STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

MORE MONEY FOR WELL STUDY—Governor Daniel has okayed the release of \$105,000 from Texas Railroad Commission funds to finance additional equipment, personnel and other expenses connected with the investigation of slant-well drilling and oil producing operations and pollution of public waters.

He also authorized Atty. Gen. Will Wilson to adjust his present appropriations to cover slant-well and anti-trust investigation expenses.

Meanwhile, the Railroad Commission called a temporary halt to oil well testing in East Texas and Hawkins fields, in order to re-arrange personnel.

TWO TERM LIMIT?—Another effort may be made to limit the term of office of the governor.

Similar resolution was unsuccessfully sponsored in the 57th Legislature. New proposal would set the governor's term at four years. It provides that he could not succeed himself in office.

Many legislators feel that such a system actually stretches a political life rather than limiting it.

PRESSURE POSSIBLE HAZARD—When Brad Smith, the governor's traffic safety assistant, learned that a fatal automobile crash occurred every other hour

MENTAL HOSPITALS CROWDED—State mental hospitals are crowded with elderly persons physically but not mentally ill.

Dr. C. J. Ruilman so reported to the House Committee on Saving Taxes.

Dr. Ruilman, director of mental health for the State Hospital Board, said about 25 per cent of the 16,000 patients in state hospitals are more than 65 years old.

"Our problem (in cutting state hospital costs) rests with patients who are physically sick," he said. "Of 3,500 elderly patients in state hospitals, only about 1,400 have serious psychiatric disorders."

HELP FOR RURAL HOSPITALS—Although federal funds have financed construction of more than one-third the hospital and medical facilities in the state, under the Hill-Burton Act, most of the aid has been given to big-city institutions.

Officials of the State Health Department, who make recommendations for the aid, feel that smaller communities have been penalized under former measuring standards. When new building all-otments are authorized for Hill-Burton assistance in September, requests from rural areas will be weighed according to "relative need."

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So far Hill-Burton projects around the state have been built at a total cost of \$310,433,369, with the federal government footing \$110,102,770 of the bill.

The Hill-Burton program is so popular in Texas that federal financing is twice the national average of 15 per cent of total cost.

CRIME EXPLOSION—Texas prison wardens and agencies interested in rehabilitation of "first offenders" are being haunted by the expected population bulge just as are colleges, universities, and for that matter, all future planners.

Post-war bumper baby crops which started in 1947 are expected to hit the cell as well as the campus in full force in 1964.

Three phases of clemency—suspended sentence, judicial probation, and state parole—are being studied as a means of keeping youthful offenders out of the penitentiary.

Objective is to make the prison an old settlers' home for hardened congenital criminals who cannot be rehabilitated, and who have aged in making their record.

MARKET TESTING HELPFUL—"People who have never known—and cared less—about brucellosis eradication are now getting their herds cleaned up," Dr. Seymour J. Smith told state animal health commissioners.

Awakened interest is due to the state-federal plan of market testing, under which a county can be modified or certified brucellosis-free without testing every herd.

Another animal health officer, Dr. H. H. Payne of El Campo, told the group that he never had seen anything like the mosquito menace in May, June and July, which caused an estimated loss of 50,000 Texas cattle and ruined many more in Jefferson and Chambers counties alone. "Some cattle are permanently warped from the long period of stress," he said.

Payne said cattlemen in the two-county area may be "wide open" for more trouble if fall showers cause the same condition that began when spring showers made mosquito-breeding beds out of brackish pools created by Hurricane Carla.

SCREW WORM BATTLE RAGES—Weekly production of sterile screw worm flies has hit the 50,000,000 mark and is expected to reach 75,000,000 by September 1, according to Dr. G. D. Stallworth of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

He said the battle against screw worms, initiated a year ago, is going so well that the Kerrville sterile fly plant is being closed down and all production centered at Mission.

Outcome of the fight for screw worm eradication this year may depend on winter's weather whims. "We're at the mercy of winter weather," Dr. Stallworth said.

Competitive bids received by the Texas State Board of Control show a substantial reduction in the prices since March of this year, and an even greater reduction over last year.

FIRST STEP TAKEN—Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports that an informal meeting early this month between the School Land Board and Submerged Land Advisory Committee marked the beginning of development of Texas' submerged lands.

He said the meeting "for all practical purposes initiated state industrial development of 1,500,000 acres of submerged lands and islands under the Reagan-De La Garza Act."

Sadler also plans to ask the Legislature to amend the act to include development of recreation facilities.

VET LAND INSURANCE—Veterans Land Board has re-affirmed its plans to offer credit insurance through a Dallas firm to 30,000 land purchasers despite a complaint lodged by Rep. Don Garrison of Houston.

William A. Harrison, insurance commissioner, advised Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler that a complaint concerning the company which will insure the veterans who borrow money from the state to buy land "seems to be an isolated case."

