BAIRD — Dr. Durwood Var-ner, son of the late Professor and Mrs, Harry Varner, has been named Chancellor at the University of Nebraska.

Dr. Varner, born at Cotton. wood in 1917, graduated from Dr. Varner, born at Cotton-wood in 1917, graduated from Texas A&M University, with honors, and did graduate work at the University of Chicago. He has been Chancellor of the University of Oakland, Roch-ester, Michigan, for the past 10 years, a University which has seen considerable growth dur-ing his tenure at its leader. At Nebraska, Dr. Varner will head a system consisting of three campuses, the main cam-pus at Lincoln, two at Omaha, and the University of Nebras-ka Medical School. Dr. Varner served as a tank destroyer officers during World War II, being discharged from the service in 1945 as a Lieut. Colonel. He will begin his duties on February I, and he and his wife and daughter will make their home in Lincoln. A nephew of Dr. Varner is H, T. Varner of Baird.


