Hearings on obections from organizations and dividuals are set for September. According to adoption procedtres, anyone may protest a book. But no one can defend a protested book, except the publisher. He can file a written rebuttal after applications for hearing objections are received in August.

One step toward blanket censor nip was taken by the Board itself hen it refused to accept Educaon Commissioner J. W. Edgar's ecommendation to re-adopt five high school economics texts. Some board members felt the books were anti-capitalist.

R. W. Byram of Austin ignored Rep. W. T. Dungan's request to hold action on the matter until the House Textbook Investigating Committee, which he leads, has, time to evaluate the disputed books more carefully.
