Bank Deposits Top \$4 Million

4-H Records Due in County Extension Office by August 9

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the close of business on June 29 soared to \$4,028,430.81, according to the bank's financial statement printed in this week's News.

Deposits have risen over a million dollars since the statement on March 18 this year—showing the results of the wheat harvest.

June 29 deposits also are about \$23,000 above those of a year ago and are nearly one million above December 28, 1962, at which time they were \$3,089,712.25.

The last statement of the local bank which showed deposits of over \$4 million was on June 30, 1961, which also followed a good wheat harvest.

Billy Graham Movie Slated at Baptist Church Tonight

Evangelist Billy Graham's newest feature-length dramatic film, "Shadow of the Boomerang," will have its Crowell showing Thursday, July 11, at 8 p. m. at the First Baptist Church, the pastor, Rev. Glenn Willson, said Monday.

Starring vivacious Georgia Lee and television's Buffalo Bill Jr., Dick Jones, "Shadow of the Boomerang" is an outdoor action picture with all of the excitement and breath-taking scope of the land, "Down Under." Setting for the screen drama is Australia's "Outback," the continent's vast interior region where some of the world's largest cattle stations are located.

The two young Americans head an all-Australian supporting cast, playing brother and sister roles in a turbulent story of homestead life.

Filed against the backdrop of the Billy Graham Australian Crusades, "Shadow of the Boomerang" seeks to underline the Godly reaction to human crises and conflicts. For the victors, besides the Matthews-Carroll hits, Frog Smith hit two-for-two, and Steve Black picked up one hit. Of the five Banker hits, three came in the final inning.

Yankee batsmen Mike Weathered, Junior Urquizo, Mike Matus and Israel Santos each came through with one hit, besides the big blow by Jim Tom Smith.

Tuesday, July 2, 8 p. m.: V. F. W. 12, Foard County Mill 8. Foard County Mill threatened constantly in this one, but VFW stayed a jump ahead all the way. Mill hitters could only pick up four hits off the slants of Castaneda and Barrera, as Jimmy Johnson, Danny Naylor, Larry Dobbs and Ishmael Santos each hit safely once.

City Officials Attend Greenbelt Water Meeting

Mayor Henry Black and City Councilmen Recie Womack, Robert Kincaid and Leon Speer attended the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority meeting in Childress on Friday of last week. Dr. S. H. Townsend of Childress, president of the Greenbelt board of directors, discussed the Greenbelt reservoir with the Crowell men and invited the City of Crowell to become a member of the authority.

If Crowell should join the authority, it would be necessary for the citizens to petition the authority for membership. If the Greenbelt authority were to approve Crowell's entrance, then it would be necessary for the City officials to appear before the State Board of Water Engineers to make formal application for their approval. With the approval of the State Board of Engineers, it would then be necessary for the citizens of Crowell to vote on a water sales contract for water from the reservoir. A tax on property would not be necessary to finance the project. Revenue bearing bonds issued by the authority would pay off the project within 35 years.

Mayor Black says that if Crowell ever joins the authority, it must do so now, for it would be necessary to have a two-inch larger line from Childress to Quanah for Crowell to receive water. The line from Quanah to Crowell would be of 14 and 12-inch dimensions. It is estimated that the line from Quanah to Crowell would cost \$650,000, but the price paid per thousand gallons of water would pay for the pipe. Cost of water delivered to Crowell would be 40 cents per thousand gallons for the first five years. After that time, the rate would be re-evaluated and based on the city's use of water during that period. S. W. Freese, consulting engineer for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, says that it has been found in other similar projects that a city's rate usually goes down because of the increased use of water.

Under the proposed plan, Crowell would receive the first water from the reservoir in 1966.

In order for Crowell to participate further in the Greenbelt project, qualified voters must approve the water purchase contracts through a special election that will probably come up in August.

The engineers are preparing detailed information for Crowell, and it will be published as soon as available. Mayor Black urges the citizens of Crowell to study this proposed project.

Cecelia Drabek Is State's Top Four- Square 4-H Girl

Miss Cecelia Ann Drabek of Foard County and Elvis Spradling of Kent County this week were named to represent Texas at the 1963 sessions of the American Youth Foundation Leadership Training Camp, Stony Lake, Michigan. The 1963 season is the 50th year for the camp-conference type program.

Miss Drabek is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Drabek of Crowell.

In making the announcement, Floyd Lynch, state 4-H Club leader, said Miss Drabek would attend the camp session beginning July 29 and ending on August 11 and that Spradling would attend the August 12-25 session. Each, he added, will receive a full camp scholarship from The Ralston Purina Company and travel expenses from United Gas.

The four-square title signifies that both campers-to-be have excelled in leadership work, character development, as students and in church, school and community affairs. Special training is offered during the camp in Christian ideals, personal foundations and enrichments, and leadership principles and practices. Daily camp activities are divided between class work and recreation. The major objectives of the training is to assist young people to discover and develop their best selves, to help them make constructive life adjustment, and to better equip them to guide others, Lynch explained.

Both are veteran 4-H members and college students. Miss Drabek attends the University of Dallas and is majoring in chemistry while Elvis attends Rice University and is majoring in physical education. Both have long records of achievement and leadership in 4-H and have served as officers in their local clubs, high school organizations and are active in college affairs.

Participants in the Foundation's camping program come from the 50 states and five Canadian provinces.
