10-16; stocker and feeder lambs \$14-16.50; medium to good slaughter yearlings \$14-15; cull to medium yearlings \$9-13.50; old wethers \$8-11; old ewes \$4-5; old bucks around \$4.

## Self-Employed People Eligible for Social Security Benefits

Thousands of self-employed professional people do not know that they and their families will benefit from the Social Security Act. Since the beginning of 1955 this law extended protection to self-employed accountants, architects, funeral directors and professional engineers.

This means that any of this group without social security account numbers should obtain one as soon as possible. Net earnings of as much as \$400 and up to \$4200 in a year must be reported in conjunction with filing Federal Income Tax Returns every year after 1954.

It is important to realize that in addition to providing for retirement at age 65, the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security law give protection to the families of insured professionals who die at any age.

Applications for social security account cards and Booklet 35, "Your Social Security" may be obtained from the Social Security District Office, 412 Post Office Building, Wichita Falls.
