No modern preacher will dwell on that subject very long, yet it is taught fluently in every language, and every Sanskrit catechism ever written. 


I have tried to conduct your District Court in a fair, orderly and dignified manner.

Retired judges are subject to assignment upon call to any district in the State and it shall be such judges' duty to serve in such district, unless for good cause presented by him in writing.

Every judge in the State contributes 5 per cent of his salary to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Judicial Retirement. The amount deducted remains in the State General Fund and is subject to appropriation by the Legislature, as other moneys. The Legislature appropriates such sums of money as may be necessary to carry out the retirement. The amount of retirement pay shall in no case be more than 50 per cent of a judge's salary at the time he retires.





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