TEXAS OUT OF THE RED—Treasurer Jesse James reports that Texas' general revenue fund is out of the red after having been in deficit almost continuously for the past four years.

Revenues deposited to the credit of the general fund wiped out the deficit and raised it to a cash balance of \$4,601,020.

General fund may dip again periodically, but is expected to at least break even at the end of the current appropriation biennium—a year from now.

OUTDOORSMEN MEET—Henry LeBlanc, president of the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, invited members of outdoor clubs, the Boat Trades Association and water-skiing groups to meet with the SCOT Boat Safety Committee in Dallas on August 24. Enforcement of the Water Safety Act, regulation of boating, and building of boat ramps will be on the agenda. Also to be discussed will be the fees now being charged on some public waters for hunting, fishing and recreation.

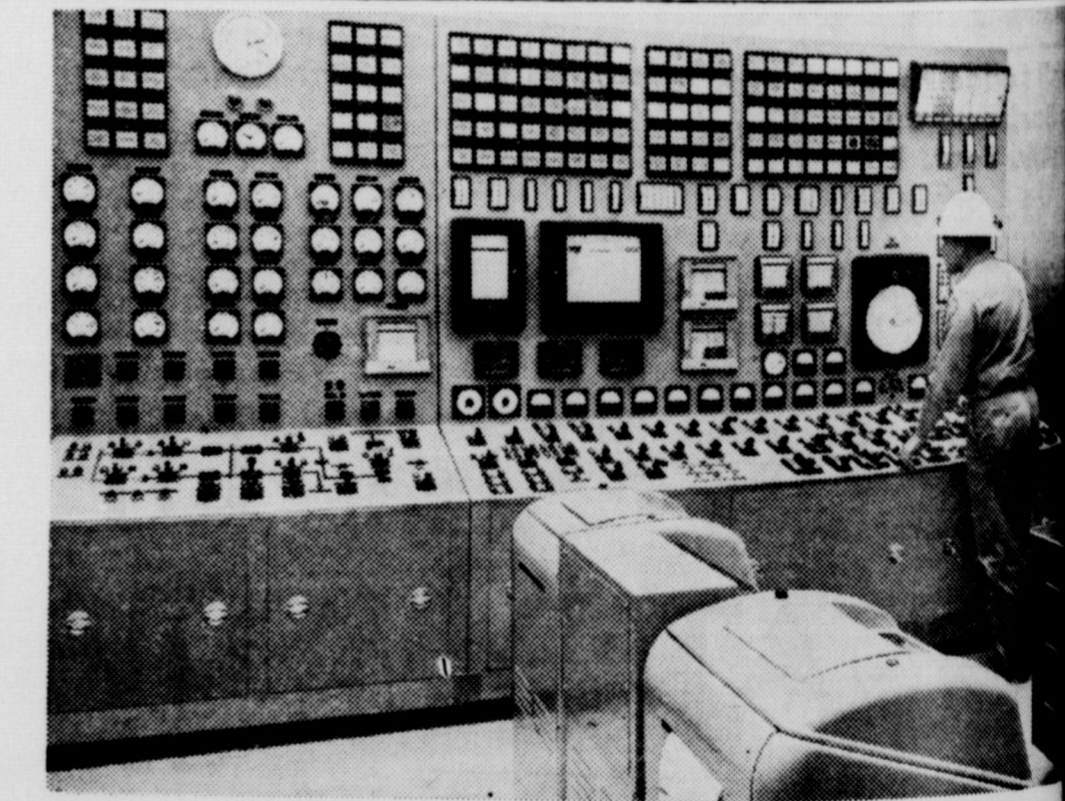

From Human Events magazine: "In an address in India, Ambassador John Kenneth Galbraith, former Harvard economics professor boasted that already one-fifth of the American economy is planned by the government. He said that if we take into consideration all current resources 'fully controlled and disposed of by the state, about 20 per cent of the American economy is planned.' Ambassador Galbraith pointed out that, as the comparable figure for India was only 13 to 14 per cent, 'the market economy of the United States has a larger public sector than the Socialist economy of India.' Translated, that means that now we're even more Socialistic than Socialist India."

Senator Byrd estimates that, under existing tax rates, the federal deficit for this fiscal year will be about \$6 billion. Tax cuts of a size now being discussed might raise this figure to \$15 billion.

