## Crowell Wildcats Defeat Paducah Dragons 14 to 6 Last Friday Afternoon

The Crowell High School football team, led by fullback Ray Gibson, defeated the powerful Paducah Dragons at Paducah last Friday afternoon by the score of 14 to 6. This is the second game Paducah has lost in 1A-9 conference play in three years. The first half was scoreless with the Dragons leading in first downs 7 to 0.

Paducah scored early in the second half on a forward pass from Kelly Bidly to Lyndon Rodgers who in turn, lateraled to back Travis Truelock. The game was good for 50 yards and the Dragons' only score.

### Cats Roll in Fourth Quarter

The Wildcats caught fire in the fourth quarter and marched 44 and 45 yards for touchdowns. Crowell obtained the ball in both instances on Paducah's gambling on fourth down tries for first downs instead of punting the ball. Ray Gibson scored on 24- and 10-yard runs. Roy Don Payne and Gibson ran the extra points over. This should give Crowell third place in the district race with Chillicothe and Iowa Park the only schools coming out ahead of them. Crowell led in first downs during the second half 9 to 6.

The C. V. Welch Nettie Tarver No. 3, north of Thalia, topped the oil sand at 1467 feet late Tuesday and was drilled to 1497. Gas surfaced in 6 minutes. Casing has been set and when the well is brought in, it is expected to make approximately 25 barrels per day.

## Sherman McBeath Appointed Director for Safe Driving Day

"S-D (Safe Driving) Day, sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety," says Sheriff Sherman McBeath of Foard County, "has been set for Thursday, Dec. 1, 1955." The local sheriff has been appointed safety director of this county.

Sheriff McBeath points out that this year, as last, the purpose of S-D Day is to prove to people everywhere that motorists and pedestrians can reduce accidents by their own actions. "The challenge to Foard County residents," adds Sheriff McBeath, "will be: Not a single traffic accident during the 24-hour period... in daylight or darkness."

"It is the moral and civic responsibility of every highway user to accept this challenge," continues the safety director. "If we of Foard County can show that by safe and sensible driving on S-D Day this year we can not only accept, but overcome this challenge, we will have taken a major step towards greatly reducing the traffic accident toll in the county."

"In 1951 after 50 years of automotive history the one millionth traffic death was recorded in the United States. At our present rate only half as long will be required to kill the second million."

"Our own traffic death rate must be reduced and residents of Foard County can show that by a concerted effort, and with the highest regard for safe driving principles and the highway code, show their willingness to cooperate."

Sheriff McBeath reminds all motorists that excessive speed is responsible for the majority of traffic accident fatalities and asks all drivers in Foard County to drive within the established speed limits on highways and in restricted areas. "To disregard this maximum," Sheriff McBeath adds, "is to exhibit a selfish and irresponsible attitude by placing your own and the lives of our fellow men in jeopardy."

Rev. and Mrs. W. D. Brooks of the Assembly of God Church in Crowell made a trip to the state prison in McAlester, Okla., last week to visit and have prayer with Hurlie Franklin Fairris, 21-year-old condemned youth who will be electrocuted after midnight on Nov. 18, for the slaying of a detective during an Oklahoma City supermarket holdup July 16, 1954.

The reason that Rev. Brooks was interested in the young criminal was that he was reared with the youth's father in Dallas. This week Rev. and Mrs. Brooks will visit the boy's mother at Goree Farm in Texas, where she is serving time for the murder of her third husband. His father is in jail in Paris awaiting trial on a burglary charge and he has already served two terms in the penitentiary. He also has two brothers who also have criminal records.

Fairris is a nephew of Ray Hamilton, one-time Southwest badman, executed in Texas in 1930. The youth blames his present woes on being a kinsman of Hamilton, who was his mother's brother.

Rayland is in the lead with the greatest number of bales ginned, however, a little less than 50 per cent of the Rayland ginnings come from Wilbarger County. This section also has the largest acreage planted to cotton. Thalia Farmers Co-Op. Gin is second in the number of bales ginned and is not far behind the Rayland Gin.

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# State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — Sentiment to persuade U. S. Sen. Price Daniel to run for governor next summer is growing.

Senator Daniel has been in Austin and other cities over the state the past month holding subcommittee hearings on narcotics traffic. On the side he has talked with many local political leaders.

Reports were that some spokesmen for both liberal and conservative factions hoped that by supporting Daniel they could avoid a repetition of the 1954 gubernatorial slugfest.

Daniel has said he will not announce his intentions until after Jan. 1.

### More Super-Roads

A four-lane highway connecting all population centers should be Texas' aim, says Gov. Allan Shivers.

Addressing a meeting of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners' Association in Austin, Shivers praised the farm-to-market highways. But, he said, "our trunkline system has not fared too well."

At least 3,000 more miles of heavy-traffic roads are needed, Shivers stated. He added that "such construction would pay for itself with increased gasoline tax revenues. But people seem more willing to pay more expensive toll road fees than state taxes."

### North-South Thoroughfare

A super-highway from the Red River to the Rio Grande by 1960 is the target of the Texas Highway Department.

Originally, completion of the 512-mile project was scheduled for 1975. However, faster ac-

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sition of right-of-way than was expected has made the advanced date possible, reports State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer.

Following the route of the present U. S. Highway 81, the new giant road will cost an estimated \$275,000,000.

### Where to Put Pupils

Despite mammoth construction outlays, Texas' public schools still are fighting a losing battle with enrollment figures, says the Texas Education Agency.

If buildings and pupils continue to be added at the present pace, the state will be short 24,000 classrooms by 1960, the TEA estimates. This despite the fact that during the past six years Texas spent \$482,000,000 on school buildings—or far more than any other southern state.

Population shifts, both within and to the state, as well as the rising birth rate, cause the dilemma, says TEA.

### Building Advisors Named

Five men have been appointed to help plan a new State Courts Building.

Named to the Supreme Court Building Advisory Board by Governor Shivers are former Supreme Court Judge A. J. Foley of Amarillo; former congressman Ed Gossick of Dallas; former Governor Dan Moody; J. Neils Thompson of Austin; and Virgil T. Seaberry Sr. of Eastland.

### Duval Decision Stands

Hope is apparently ended for any change in the decision of the Court of Criminal Appeals nullifying 104 Duval County indictments. The court refused to reverse its ruling that the grand jury which returned the indictments was improperly constituted.

Meanwhile a new Duval grand jury completed its term after returning 198 indictments, 88 of them citing persons involved in the original group. Ten were against South Texas Political Boss George Parr.

### Parr Case Before Court

The Texas State Supreme Court will review a case to decide if and when George Parr is to be tried on a civil recovery suit.

State action seeks to regain \$500,000 in county funds Parr allegedly used to buy a ranch.

A conflicting suit by pro-Parr forces contends the money was a loan and seeks trial in Laredo. Trial in Cotulla or Alice is sought by the state.

### Acreage Cut Protested

Disgruntled West Texas farmers took a verbal swipe at the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

In making 1956 cotton acreage allotments, the committee allowed a slight gain for Central and East Texas counties, but left West Texas seven per cent short.

At the Texas Farm Bureau convention the losers pushed through a resolution calling for reduction in the committee's distribution powers.

Farmers were united in other resolutions refusing to endorse flexible price supports, asking for high price supports on basic commodities and urging efforts to find outlets for surpluses.

### UNEXPLORED FRONTIER

The continent of Antarctica is the last unexplored frontier. Although discovered in 1820, no country has successfully attempted to colonize it.






