### A Focus Week Highlight 50th Anniversary Year

As around the world will be celebrated during Focus Week on Sunday, May 12. This being the golden anniversary of the organization, the 1963 week will include special services recognizing this 50th year.

## Stage Band Repeats as Enid Festival Winner

### Rain and Hail Fall in County Sunday Morning

Heavy rains, accompanied by high winds and hail, buffeted Foard County Sunday morning, with some damage reported to wheat. Several fields just south and southeast of Crowell reported heavy hail damage, with total loss reported to a few fields. Elsewhere in that area, damage was estimated as high as 50 per cent. The affected area will cover around 500 acres of wheat.

In Crowell, a light hail fell along with the rain, and one inch of moisture was recorded by the government gauge. A lighter shower—measuring .3 inch—also fell Saturday night, so a total of 1.3 inches was recorded the two days.

The Vivian area reported up to 1.7 inches, and reports from over the county were that practically all areas received as much or more than that received in Crowell.

### Type III Polio Vaccine to Be Given Here May 19

Type III polio vaccine will be administered in Crowell on Sunday, May 19. Dr. Martin Kralicke announced Tuesday. The type III will also be given at the Community Center in Crowell from 1 to 5 p. m.

Dr. Kralicke says that the same procedure will be followed as when types I and II were administered.

Mrs. Parnell was born at Tolbert, Wilbarger County, March 9, 1919, to Rev. and Mrs. Frank McNair, now residents of Lockett. Before her father retired as a Baptist minister, she lived with her parents as her father served churches at Tolbert, Lockett, Thalia and Margaret.

### Weather Balloon Visible over Area Tuesday Afternoon

A giant weather balloon, drifting in a northerly direction, was visible in this area late Tuesday afternoon. With the naked eye, the balloon shined in the late afternoon like a huge star, but when viewed through a telescope belonging to Dr. Walter Stapp, the balloon was brought close enough to see that the weather instruments hung on two appendages beneath the balloon.

According to reports, the balloon was in excess of 100,000 feet high, and had been released at Brownwood at 3 a. m. Tuesday. The flight was to end at 5 a. m. Wednesday.

How Important Are Grades?

For many years, students have been graded in accordance with

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class ability, not individual ability. The grades issued in regard to the class' ability include a few high marks, many average marks, and far too many failing marks. However, in later life, many students who have a failing record in high school become successful and prosperous. This, in itself, reveals that grades do not always tell the true worth of a person's ability. Teachers are the first to agree with this new concept. In working with students, teachers have become aware of the tremendous difference in the ability of each student. Some students making A's do not have to put forth so much effort as other students making C's. Because of the methods of grading, the below average student is often discouraged. This discouragement so early in life often leaves its own mark. Only those with an exceptional desire to succeed manage to hide the scar. Is too much emphasis being put on grades? Are grades becoming a hindrance?

There is no argument that schools must have some set method of measuring a student's progress in school. Boys and girls, although laden with good intentions, need a code to guide them. This code, as it now stands, is often unfair. Specialists in the field of education realize this and will, in time, develop a system of grading that will not doom a student because of his ability in one field of study. A student will be graded by his individual ability.—Patricia Cates.

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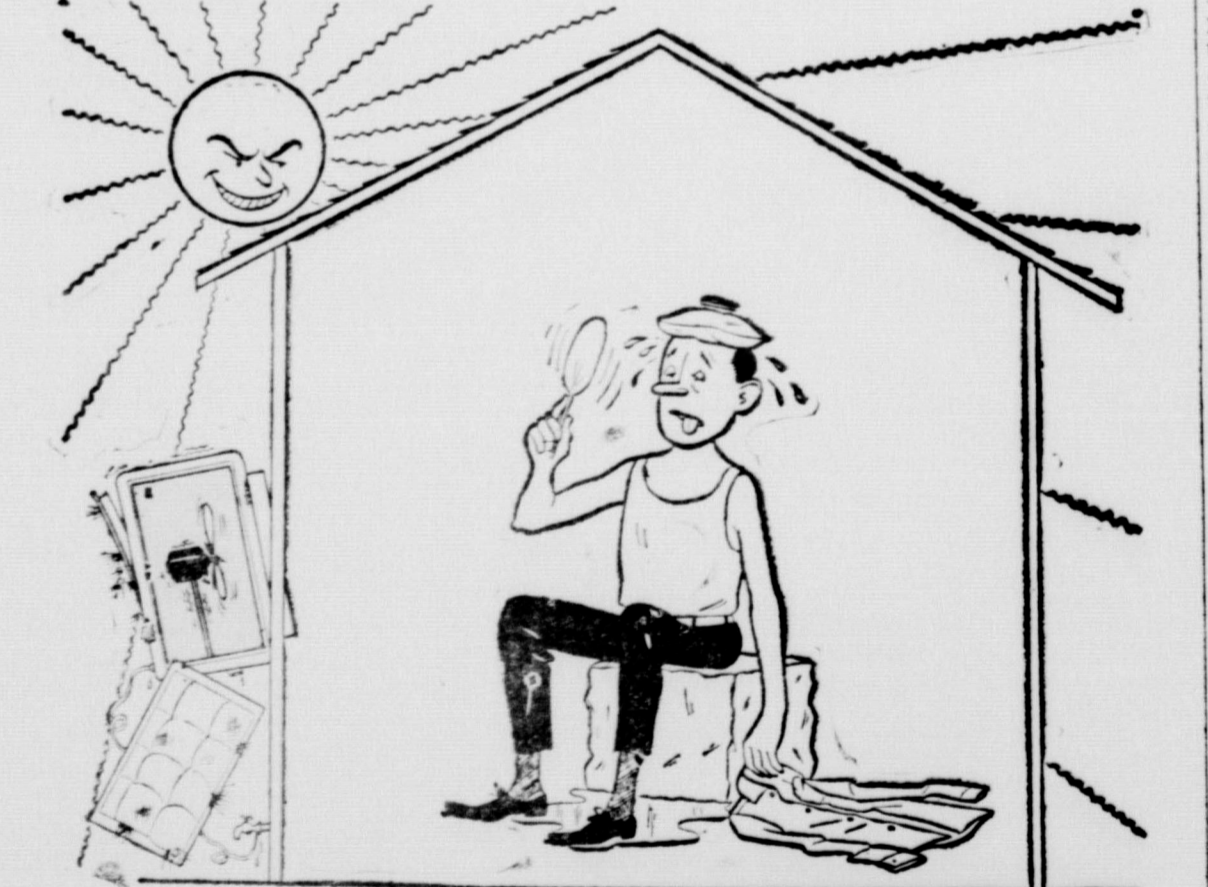

