Most of you are aware of the Golden Holiday Nursing Home, and its service to the Community. There are, at present, 55 residents of the Home. It has been remodeled once, and facilities expanded, but even then seemed to be inadequate to the needs to be met. They are in the process now of expanding once again. Twelve patient rooms, adequate for 24 patients, a sitting room and a large bathroom are in the process of construction. Two of the rooms will have private baths, and the others semi-private baths.

We extend to Mrs. Brandon and her staff our congratulations for the improvement, and for the excellent care that is given to those who are residents in the Home.

If you have not visited there recently, we suggest you go by and rejoice with those who are responsible for the improvements being made, and speak a word of appreciation and encouragement. This is a facility of which Baird can be justly proud. Not only does it provide a home for deserving people, but it provides employment for many who would otherwise be unemployed.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam E. Webb are among the residents of the Home at present. They are Charter members of the Baird Methodist Church. Mr. Webb told me this morning that his father had planted an acorn when he was born, and that the oak tree is still growing. (He didn't say how long ago that was). But it is good that the roots planted deep in the soil of Callahan County do not have to be pulled up and that a place is provided where the proper care can be given when the need arises. It may not be quite like the old home used to be, but at least it is better than the way some people have come to live. For instance, Bill came home one day and was telling his wife about Joe's flat in town. "You'd never believe it, Nancy, but Joe pays \$80 a month for a room and a half."

"They got a bed-in-a-door. Honest, it pops out like a jack-in-a-box, and they got a slide-in table here, and a slide-in table there, and a hole-in-the-wall where there's ice, and when everything's put away there's almost room for three people to sit and read the papers. Radio, Sure, and under it's a music cabinet and over it's a telephone, and long side it's a foldin' typewriter desk and you could put the whole thing in a gunny sack."

"Yes, indeed, and Joe's so busy he don't even know the name of the folks next bed-in-a-door to him and honest, Nancy, Joe's wife runs down to the basement to a delactessen just five minutes afore dinner, and gives an order, and the whole meal comes up slicker'n silk just as Joe comes in from the office. "Talk about milkin' by Lectricity, we still got a lot to learn out here, says I, and when farmin' gets a concentrated as livin' in thos' bed-in-a-door all we'll need's a check book, and some push buttons and a filin' cab'net."

GOAD MURDER TRIAL GETS UNDERWAY HERE

Dr. Durwood Varner Named Chancellor At University Of Neb.

BAIRD — Dr. Durwood Varner, son of the late Professor and Mrs. Harry Varner, has been named Chancellor at the University of Nebraska.

Dr. Varner, born at Cottonwood in 1917, graduated from Texas A&M University, with honors, and did graduate work at the University of Chicago. He has been Chancellor of the University of Oakland, Rochester, Michigan, for the past 10 years, a University which has seen considerable growth during his tenure at its leader.

At Nebraska, Dr. Varner will head a system consisting of three campuses, the main campus at Lincoln, two at Omaha, and the University of Nebraska Medical School.

Dr. Varner served as a tank destroyer officers during World War II, being discharged from the service in 1945 as a Lieut. Colonel. He will begin his duties on February 1, and he and his wife and daughter will make their home in Lincoln.

A nephew of Dr. Varner is H. T. Varner of Baird.

11 Men, 1 Woman Selected for Jury

BAIRD — A total of 189 persons answered their personal jury summons last Monday as the murder trial of Curtis Sherman Goad, Jr., 26, of Cross Plains, opened in 42nd District Court. A special venire of 200 people had been called for possible jury duty. Of these, 11 failed to appear, four lived out of the county, and there was a mix up on several of the names.

Individual selection of jurors began Monday morning after Judge Raleigh Brown had heard excuses from persons as prospective jurors.

Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter is prosecuting, assisted by Bill Thomas, a former District Attorney, both men are from Abilene.

Attorney Charles Scarborough of Abilene was appointed to defend Goad, and he is being assisted by his father, Davis Scarborough, also of Abilene.

Through questions asked prospective jurors by defense attorney, it became apparent that Goad will contend that he shot Richardson in self defense and also in the defense of another.

The prospective jurors are questioned one at a time by the lawyers, while the remaining prospective jurors are outside in the hall.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks of Baird was subpoenaed as a witness for the defense and he was barred from participating in the actual trying of the case.

Ed Paynter will probably ask for the death penalty in the case and prospective jurors are asked how they feel about capital punishment.

Prospective jurors were being questioned Wednesday until 7 p. m. when they were recessed for supper and asked to return about 8:00. After returning from their meal, the first person called was Mrs. Stella Yost. She was questioned very briefly and then the last and final juror, Clovis McCollum was called to the stand for questioning. He was questioned until about 9:05, at which time he was accepted.

Mrs. Hope Evans is the first and only woman juror selected in the trial. She and her husband live on a ranch south of Baird. Jurors selected are: D. D. Ingram, Cross Plains; Duane Loper, Rt. 2, Clyde; and Clovis McCollum, Rt. 2, Moran.

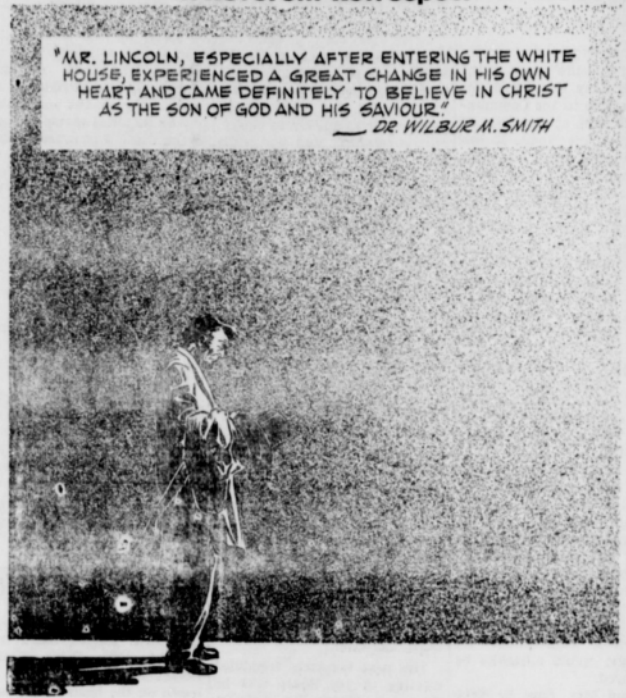
