To the Democratic Voters of Foard County:

Dallas, Texas, July 6th, 1926.

Pursuant to wire to citizenship last Saturday, at the rally in Crowell, I feel that I should let the people know the true facts with reference to the McBeath case now being made political propaganda in your county. In the beginning I want to state that I have no political preferment for any candidate and am not sponsoring the interest of any person, but it has come to my attention that statements have been broadcast all over the county that Mr. Parlin McBeath was cruelly, and inhumanly treated by the peace officers and prosecuting officers in this and Hardeman Counties, in connection with the death of a member of his family. I do not feel in this first place that a matter of investigation of violation of the laws should ever be injected in politics, and again if the peace officers and prosecuting officers are making an honest and faithful effort to enforce the laws, then they ought to be encouraged instead of being criticised. To properly enforce the law, all of these officers need the hearty co-operation of the citizens and without this factor, the laws cannot be enforced.

As to the treatment Parlin McBeath received at the hands of the Peace Officers of this district, I want to say that he was not mistreated in any way known to me. Mr. McBeath was arrested in connection with one of the gravest crimes in our criminal category and even though he may be innocent of any connection whatsoever with the offense, his own statements and acts more than warranted his apprehension, not for the offense of murder, but as an accomplice and harboring the offender. It was the intention of the writer to be present and explain in detail the facts in this case, and while I have no personal feeling in the matter, yet as long as I am under an official oath to perform my duties in accordance with the laws, and one of them is to work in harmony with and "back up" so to speak, the Peace Officers, I am going to do so to the best of my ability, especially as long as they use reasonable discretion. In the investigation of the instant case, it might be well for me to add that a great number of officers working both day and night were interested, and Mr. McBeath was apprehended and charges placed against him after much detailed work, and any reasonable person knowing the facts as we knew them would agree with me. There was a strong probability of the guilt of Mr. McBeath as being an accomplice in this unfortunate case and much stronger than in usual cases where circumstances are relied upon in seeking to uncover the truth. Mr. McBeath has filed a law suit against the peace officers in Wilbarger and in Foard Counties for false imprisonment and false arrest, etc. I am at a loss to know whether this is done for the purpose of and with the idea of realizing financial remuneration or whether it is done for political purposes. It matters not with me, which he has in mind and when the facts are detailed to a jury in your county, my honest prediction will be that a jury of good citizens will say that there was no error on the part of those trying to enforce the law.

Far be it from me to, in any respect, mistreat any person, and if such statements are being made in your county that any Peace Officer or officer entrusted with prosecution for the State, in any manner, mistreated Mr. McBeath, the same is without foundation and false and no person would make such statements if the true facts were brought home to them, for I personally know that Mr. McBeath was never in the custody of the sheriff of Foard County, except in the courthouse there for investigation for a few hours, and was carried to Wilbarger County by the sheriff's force of that county.

The citizenship of your county have honored me by electing me to the office of District Attorney, a position of trust and honor and I cannot fully express my appreciation of this fact, and those who know me, will say that I at least make an effort to conscientiously perform the duties of the office I hold, and I personally resent any insinuation that I aided any peace officer in this district, or directed any of them to mistreat, browbeat, falsely imprison or otherwise wrong Parlin McBeath or any other citizen, and it is with deep regret that sickness in my family prevents me being there in person and relating these facts as all transaction with reference to this case were done legally and the steps taken by all peace officers were justified and warranted under the circumstances and the laws of our State.

It has been a long time since one brought or mailed us a "chain" letter, accompanied by the admonition that we must pass it on or evil would befall us. We have been a little reckless about the way we dealt with these letters. Instead of passing them to somebody else with the same message we received we have always worthwith passed them to the wastebasket with slangy thoughts and have realized no serious consequences, so far as we could discern, except a slight lashing of conscience for not being a little more tolerant towards the superstitious.

Still accidents with "unloaded" guns happen. A child drops one and it is discharged and fires a bullet through its body, or some boy is playing with his daddy's gun and it goes off and shoots himself or somebody else, and these accidents are heralded in the columns of the papers almost every day. Anybody ought to have better sense than to point a pistol, loaded or unloaded, at himself or anybody else. Of course, if you want to kill somebody, that's a different thing.