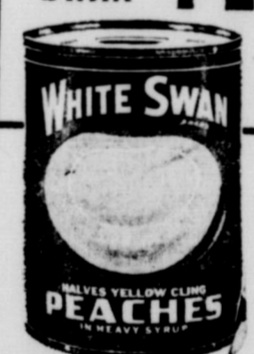

Renewed exploratory activity at the site of a storied old copper mine on the Johnson-Ekern ranch property 12 miles northwest of Crowell, where a copper mill and some 15 residences once stood before the project was abandoned some 45 years ago, has spurred hopes that mining activity will be resumed here.

A four-man crew from the Oredon Refining Corp. of Reno, Nev., has been testing copper-bearing strata on the Pease River for the past four months, seeking to prove out the presence of sufficient ore to justify establishment of a mill and setting up a new mining operation.

Hal T. Hall of Reno, friendly president of Oredon, which has mining operations going in four states, frankly admits that his company wouldn't have men on the site if they weren't convinced there is sufficient ore for a profitable operation.

He says his company has spent \$50,000 in its exploratory efforts in the big Johnson ranch in Foard County and on some 2,500 acres also leased north of the Pease in Hardeman County, noting that even a company the size of his would not likely make an investment of this nature unless there appeared to be ample reason to do so.

He says the company feels that it must prove the availability of a million or more tons of ore of 2 per cent quality or better, in order to justify the establishment of a mill.

After determining its presence he said his company would be ready to start construction within six months of facilities at a cost of around \$1 million. He said approximately half of this amount would go for the mill and the other to transportation.

He said such a project would employ 30 to 35 persons. The company has been planning the Foard County exploration effort for the past four years, after visual observations from surface are pointed to the feasibility of tests.

A crew headed by Wayne (Tobe) Mendenhall, a former oil field explosives engineer whose father, Tom Mendenhall, pioneered in the oil field explosives business in the Wichita Falls area years ago.

A bulldozer and a miniature rotary rig, designed by Mr. Mendenhall and mounted on the rear of a Jeep truck, are the primary implements used in the testing operation.

The rig, powered by two small gasoline engines, is capable of

drilling to depths of 75 feet, although drilling at the mine site doesn't go to that depth.

A vacuum drill is used to collect samples in glass jars, which are labeled according to location and tested for copper content.

Mr. Hall notes that copper is the only ore which is being sought and the only ore found, despite some rumors to the contrary.

Most of the ore is in veins near the surface, Mr. Hall says. He says there are millions of tons of ore in the area, but that much of it has been eroded and is widely scattered. The problem is finding enough of it in one location for profitable mining.

Mr. Hall gives no indication as to when Oredon will have its exploratory efforts completed.

High ground water levels have hampered operations recently, he says.

**Rural Life Sunday and Soil Stewardship Week to Be Observed**

May 19 will be Rural Life Sunday in Texas and also the beginning of Soil Stewardship Week. The fifth Sunday after Easter is traditionally the day for emphasizing the spiritual values in rural life.

Changes in today's town and country community make it important that the observance be relevant to the lives of non-farm as well as farm families in the community, says Reagan Brown, sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Emphasis of Rural Life Sunday and Soil Stewardship Week this year will be on measures to help solve problems of rural poverty and stagnation, says Brown.

Rural poverty is sometimes caused by inadequate and inefficient use of resources, he says. A lack of skills, education, special training, and leadership ability can also result in poverty. And poverty may cause inadequate schools, poor roads, erosion of social and community life and economic retardation.

Church leaders are deeply concerned with the problems of low incomes and under-employment due to its crippling effect on the human personality. The broader concept of stewardship today is a concern for the welfare of people and the use of conservation to benefit them and not so much the preservation of the soil. The greatest threat we face today is the loss in human resources through under and unemployment, says Brown.

Our nation has a heritage of belief in the worth of the individual and a concern that each person has an opportunity to fully develop and utilize his capabilities. Thus, Brown says, the coming observance, beginning May 19, should seek to make it possible for everyone to reach his highest potential.
