





"Since there has been some discussion among hunters in Foard and Hardeman counties concerning the opening and closing of the quail season, bag limits, etc., it seems that some explanation of the matter is in order. For more than 50 years the quail season and bag limits for quail were regulated by a general statewide law which set the opening date as December 1st each year and closing date as January 16th.

"About 6 years ago a new sys tem was started and some 40 or 50 counties have gone into the new system known as the Game Management Control System. This system permits the Game and Fish Department in Austin to set the opening and closing dates and bag limits for quail at such dates and such figures as it deems best. The Game and Fish Commission an set an earlier opening date than December 1 and the Commision does so when birds are plentiful. The Commission can also et a later time and smaller bag limit if it thinks that is best. Wilparger County and other counties bordering on Foard and Hardenan are under this new system.

"At the time this new system was started, I wrote to a considerable number of hunters in Harleman and Foard counties and asked their preference. About 90 per cent of the replies indicated a desire to keep Foard and Harleman counties under the general tate law instead of coming under