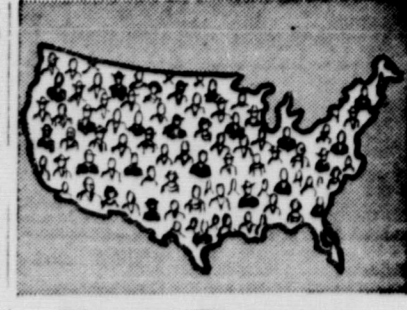

Intensive Effort to Be Made to Reduce Holiday Accidents

In an intensive effort to reduce traffic deaths, injuries and property damage over the Labor Day holiday, the Department of Public Safety will conduct "Operation Motorcade" from 12:01 a. m. Saturday, September 1, through 11:59 p. m. Monday, September 3. Major Harry Hutchison, Commander of the Department of Public Safety, Region No. 5, has announced.

"Operation Motorcade" — an all-out traffic safety campaign which calls for constant patrolling of Texas highways by officers of the Highway Patrol, Motor Vehicle Inspection, License and Weight and Safety Education Services — is geared to eliminate the "Terrible Three," and as many more accidents as possible of a predicted total of 30 highway deaths for the state during the Labor Day week end.

The Department of Public Safety predicted the 30 death total after a careful study of traffic accident statistics, including the figures from the last eleven Labor Day week ends which have accounted for 338 lives lost for an average of 30.7 persons per year. The largest holiday toll since World War II was in 1951 when 46 persons were killed in 33 accidents. The lowest figures for any year was last year when 21 persons were killed in 19 accidents. According to the regional commander, figures proved that most fatal accidents are caused by traffic law violations.

Major Hutchison explained that the "Terrible Three" refers to the first digit in the total of 30 predicted fatalities for the Labor Day period. "We hope to eliminate those first three deaths and end up with a zero score for a

change," Hutchison said. "We know that we can hold the total much lower than the 21 that died last year if we have the cooperation of the public."

Hutchison has ordered all men in his command to start a round the clock traffic safety effort with the beginning of "Operation Motorcade" in an effort to reduce the staggering number of accidents that kill and maim Texans during prolonged holiday periods. The regional commander has instructed his men to use all possible means to halt traffic violations that lead to automobile accidents. "Every radar speed meter in the region will be in action during the holiday," Hutchison said.

Despite the all-out effort by our traffic officers to prevent traffic accidents, the driver remains the key figure in a successful accident prevention program. Each and every driver can cooperate in making Texas streets and highways safe by giving their full attention to the full time job of driving according to the rules and regulations this Labor Day or any day. "Remember, every time a driver fails to obey the traffic law, he or she takes a chance on being involved in a traffic accident that could mean injury or death," Major Hutchison concluded.

"Carnival" received the coveted New York Drama Critics Circle

Award as the best musical of the season for 1961. The Broadway production is still running in New York and the show will be presented in Dallas by the National Company which boasts an outstanding cast.

"Carnival" is the story of a young French girl who joins a travelling carnival and is fascinated by the puppets who speak to her through the voice of the puppeteer, with whom she eventually falls in love for a very happy ending. In addition to the puppet show, there are acrobats, jugglers, dancing girls, a magician, trained dogs and even a dancing bear.

Based on the famous motion picture, "Lili," the musical has been produced by David Merrick, with music and lyrics by Bob Merrill and book by Michael Stewart, who also wrote "Bye Bye, Birdie." 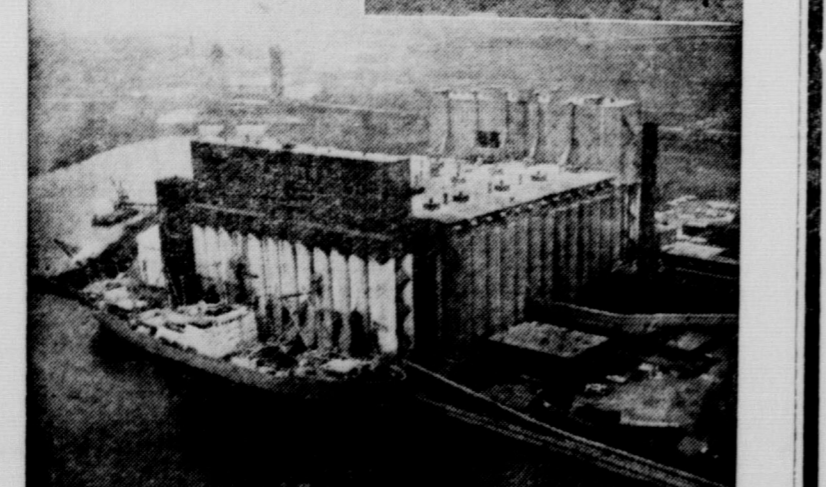

