## Farmers Gin to Make Rebate of \$26,000 Profits

The Farmers Co-operative gin is run for profits but for the benefit of those who have built it, that of the stockholders, and after all expenses of operation have been met the net profits there are in the treasury are prorated back to the stockholders according to the amount of cotton they have had ginned.

The amount to be thus prorated is \$26,000 as the profits of the past season's ginning, according to information that has been given the News. Round numbers the plant has ginned 65,000 bales this season.

This success of the Farmers Co-operative gin here is a fine demonstration of the possibilities of co-operation. It proves beyond question, too, that there is profit in such operation, for this money will go into the pockets of the farmers who have stood together and worked the success of their plant.

## Farmer Sends Wheat Worms to A. & M.

R. A. Cogdell is taking the right line in seeking information about wheat worms in this county that are causing some anxiety by sending some of them to R. R. Reppert, entomologist, at the A. & M. for examination. He expects to get a report from that department in a few days and we shall be glad to give his opinion when it is received.

From reports, there are more of these appearing in the wheat this year than was ever known before while there is little perceptible damage from them, it is feared that they may prove hurtful, and it is thought wise to get the entomologist's opinion.

How general these worms are is not known, but it is certain that there are a number of fields infested with them. Some have said, however, that they have found none in their fields.

## High Prices Paid for Royalties Near Thalia

Oil royalties are bringing big money in the Thalia community, as much as \$100 an acre having been recently. According to reports there is very little, if any, land to be leased and royalties are being paid. Lands as far west as the Thalia cemetery have been bought.

And since most of these are being bought by the oil interests it looks like an oil field is expected to be developed in that section.

## A Good Argument for Hard Surfaced Roads

In the mileage contest given by Ford dealers at Vernon the first of the week the contestants drove over hardsurfaced roads east of Vernon, all of the distance being that character of roads except about seven miles. In the contest here the week before they road over the best dirt roads in the county.

In the case of the two contestants from Foard County we have the following results. Pickrel made 33.6 miles here, at Vernon he made 40.9 miles. Barry made 29.1 miles here, at Vernon he made 39.8 miles. It shows from 7 to 10 miles per gallon more on hard-surfaced roads.

It looks like a pretty good argument for hard-surfaced roads. The reader can figure this out for himself and ascertain his saving in the run of a year. Practically it would mean a saving of one-third in gasoline alone, to say nothing of the saving in time, wear and tear of machinery and repair bills. The average automobile owner would save from \$15 to \$50 on gas. The saving of time and injury to automobiles would run it up far above that.

## Marketing Problems Discussed Last Week

The Co-operative Marketing Association of Texas held a two day marketing school and lectures here last week. The speakers for the meetings were Judge L. Gough, President Texas Wheat Growers Association, Amarillo; C. G. Graham, Field Work Director of the Texas Wheat Growers; F. A. Caperton and C. G. Coglan, field men for the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, and Mrs. Phoebe K. Warner of Claude, Texas, who is one of the chief speakers in the series of marketing schools. Eight meetings were held in the county, four at Crowell, and one each at Thalia, Foard City, Margaret and Vivian.

A portion of the time at each meeting was given to a round table discussion of the various marketing plans that are practiced by the Co-operatives and the way that the prices are made, the speakers showing that the law of supply and demand does not have as much to do with the market as it should. Each stressed the need for orderly marketing.

The meetings in Crowell were concluded by an address by Jno. T. Orr, 2 p. m. last Friday. Mr. Orr has been president of the Texas F. B. Cotton Association for the past six years. He remarked that he was joining the field forces for a few weeks of the Association of Texas and that he was anxious to find out the sentiment of the farmers, their ideas, etc., relative to the cotton association. Mr. Orr stated that the association receipts to date in Texas under the new contract is nearing 200,000 bales of cotton, and that the average number of bales per member delivered under the new contract is much more than under the old contract. According to Mr. Orr, the final distribution will be made in April, however, he said the usual plan had been to make the final distribution in June and that no definite steps had been made to that effect, but that he was sure the directors would be in favor of making the final distribution earlier this year.

## Veterans to Get Low Rates to Reunion at Pampa

According to information given out at Dallas last week, the Confederate Veterans who attend the reunion at Tampa, Fla., April 5 to 8, will get very low rates. Tickets will be on sale from April 1st to 6th, in Texas and Oklahoma, and these will be good for return until May 5th.

For the information of any who may wish to attend from Foard County are publishing this from the Dallas News of last week:

The rates will be made only to those holding official certificates issued by their local organizations. Blue certificates will be issued to all veterans and members of their immediate family who accompany them. Pink certificates will be issued to sons of Confederate Veterans, United Daughters of the Confederacy, members of the Confederate Southern Memorial Association, Children of the Confederacy, sponsors, maids, chaperons and matrons.

