Nine Constitutional Amendments Now Being Published

In this issue of the News there appears the full text of the nine Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election November 4. So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows:

Number One on the Ballot (HJR 1)—Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

Number Two on the Ballot (SJR 6)—Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and

Postal Rates to Be Increased on Friday, August 1

On August 1, an increase of postal rates will go into effect in all post offices, according to Alva Spencer, postmaster of the local United States post office.

An increase of one cent will be made on all first class mail. Letter mail will be one cent per ounce or fraction thereof instead of the usual three cents. Air mail was raised from six cents to seven cents per ounce not exceeding eight ounces. Postal cards will be three cents each with air mail postal cards being five cents each.

An increase has been made in rates for all types mail, however. Postmaster Spencer stated that persons desiring this information could call at the post office.

Effective July 1, all short paid mail carries a short of postage. If mail is sent short of postage the difference in postage plus the five cent penalty.

Starting August 1, all local drop letters will require three cents when mailed within the city. Out of town letters and mail to local routes must carry four cents postage.

Large Turn-Out of Foard County Voters Go to Polls Last Saturday

Over 1100 Foard County citizens went to the polls Saturday in the first Democratic primary, and elected Leslie Thomas county judge. Thomas won a decisive victory, 731 to 363, over his opponent, Claude Callaway.

In the County and District Clerk's race, Mrs. Blake McDaniel defeated Miss Dorothy Erwin, 569 to 533, to take the post now occupied by J. A. Stovall, who did not seek re-election.

In the only other county race, Coy Payne polled 311 votes to his opponent, Darvin Bell's 279, to win a second term as Commissioner of Precinct No. 2. In the other commissioner's race, Precinct No. 4, Warren Everson, the incumbent, did not have an opponent.

Foard County voters went along with other counties of the 46th Judicial District, and elected Tom Davis, young Vernon attorney, to the Judge's place, over the incumbent, Jesse Owens, also of Vernon. Davis received 591 votes to Owens' 492 in this county. Over the district, Davis received a total of 3,804 votes to Owens' 3,397, a margin of 407 votes for the victor.

In the race for Representative of the 82nd District, W. S. Healy of Paducah was re-elected over Leon Hart Brown Jr. of Vernon. In this county, Healy received 581 votes and Brown 399; over the district, Healy received 4,658 to Brown's 3,695.

J. W. Hazelwood was elected without opposition to the Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, a post now held by Nelson Olyphant. Olyphant was appointed by the Commissioners Court to fill the vacancy created by the death of Ben Greening earlier this year.

In the state-wide races, Foard County went along with the rest of the State and gave Ralph Yarborough 724 votes to Wm. A. Blakley's 331 in their contest for U. S. Senator.

Price Daniel, in his bid for a second term as governor, received 727 votes in Foard County. Gonzales 58, Irwin 52, and W. Lee O'Daniel 201, were the others in the governor's race.

Ben Ramsey defeated George Nokes, 731 to 230, in this county, in the race for lieutenant governor.

For Land Commissioner, Bill Allicorn, incumbent, received 595 votes to 211 for his opponent, L. J. Dimmitt.

2.2 Inches Rain Fall Here Sunday Night and Monday

US 70 Will Be Widened Soon in Cottle County

The Commissioners Court of Cottle County Monday of last week signed contracts to obtain additional right-of-way along US Highway 70, east and west of Paducah, County Judge A. A. Payne said that widening of US 70 would get underway by the Texas Highway Department as soon as the additional right-of-way is available.

US Highway 70 is to be widened through Cottle County from the west line to the east line to connect with Motley and Foard Counties where US 70 expansion has already been completed.

A right-of-way of 120 feet is needed for the project. The present right-of-way is only 80 feet, leaving 40 feet to be obtained by the Cottle County officials.

Widening of US 70 through Cottle County will close a gap of the few narrow roads that still exist along the coast-to-coast highway.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 65, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pensions; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 65. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 65, to read as follows: "Section 65. The Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 322, Acts of the Fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension. "These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy; fraternal organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia." "Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows." "Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as 51a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide for such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 51-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; and providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows: "Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 51a of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature, provided however, that the amounts paid out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts paid out of Federal funds for such purposes." "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States, such financial aid on behalf of the needy aged, needy blind, needy children, and needy persons who are totally disabled persons as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions hereinafter set forth." "Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds." "AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds." "Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

Great Plains Soil Conservation Program Gaining Momentum in Foard County

By JAMES H. HERRING

Farmers and ranchers participating in the Great Plains Conservation Program in Foard County are becoming aware that this program is long range and its purpose is to assist farmers and ranchers in carrying out approved plans of operations for the mitigation of climatic hazards and the protection of their land from erosion and deterioration by natural causes. They know to participate in the program, a farmer or rancher shall furnish a plan of operations which incorporates needed cropping systems and land use changes along with needed soil and water conservation practices

in proper combinations. They know that the plan of operations shall include a schedule for carrying out these measures within a period of not less than 3 years and not to exceed 10 years. They know the Federal government is authorized to enter into a contract to assist them in carrying out their plan of operations. The contract will assure the farmer or rancher of needed cost-sharing assistance as rapidly as conditions permit.

