THIRTY YEARS AGO

The foundation for the Foard County jail has been laid off and sand, gravel and other material are being unloaded at the site for the new structure.

In the best and fastest basketball game that has been played here this season, Crowell broke the undefeated record of Childress High School by the score of 46 to 30 here Tuesday night. This was the 13th victory of the season for the Wildcats, who have not yet tasted defeat.

George Moffett of Chillicothe, incoming representative from the 114th District, passed through Crowell Tuesday while on his way to Austin for the opening session of the 42nd Legislature.

The greatest crowds in the history of Foard County are attending the county-wide revival that is being conducted here by Rev. B. C. Crim, cowboy evangelist of Marshall.

No fire loss amounting to \$15,000.00 or more in the city of Crowell in 1960.

Fire Department answered 35 fire calls in 1960. Seventeen of these were city fires, with four being grass fires; four were calls out of the county; 4 small trash and rubbish fires (very minor); 4 minor cotton fires (in the county and local gin); 2 minor electrical fires (power station and elevator); and two false alarms.

The Texas quail season closed January 8. It now is illegal to kill ducks, doves, deer, turkey or geese. Overall quail season under the general laws will close Jan. 16. The quail season west of the Pecos closed Dec. 31.

Game Arrests Bring \$12,921

Hunting and fishing without a license topped the list of arrests made in November by game wardens, according to the December report of the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. There were 55 who tried their luck hunting and 85 on fishing without first buying the required license.

There were 4 booked for hunting species on which there was a closed season. Night hunters accounted for 43 arrests. Game wardens also booked 15 persons for failure to have proper life preservers in boats.

In all, there were 399 arrests, and fines and costs came to \$12,921.58.

Bank Deposits Show Increase Since October

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank took a \$170,000-plus jump during the period from last October 3 through December 31.

The local bank's financial statement appearing in this issue shows total deposits of \$3,293,930.00 and the last statement of the bank—on October 3, showed deposits of \$3,119,590.74. This is a \$174,339.26 increase for the period.

Deposits at the end of 1960 were \$266,220.37 greater than on the same date in 1959—when deposits were \$3,027,709.63.
