## Crowell Couple Injured in Wreck Near Iowa Park

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Callaway of the Foard City community are in a Wichita Falls hospital with serious injuries incurred when their pickup truck went out of control last Thursday and crashed on Highway 287 about a mile and a half west of Iowa Park.

They are reported to be in "fair" condition. He is 70 and she is 57 years of age.

The investigating Highway Patrolman said the couple was driving east when she lost control of the truck as they were passing another vehicle. The truck slid completely off the shoulder of the highway.

## Crowell Wildcat Band Received High Honors at Jacksboro Music Festival

The Crowell High School Wildcat Band, for the third year under the direction of E. L. Rickard, received high honors at the second annual Jacksboro Music Festival held last week end.

The band was judged in the first division in sight reading and second division in concert playing. In band contests, bands all compete for an efficiency rating rather than against one another. First division is excellent with a numerical rating of 95 to 100; second division is superior with a rating of 87-94; third division is good with a rating of 80-86; fourth division is fair with a rating of 73-79; and fifth division is poor with a rating of 72 or below.

"The first division rating in sight reading," according to Mr. Rickard, "marks another milestone in the history of the band. Never before has the band been rated so highly. This coupled with the second division rating in concert playing, are honors the band and school can be justly proud of."

## Pioneer Resident, J. N. Ribble, Has Ninetieth Birthday

J. N. Ribble, retired farmer and pioneer resident of this area, quietly observed his 90th birthday Wednesday of last week, March 14, at his home in the northwest part of Crowell. Mr. Ribble is unusually active for a man of his age and was chopping weeds around the house on his birthday. He has been a member of the Methodist Church for many years and with his wife is a regular attendant at the morning services of the church. He is also a faithful member of the Down Town Bible Class. Mr. Ribble still drives his car but is careful not to get in the down town traffic.

Born March 14, 1866, in Parker County, on Long Creek south of Weatherford, Mr. Ribble was married to Miss Eula Green in Wise County on Dec. 25, 1890. Nine children were born to this union, two sons and seven daughters, all of whom are living with the exception of one daughter.

Although he had worked on the 3D Ranch in Cottle County in 1885, he did not move to Foard County to make his home until 1892. He owned a farm 7 miles northwest of Crowell until he sold it and retired from active farming. He moved his family to Crowell in 1919 in order that his children could attend the Crowell schools.

Mr. Ribble's first wife died in 1913, and in 1942 he was married to Mrs. Ruby Walker. Mrs. Walker, mother of two children, says, "I always wanted to have a large family, but being denied that privilege, I just married into one."

Mr. Ribble's children are Mrs. Ola Hudson of Akron, Ohio, Mrs. Esther Dickerson of Crowell, Mrs. Gertrude Finley of Decatur, Mrs. Pearl Wright of Sweetwater, Oran Ribble of Shawnee, Okla., Mrs. Opal Dunlap of Vernon, Wm. Ribble of Sweetwater, and Mrs. Eula Shaw of Dallas. He also has 22 grandchildren, 23 great grandchildren and 3 great great grandchildren, one step-son, Jack Walker of Abilene, and two step-grandchildren, in addition to two brothers and one sister. The two brothers are Lock Ribble, 94, of Graham, and Com Ribble of Crowell. The sister is Mrs. Lee Thomas, of Clovis, N. M., a Foard County resident for many years.

**DOES 'BOTTLED COURAGE' MAKE A MAN?**  
 Back in the early history of the West, selling "firewater" to an

Indian was one of the most serious felonies a man could commit. Murder was just murder. When one man killed another, that was just one life, but a red man with a bottle and a rifle could start a war. Was the Indian really bad? No, it was whiskey talking.  
 "Bottled courage" they call it. I don't agree. When a man performs some great feat while under the influence of alcohol, that doesn't make him brave. He is still scared; he just doesn't have sense enough to run.  
 A boy becomes a man in the eyes of his friends when he can take a glass of whiskey and "kill" it. But the question is "Who's killing what?"

