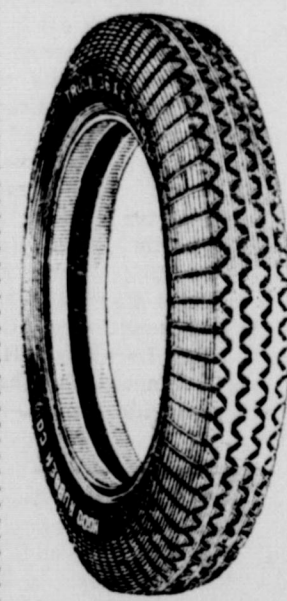

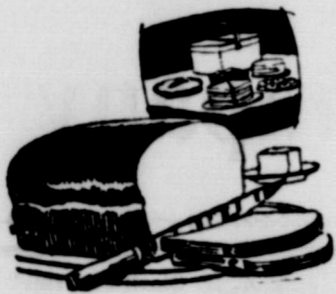



The killing of D. E. Chipps by J. Frank Norris in his study at the First Baptist church in Fort Worth last Saturday is one of the most regrettable affairs that has happened in Texas recently. It matters not whether one agrees with Norris in the tactics he uses and in the policy he pursues in his work, one can but deeply regret that such tragedy is now a matter of record. Granting that Norris has been and is still doing a great work in his fight against evil, should he live to an old age this thing must follow him all along down the pathway of time to stare him in the face: "He killed a man." He has had some hard fights, but we doubt if he ever had a harder one than that of overcoming the unenviable reputation of having at one time taken life. Under different circumstances he might have won out with greater ease. Had he been shoved into the corner of his office with a weapon in his face and through some turn of fate he had taken life in order to save himself from an inevitable doom, it would have been different. But under the circumstances the decree of a jury will never be sufficient to entirely reinstate him in the minds of those who were liberal enough to wish him well in any fight he might make on sin. In our opinion the things he stood for would have been better served had he given himself a martyr for them.

**An Ordinance prohibiting bathing, swimming, wading and any other mode of contamination of water in the City Lake of the City of Crowell, prescribing a penalty and declaring an emergency.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROWELL:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to swim, bathe or wade in the City Lake of the City of Crowell, erected upon the north half of Section No. 482, in Block "A," of the Houston and Texas Central Railway Company's survey in Foard County, Texas, or any tributary entering or emptying into said lake.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, or cause to be put in said lake, trash, rubbish or filth of any character whatsoever, or place the same, or cause the same to be placed in such location where such trash, rubbish or filth may be washed or blown in said lake.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to place any matter whatsoever in such location as is likely to contaminate the water in said lake and its tributaries. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars.

The fact that the City Lake is nearing completion, and the further fact that the water from said lake is to be used by the inhabitants of the City of Crowell, for domestic purposes, there being no adequate Ordinance protecting patrons using water from said lake, protecting them from using impure water creates an emergency and imperative public necessity, that the rule requiring all Ordinances to be read on three several meetings be suspended, and that this Ordinance take effect



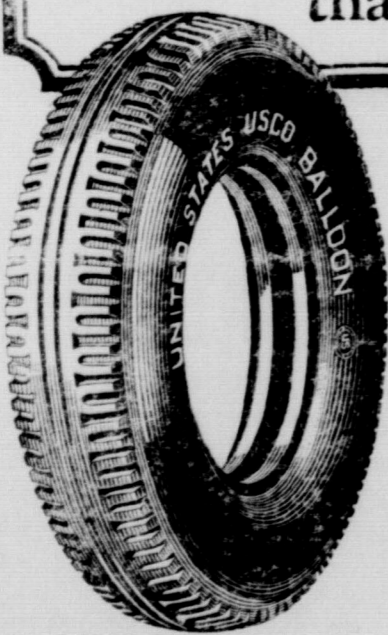

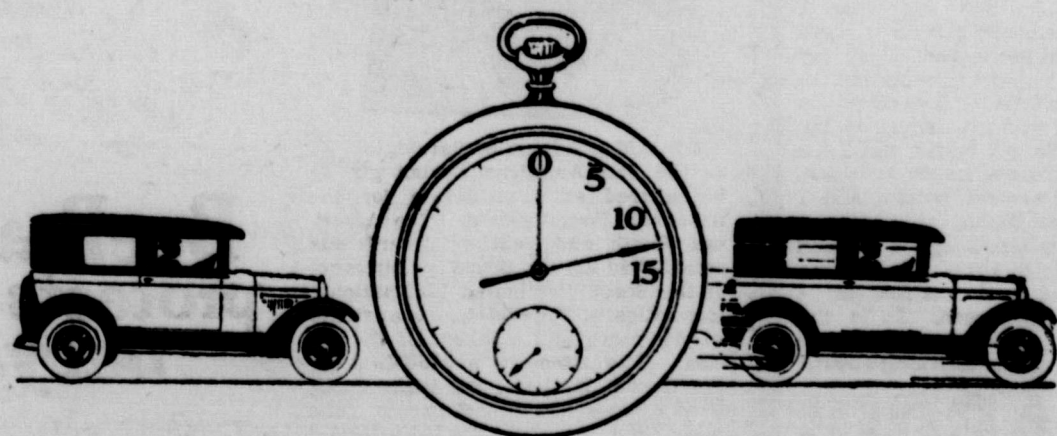

The report, as gotten from a Kansas City paper, is that the wheat crop of the Northwest, including the Dakotas and portions of Canada, has gone to the bad and is therefore far below normal. 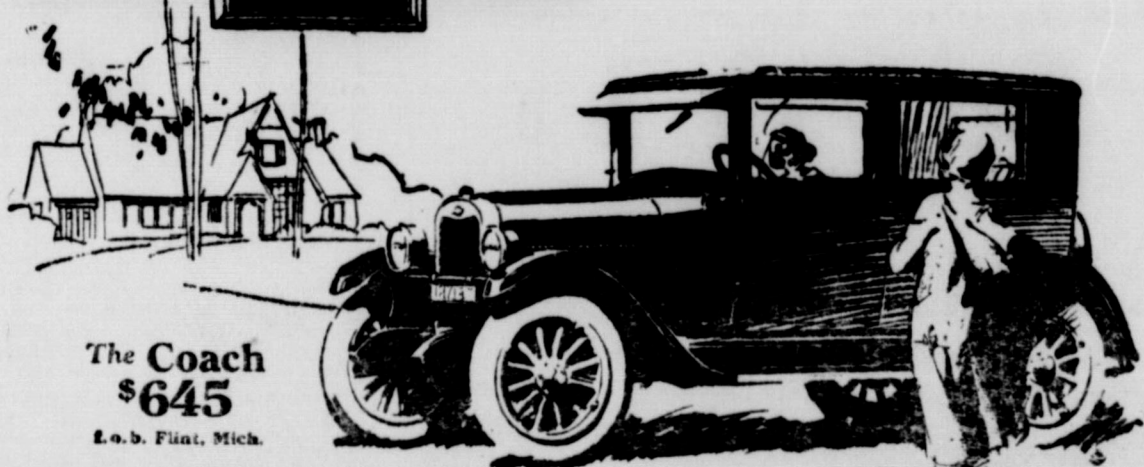
