

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



TO VOTERS

82nd Legislative District

When I became a candidate for Representative from the new 82nd District which now includes counties in the old 88th District it was my expectation that the campaign would be devoted to matters connected with the State Government. But since my opponent, Mr. Alex Ben Saied of Childress, has published unfounded charges that insinuate improper conduct on my part as a public official and as a cilizen, it seems appropriate to call attention to certain facts in Mr. Saied's record.

- 1. Records in the District Court of Hood County for the April Term, 1951, show that judgment was rendered against Mr. Saied for personal injuries suffered by the plaintiff in an automobile accident, the amount of the judgment, including costs and interest, was \$3,017.42.
- 2. The record further shows that on the 30th day of April, 1955, the holder of the judgment against Mr. Saied transferred to five doctors in Tarrant County a portion of the judgment. The amount of the transfer was \$620.35 and was to be satisfied out of the first money obtained in execution of the judgment.
- 3. On May 10, 1956, Mr. Saied filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the United States District Court in Amarillo. In the sworn statement accompanying the petition Mr. Saied stated he had sold during the month of December, 1955, to Morris Higley the following securities: 50 shares of National Founders Life Insurance Company stock for \$100, eleven shares of American Trust stock for \$7.50 per share, and ten shares of ICT stock for \$5 per share.
- 4. In the above mentioned petition Mr. Saied listed his assets, which included a contract of purchase with the Veterans Land Board on which a down payment of \$153.53 had been made, a \$2,000 life insurance policy with a surrender value of \$64, a 1955 model Cadillac automobile and unspecified personal effects. The Cadillac was valued at \$3,500. (The referee in bankruptcy held that no equity existed in the land purchased from the Veterans Land Board and that the Cadillac and personal effects are exempt by law from execution for the payment of debts of a bankrupt).
- 5. Mr. Saied declared in his bankruptcy petition in 1956 that he had no money and no bank account and that his total income of the two years preceding filing of the petition was \$42.50 per week as a clerk.
- 6. Claims against Mr. Saied listed \$550.00 in fees owed to a Childress attorney, \$300 to a resident of Childress for a loan obtained in 1955, \$1,200 for indebtedness for losses sustained in a partnership business in Duncan, Okla., \$3.000.07 judgment for injuries inflicted in the Hood County accident, and \$275.00 for car damage in the same accident.

Voters of the 82nd Legislative District might be interested in knowing how Mr. Saied was able to own and operate a late model Cadillac automobile, meet payments on a land purchase and maintain the living standards of a successful business man and outstanding civic leader on a total income for the two years preceding his voluntary bankruptcy petition of only \$42.50 per week.

Another matter which Mr. Saied might explain to the voters is why should a man of his reputation file a petition in bankruptcy when the major claim against him was in settlement of a judgment for injuries to a young girl and could have been settled for less than the sworn value of his Cadillac automobile.