**ALCOHOL EDUCATION**  
 W. A. (Bill) Martin, director of education for Texas Alcohol, Narcotics Education Inc., presented an educational assembly program on alcohol to the student body March 15.  
 Mr. Martin listed the habits, once acquired, hardest to break in the following order: heroin, opium, alcohol, marijuana, on through the lesser habits such as nicotine and caffeine. He stated that the alcohol habit is harder because it takes longer to become an alcoholic. The average length

of time required to become an alcoholic is about 15 years.  
 Another surprising fact was that girls usually take their first drink about a year younger than boys. According to a survey of college students the average age for a girl's first drink is thirteen and a half years while a boy's is around the age of fourteen and a half.  
 An interesting fact illustrated by Mr. Martin with the use of charts was the effect of alcohol on the brain. A drink containing only one ounce of alcohol affects the part of the brain governing reasoning and the conscience. 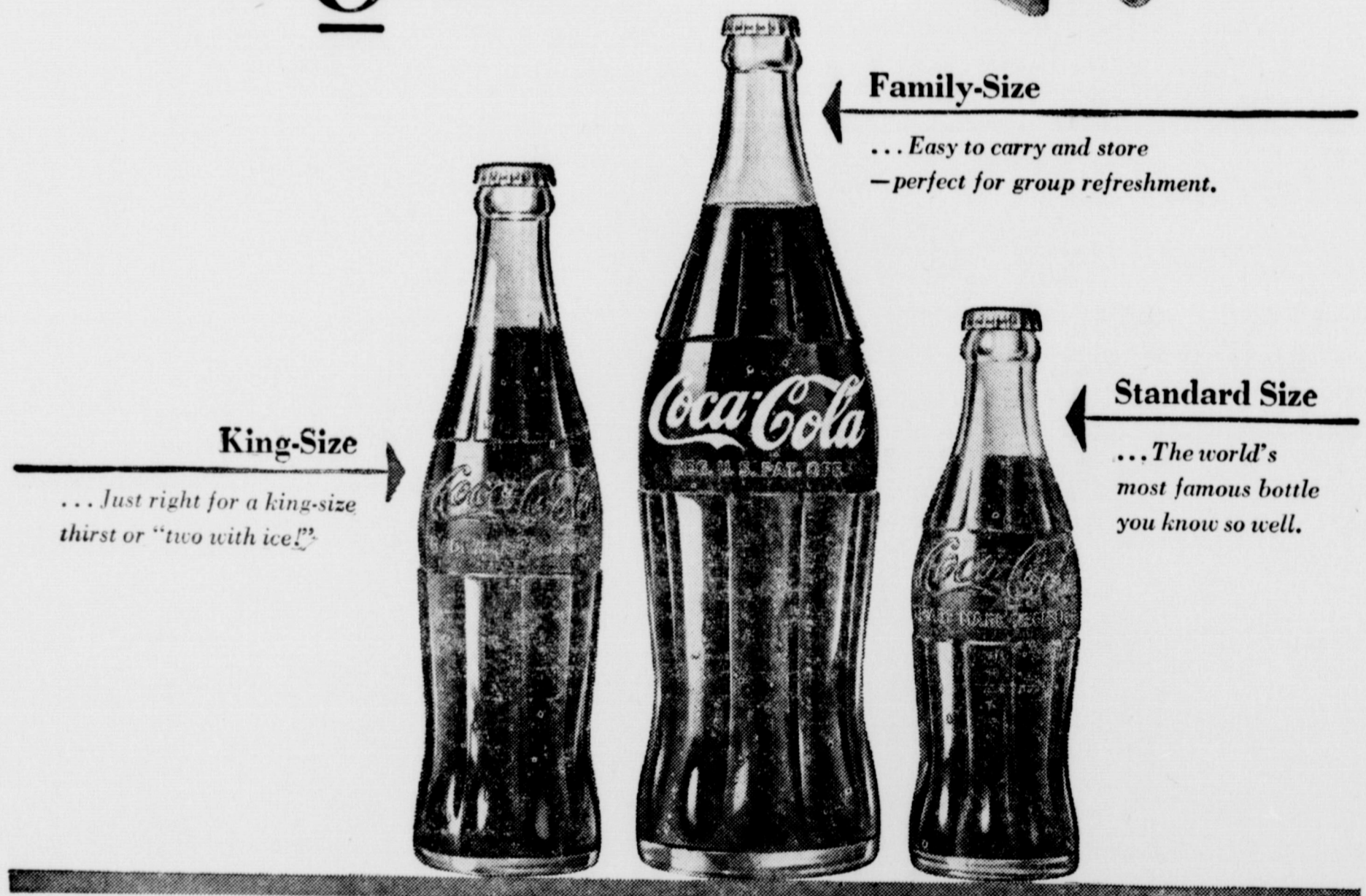

## 1956 Official Highway Map Now Available

The new 1956 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map is now available. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced in Austin this week.

