

Impact of Texas' record drought n the Animal Kingdom was reflected in still another way by intics confirming that generally the bobwhite hatch was far below normal, reports W. S. Jennings, assistant director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish

He said research by Wildlife Biologist Clyde Holt shows that North Central Texas habitat apparently was hardest hit since quail wing returns from ten counties in that area showed fifty per cent of the harvest bobwhites were

Mr. Jennings said that in nor-75 to 85 per cent of the opulation on the average.

If the hunters, through their clubs or as individuals, will work with the landowners to provide housekeeping quarters for Mr. and Mrs. Bobwhite, we are bound to have a happy ending to this prolonged crisis. Because the seed quail exist in most areas and everybody knows that quail with very little encouragement reproduce in amazing numbers."


