The church of Christ is different because it nas no man-made creed to state its position or for members to ascribe to. Its members ascribe to and believe the Spirit-inspired word of God as its only rule of faith and practice (2 Tim. 3:16,17, John 16:13, Matt. 17:5, Heb. 1:1,2).

The church of Christ is different because it calls Bible things by Bible names and does Bible things in Eible ways. Peter said, "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God." (1 Pet. 4:11). Therefore, the church of Christ does not call the preacher "Reverend," nor "pastor," nor "priest," nor "Father." It does not refer to the Lord's supper as the "eucharist" nor "the mass."