Southwestern and Southeastern railroads have agreed on the following rates: Veterans from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri and Kansas will pay the one-way fare from their home to the Mississippi gateway city used (say Memphis, Vicksburg, New Orleans or some other crossing.) This one-way fare will pay for the return trip from the same gateway city to their home. However, to reach Tampa, that section of the journey from the gateway city to Tampa will take a much lower rate for the veteran and members of his immediate family accompanying him. This second part of the trip will require a railroad fare of only 1c a mile in each direction.

## Pease River Dam Near Crowell to Be Big Project

Whether the big dam will be built on Pease river near Crowell is not a certainty, but in the opinion of many it is a reasonable certainty at least. The promoters have not gone far enough with the project yet to give assurance of its reality. One of the things, we are told, upon which it depends is whether the dirt is of such character as to warrant the building of a dam and that will not be known until a report from the State Board of Engineers is had.

In case the dam is built, it will be one of the biggest projects ever undertaken in the entire country. The drainage area will cover 2800 square miles and will embrace portions of Foard, Hardeman, Childress, Cottle, Motley, Hall, Floyd, Crosby, Brisco and Dickens counties. The approximate acreage available is as follows: Hardeman, 13,000; Foard, 12,000; Wilbarger, 266,000; Wichita, 184,000. The estimated acreage irrigable is 350,000.

## Mileage Contest Attracts Much Interest Saturday

There was quite a lot of interest manifested in the Ford mileage contest here Saturday. Prizes were offered both for the closed and open cars. The winner of the \$15.00 prizes was Mr. Pickrel, geologist for the Roxana Company, with the open car, a roadster, which made 33.8 miles on a gallon of gas, and Bill Barry with the closed car, a 4-door sedan, making 29.1 miles.

Morris Kenner made second with the open car, a Ford touring, getting 32.5 miles, while Paul Bishop won second with the closed car, a coupe, making 28.7 miles. A close contestant for second place was little Frances Allison with a 4-door sedan, making 27.5 miles.

The general average of the nine highest cars was 28.6 miles.

During the Civil War the colonel achieved fame by patrolling the Indian infested Mexican border. Following the Civil War, Colonel Goodnight began blazing cattle trails throughout the southwest and established the famous Goodnight trail in 1866 which extended from Fort Worth to Laramie, Wyo.

At one time in his life Colonel Goodnight owned more than 2,000,000 acres of land and more than 100,000 head of cattle. His bride, a native of Colorado, moved to Montana several years ago and since has been in the employ of the Northern Pacific railway at Butte, as a telegraph operator.

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## Crowell to Be Big High Line and Switching Center

The West Texas Utilities Company has let a contract to the L. E. Myers Construction Company to build a new 66000 volt H frame electric line from Monday by the way of Truscott to Crowell, and from Crowell to Quannah, and from Crowell to Paducah.

This line is being built in order that the West Texas Utilities Company may deliver and sell to the Central Light and Power Company at Quannah 2700 horse power of electric current and to serve all towns on the high line.

This line when completed will be one of the highest powered lines in the South and will be capable of carrying 330,000 horse power. Seven car loads of material have already been unloaded by the West Texas Utilities Company here and nineteen more carloads are expected in within the next forty days.

About the first of April the Myers Construction Company expects to start the hole diggers out of Crowell toward Monday and out of Monday toward Crowell. With 200 men and 25 big trucks this construction crew will push the job fast to completion which will probably last until early Fall.

Besides the present new light plant standing always ready, Crowell will be assured of forever having service with this net work of high lines coming to her sub station from three directions. These lines will make it possible for Crowell to get electric current from the light plants at Abilene, Texas; San Angelo, Texas; Wichita Falls, Texas; Paducah, Texas; and Lawton, Okla.

In order that the high voltage current off the high line may be reduced to a usable voltage of 110 volts, a \$100,000.00 sub station will be built southwest of the Commercial Hotel. This sub station will be equipped with a switching house and switches for the connecting or disconnecting of all incoming and outgoing high lines, together with a high line telephone for the load dispatcher.

It looks like the West Texas Utilities Company meant what they said when they stated that they would always give Crowell real electric service, and Crowell citizens fully appreciate the great strides they have already made and are making toward this end.

#### WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

(By West Texas Cham. of Com.)

Baird—Blare of booster bands and flash of booster colors will enliven Baird March 23rd when delegates of the Oil Belt District attend the West Texas Chamber of Commerce regional convention March 23. Large delegations from Cisco, Ranger, Eastland, Abilene, Albany, Stamford, and other towns have signified their intentions of coming in groups.

Stamford—E. H. Whitehead, for the past two years publicity manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will be moved to Fort Worth to take charge of the Fort Worth office of the organization which was vacated when Ray Leeman resigned to become manager of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce. Whitehead will continue to supervise public

licity work of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and will continue to work portions of the western territory.

Munday—The local chamber of commerce has resumed activities after remaining inactive for some months. Pledges of support are indicative of big accomplishments for the organization during the present year.

Lampasas—Lampasas County has a fine source of revenue in demands for its noted high grade cedar posts. Orders for Lampasas cedars come from many points. A recent call for three car loads was received here.

Panhandle—Panhandle is to open an early spring paving program, according to plans being worked out between the chamber of commerce and the city officials.
