





PILL OF DIFFERENT COATING

Doctors have devised a new method of studying stomach activity without the use of x-ray xaminations or the swallowing of tubes and balloons. The new echnique calls for a tiny magnet, coated with plastic for protection against corrosive gastric juices. When the magnetic "pill" is swalowed, its movements in response to stomach activity can be detected by a sensitive magnetometer, and charted.
