The five gins of the county had ginned 950 bales of cotton since Wednesday of last week, according to figures released Wednesday morning. The total number of bales for the season reported by the gins was 4,965. According to reports, bolls on

late cotton have been damaged by the cold weather to the extent that they may fail to open. It is not known yet how great this damage may be. Rayland is in the lead with the

greatest number of bales ginned, however, a little less than 50 per cent of the Rayland ginnings come from Wilbarger County. This section also has the largest acreage planted to cotton. Thalia Farm-ers Co-Op. Gin is second in the number of bales ginned and is not far behind the Rayland Gin.
