



An Ordinance prohibiting bathing, swimming, wading and any other mode of contamination of water in the City Lake of the City of Crowell, prescribing a penalty and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROWELL:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to swim, bathe or wade in the City Lake of the City of Crowell, erected upon the north half of Section No. 482, in Block "A," of the Houston and Texas Central Railway Company's survey in Foard County, Texas, or any tributary entering or emptying into said

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, or cause to be put in said lake, trash, rubbish or filth of any character whatsoever, or place the same, or cause the same to be placed in such location where such trash, rubbish or filth may be washed or blown in said lake.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to place any matter whatsoever in such location as is likely to contaminate the water in said lake and its tributaries.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hun-