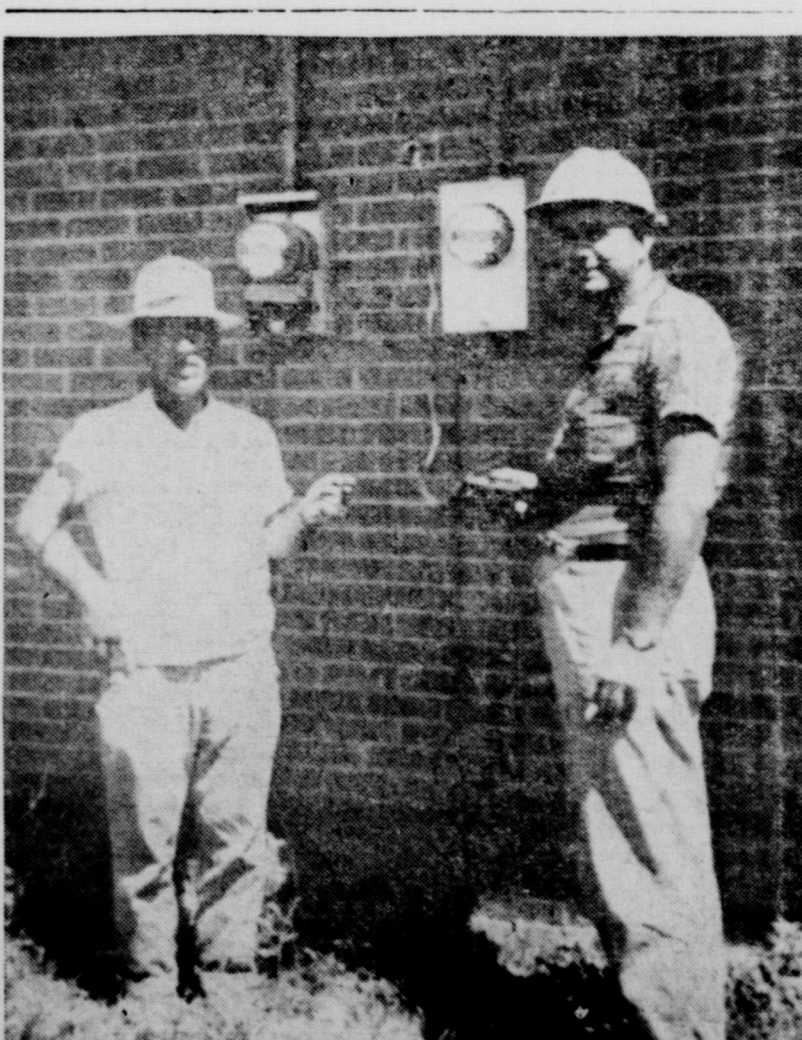

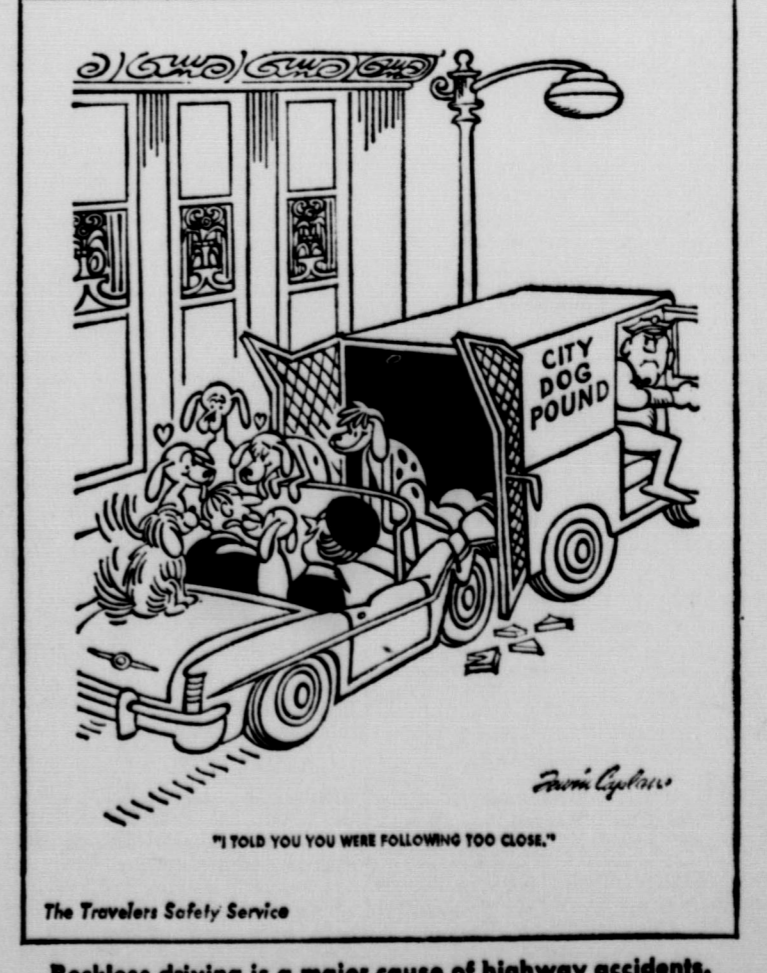