Somebody has declared that if the people do not quit riding in automobiles everywhere they go the race will soon be without legs. That will be a sad day for us, to be sure, but so far one finds little or no proof to substantiate such declaration. The fact is they are more in evidence than ever before in the history of the world.

Chinese Elm Has Proven to Be Good Tree for West Texas

There has been considerable inquiry, experimenting and speculation in regard to the best kind of shade trees for West Texas. Many kinds have been tried and the most of them have been found to weaken under the drouthy condition, be of too slow growth, or fall prey to the attacks of bugs and insects.

In a recent bulletin received by the county agent, which was put out by the Experiment Station on the experiments of shade trees for West Texas, it is pointed out that the Chinese Elm has proven itself superior in many ways as a shade and also as a drought resister.

R. E. Karper, assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in discussing the characteristics of the Chinese Elm: "This is a new tree which was introduced a few years ago from china by the office of seed and plant introduction. It has been tested out for the past seven years by the Lubbock Experiment Station. There has been many trees scattered over all West Texas in an effort to give it a trial and only good reports have been received. There are a few nurseries in Texas that have a limited supply of the trees and many are planning to propagate them in considerable numbers." Mr. Karper says further, "The tree having an extensive surface root Chinese Elm is a drouth resistant system. It has numerous small leaves, making a dense shade and is remarkably fast growing and is easily transplanted."

There is nothing that adds to the attractiveness of a home like a few nice shade trees. Those who are contemplating planting shade trees might bear in mind some of the facts about the Chinese Elm.

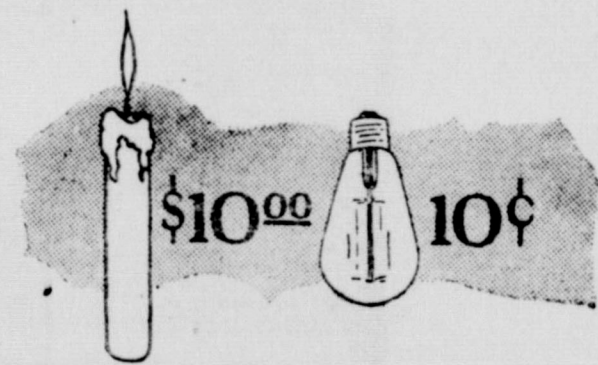

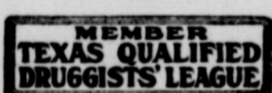

THE CHIGGER

The chigger is a pestiferous varmint because he bores into the skin and refuses to be dislodged. He pulls the hair in behind him and access to his abode defies all human ingenuity.

The only encouraging thing to be found on the subject of chiggers is that they don't live long. Their average life in temperate climates is about twenty-five days, which is much too long. But there is consolation in the fact that the chiggers of the tropics are as large as mosquitoes and live as long as Methuselah.

Swear at the chiggers if you must, but above all things, don't try to dig them out with your finger nails.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 14, Section 54, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 14, Section 54 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 54. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management

and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 14, Section 54, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 14, Section 54, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Art. 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land privately owned" and "Against the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of

the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office, any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, and to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States," and:

"Against the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

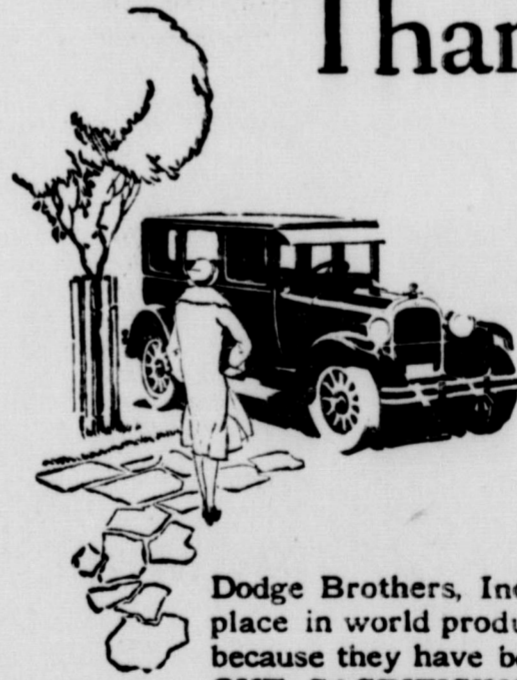
