## Clyde School Reaches All Time High

CLYDE — Enrollment in the Clyde Public Schools has hit a new all-time high mark. A total of 900 students were enrolled as of Monday, Jan. 11. Enrollment this year is the highest since 1965-1966 school year.

Current enrollment of 900 pupils represents an increase of 72 over the closing enrollment last year and an increase of 70 pupils over last year's mid-term enrollment. Total enrollment has increased 42 students since the first week of school. The School Board and Administration are study possible means of easing the space problems created by the expanding enrollment.

He will also judge the breeding sheep at 10:30 a. m. and fat lambs at 11. Swine judging will begin at 1:30 p. m. with the Brown County Agent doing the placing.

Lawrence Winkler, Shackelford County Agricultural Agent, will judge all the cattle on Saturday. Dairy judging will kick off the day's events at 10 a. m., followed by beef heifers at 11. The steer show will begin at 1:30 p. m. with Winkler doing the judging.

C. Lee Smith, Clyde area rancher and farmer, is general superintendent and chairman of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Assn., which is sponsoring the event. Other officers include Vice Chairman, Don Harris of Cross Plains, Treasurer, Edwin Baum of Cross Plains, and Secretary, Greg Gerngross of Baird.

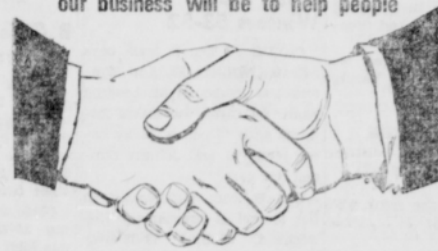

## WHY THE CHURCH OF CHRIST IS DIFFERENT

The church of Christ is different because it calls Bible things by Bible names and does Bible things in Bible ways. Peter said, "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God." (1 Pet. 4:11). # ACTIVITIES FOR 1970 BAIRD CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

BY CLAUD HOLLEY

We wish to briefly discuss with you, the Membership, some of the 1970 activities of your Chamber of Commerce and call attention to problems in our opinion should have most serious consideration for 1971 and following years if our Community shall progress.

We are indebted to a number of local Citizens feeling the need of an expansion area for Industrial, Business Home Building. Your Chamber of Commerce worked very closely with these men in the formation of a development Corporation to purchase approximately 52 acres of land north of IH 20. The property has been surveyed and plans proposed which takes into consideration the above mentioned purposes. We feel this to be a most important and progressive action.

Our efforts on some kind of Industry have continued without success. Presently we are making new contacts calling attention to possible sites along IH-20. Our efforts will continue under the handicap of not having Industrial Foundation funds to compete with other localities. We will cooperate with the development group for any industry of business.

Your Chamber of Commerce has been most active with the West Texas Telephone Company in their proposal to make Baird headquarters for some 15 exchanges in this area east and west from us. The Chamber contacted the State Office in this regard. Later Company Officials visited our city and we were advised that possibly an area warehouse and central billing office would be located in Baird. This program will likely be ac-

tivated in 1971 and 1972. We feel most fortunate and this action is of great importance to Baird.

We have been most active in attempts to get FM Road from Union Hill traffic diversion on IH-20 running west of Shady Oaks, South across FM Road 18 and West to Eula and a spur south to Clyde Lake. We joined Clyde People in several discussions with District Engineer Jake Roberts and following his suggestion to appear before the Texas Highway Commission requesting designation of 13 1/2 miles. County Judge Dyer requested the hearing and representatives from Eula, Clyde and Baird along with County Judge Dyer and Precinct One Commissioner Irvin Corn requested the road in the Austin hearing. The matter is pending and we are hopeful of at least a part being approved for construction in the near future.

At the end of 1969 we felt the securing of a Physician was at hand. We were again disappointed after much work and aggressive assistance from many people. We especially recognize outstanding work by the owners of Golden Holiday Nursing Home. We are in contact with prospects and shall exert every effort to solve this very perplexing problem. You are assured much effort has been given this matter by your Directors and we gratefully Acknowledge assistance from many people.

Due to many requests by mail and telephone for available hunting leases in Callahan County we joined efforts with our County Agent, Parks and Wildlife representative and Soil Conservation Service. With the four groups all land owners in the County were sent questionnaires regarding desire to lease by day or annual for all game. Returns gave a list of about 37,000 acres and property owners were listed on brochure type information sheet to be given or mailed to hunters requesting information. The Chamber of Commerce office mailed 34 and answered in person or by telephone 23. This boosted the County economy by several thousand dollars.

Much work has gone into the paving program and presently work is under way on 4 blocks

with several blocks mostly signed. The program should total several blocks before completion.

Your Chamber of Commerce opposed closing of T. & P. Depot and arranged a Railroad Commission hearing in Baird. At the present time no official action has been taken.

Requests for Housing in Baird in the Chamber office shows heavy demand which have been met where possible. I am sure we could have moved additional Families into our Community if housing were available.

We have continued to answer inquiries on Baird and Callahan County, approximately 90 such inquiries have been answered.

The Chamber of Commerce has worked closely with our FFA and 4H Boys and Girls. Also with our RCA and Junior Roddeos.

We are most Appreciative of the cooperation of our City, School and County Officials in our work.

We have made every effort to accomplish the things best for the greatest number of our Citizens.

As for 1971 and what your Manager believes to be vitally important are hereby mentioned for your Sincere Consideration. With Area Expansion rapidly progressing we have an opportunity to bring new residents to Baird if Family Housing is available. We also find Families wishing to live in small Cities and having their Children attend smaller Schools. We feel the solving of our Family Housing Problems to be of Major Importance to our future. We have Excellent Schools, Churches and City Services and you can help in solving this problem. Remember, 10 New Families will economically equal a small industry.

We of course must keep working on the securing of a Physician.

Work with the City Land Company of Baird to develop the new area mentioned previously.

Work closely with the West Texas Telephone Company on their plans in Baird as this will mean an economic increase. Here

again the Housing Problem comes into focus.

We should and must increase our services to the total Community.

Since your manager also serves as Executive Director of the Housing Authority we wish to report the Elderly Housing and Community building is progressing after a long and unavoidable delay.

We offer sincere appreciation for your cooperation and support. And may we urge your expression of Ideas and Dedication to the Future Well Being of our Community.