In six years (1964), the first nine farmers and ranchers in Foard County will have completed their plan of operations under the Great Plains Conservation Program. They will earn approximately

\$8,185.00 Federal cost-sharing assistance. These nine farmers or ranchers are J. C. Prosser, Sam Kuehn, Roy C. Steele, Frankie Halenack, Kenneth Halbert, S. H. Ross, W. R. Moore Jr., E. M. Burkhardt and Randy Halbert. Their farms and ranches comprise 5190 acres.

The plans of operations for their farms and ranches include the following needed cropping systems, land use changes, and needed soil and water conservation practices; 2258 acres of cropland will have soil improving crops offsetting the effect of soil depleting crops, 265 acres will have needed cover crops on land during critical erosion periods, 2090 acres will be farmed so as to leave crop residue on the surface of the soil throughout the year (stubble mulched), 917 acres will be farmed on the contour by using terraces as guide lines, 162 acres of cropland will be converted to grass, 110 acres cropland will be farmed in a strip crop pattern, 34,000 feet of terraces will be constructed on cropland, 40 acres of cropland will be grass to be used as hay and pasture, 35 acres of cropland will be devoted to waterways to provide safe terrace outlets, 29 acres of cropland will be used to furnish food and cover for wildlife such as quail, 3,699 acres of grassland will be deferred during growing seasons to allow grasses to seed, 1143 acres of grassland will have invading brush controlled to help eliminate competition of moisture for grasses, 466 acres of grassland will be reseeded to provide cover on eroded and overgrazed areas, 1 erosion control structure will be constructed with draw down tube to help stabilize a natural drain, 430 rods of fence will be constructed to get more uniform grazing on grassland, three farm ponds will be constructed to provide adequate livestock water, 134 acres of grassland will be chiseled to help moisture conservation, and 40 rods of net wire diversions will be constructed to divert water on good grassland areas.

Federal cost-sharing assistance can be earned for the majority of these practices by either Agricultural Conservation Program or Great Plains Conservation Program. Check with your local ASC office or Soil Conservation Service office for detailed information on these programs.

The ultimate goal or achievement of these programs are to bring about greater stability for the agriculture of Foard County.



Wanda Moore has carried on demonstrations of safety, clothing, bedroom improvement, frozen foods, gardening and yard improvement during her five years of 4-H work. HJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.
Section assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.
"IF the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."
"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a hospital district, the Legislature shall be authorized to create a hospital district in Jefferson County, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to any hospital district created in that county, and authorizing the county-wide hospital district in Jefferson County, Texas, and further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character.
"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
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"Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated limits of the City of Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County, Texas, and further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character.

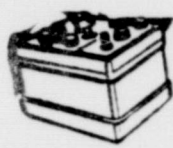

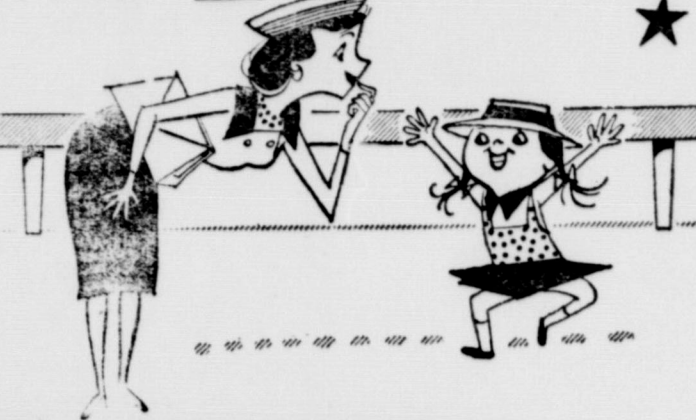

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide that any officer elected to any office in this State shall hold office for a term of two (2) years if the designation of their office is an even number, and for a term of one (1) year if the designation of their office is an odd number. Thereafter, all such officers shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution.

death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appoint-

ive officers and employes of the county or precinct.

Number Three on the Ballot (HJR 30)—Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

Number Four on the Ballot (HJR 31)—Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

Number Five on the Ballot

(HJR 48)—Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

Number Six on the Ballot (HJR 17)—Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

Number Seven on the Ballot (SJR 4)—Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising

ing the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

Number Eight on the Ballot (HJR 36)—Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the

purpose of paying such assistance. Number Nine on the Ballot (SJR 3)—Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District in the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.