The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information on Texas, Greer said. Most of the topographical relief was removed from the map last year so that more essential information can be read easily and quickly. The growth of the Texas Highway System at the rate of about 3,000 miles a year has made it necessary to gradually remove some of the less important information to make room for the increased mileage, he said.

In addition to the highways and the mileages between various points, the Travel Map shows state parks with recreational facilities, historical state parks, roadside parks, altitudes, and the Highway Travel Information Bureau. The pictorial side of the map features scenes of general interest both to Texans and out-of-state tourists, with every section of the state represented.

The Austin office of the Highway Department, the 25 district offices, and the seven Travel Information Bureaus near the state's borders all have maps available for distribution. Special map cards for requesting a map may be obtained at the tax collector's office when license plates are purchased.

Austin, Tex. — A long battle for interposition action begins in Texas next week.

At its Tuesday meeting in Houston the State Democratic Committee will answer Gov. Allan Shivers' proposal to place the interposition question on the primary ballot.

Reports also are to be made by the party's legal subcommittee and the Texas Committee on School Segregation. Both have been studying the suggested interposition referendum.

Governor Shivers is expected to ask voters to join his crusade against federal encroachment by giving the legislature a mandate for interposition. He will address the committee at a night meeting to which all Democrats from the Houston area are invited.

Later, Shivers will visit various parts of the nation. He will talk to leaders, without regard to party, and make speeches to gain nationwide support for the interposition movement.

Also on the executive committee's agenda will be the laying of groundwork for the upcoming convention battles. Liberal-loyalists have indicated clearly that they intend to fight the conservative party leadership at precinct, county and state meetings.

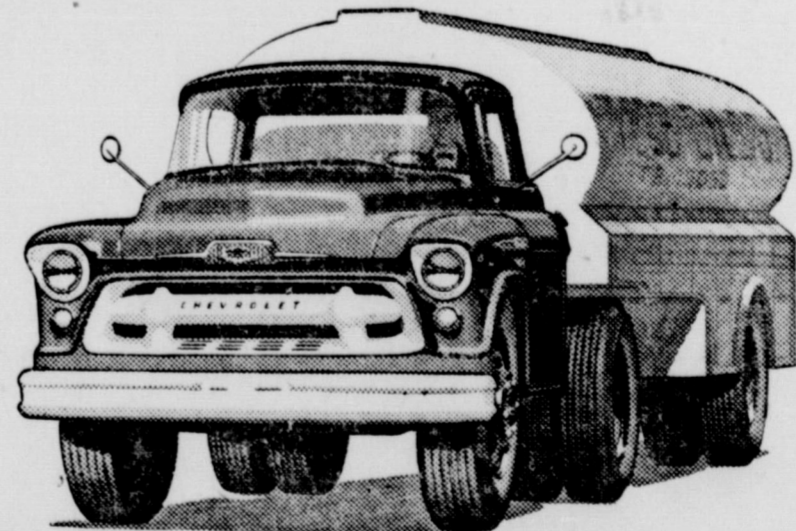

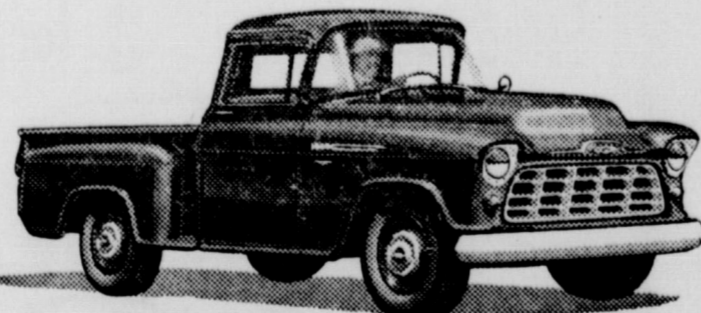
