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Talks with Orient Officials About Daylight Service

While he was in Kansas City last week, J. W. Bell took the matter up with the Orient officials of giving Crowell daylight service, and while they could not make any promises definitely, he thinks they will consider the matter favorably. Mr. Bell pointed out to President Kemper the fact that the Orient is not hauling our mail and that express is 24 hours late in arriving in Crowell, a fact that had either been overlooked or had never been known by the officials. Mr. Kemper assured Mr. Bell that he and all the Orient officials were not unkindly of the friendship that Crowell and Foard County had shown the road when it needed our friendship more than now, and just as soon as conditions would warrant it they meant to give us better service. And Mr. Kemper indicated that that time was approaching, that the road is getting on its feet and one day would be a great line serving the people to the full measure of their needs and requirements.

Speaking of the present condition of the Orient Mr. Bell says it is improving all the time, and that now at Altus it looks like there are enough ties for the entire line ready to place at points where they are needed. Also that the road is becoming equipped with news cars and better engines.

Mr. Bell's idea is that the Orient can put on motor cars between Altus and San Angelo to give this section daylight service and connect with the Denver at Chillicothe in time to handle the mail and express. He was led to believe that there is a probability of our getting this service when he was told that on the west end of the road where motor cars have been in use the freight hauling in the developing oil fields is getting too heavy for these motors and thinks that engines will have to take their places, which will release the motors for service along other portions of the line.

Officers Capture Still Last Sunday

Sheriff L. D. Campbell and City Marshal R. J. Thomas captured a 25-gallon still on Jim Teal's place near Foard City Sunday and took Mr. Teal as prisoner. He was brought to Crowell where he made bond to appear in the district court here at the next term.

Special Features of the Tournament

In addition to the regular polo games of the tournament on the Minnick ranch, steeple chase and quarter mile races will be held on each of the two Sundays of the tournament. Probably the outstanding feature outside of the regular polo games will be the steeple chase races covering a two mile course with over six jumps, three feet and six inches in height. Twenty starters for this event are practically assured including six horses from Oklahoma and other entries from many other sections of the Southwest. Entries in the quarter mile races include some of the fastest horses in the Southwest and the races are expected to be among the most thrilling ever held in West Texas.

FIRE SAFEGUARDS

The day never passes, particularly at this season of the year, when one or more lives are not taken by fire. A heavy tribute is paid in human life because of carelessness.

Yet, loss is being gradually reduced, in both life and property, through fire prevention methods taught in every conceivable manner. Fire prevention activities were started as early as 1892 by the national board of fire underwriters, and at first the task seemed hopeless.

The general impression once was that if property was insured, it made little difference whether it burned or not—the insurance company paid the bill. Then the human element was scarcely considered.

If the insurance business had wished to follow the easiest road, it could have accepted this view and have charged rates sufficient to cover the risk involved. It saw, however, that it had a public duty to perform from the standpoint of educating the public as to the necessity of fire prevention. It was an uphill struggle to obtain public cooperation. But today, after 35 years of fire prevention activity, the American people really cooperate with the insurance companies to reduce fire losses and thereby reduce the cost of insurance, which means the saving of lives and property.

The average town government throughout the land realizes that if it wishes low insurance rates it must enforce laws and ordinances which keep the town clean from the standpoint of rubbish, dangerous building construction and all sorts of fire hazards; and that it must have, in addition, a suitable water supply and fire fighting equipment. Public schools are teaching children the danger involved in the careless handling of fire. The general public has been pretty thoroughly awakened to the fact that our average annual fire loss of \$5 per capita is the greatest in the world and a heavy drain on the resources of the nation.

Taxes Collected for City 93 Per Cent of Whole

The city rolls for the year 1926 showed taxes due to be \$19,677.90. Of this amount \$18,397.93 were collected, an amount approximately 93½ per cent of the whole.

This is a record the city may well be proud of and reflects not only the substantial financial condition of the citizens of Crowell, but their splendid support of the city government and their co-operation in helping to make it a better town in which to live. After all, any town is just what its citizens make it.

They are its government in the real sense. It means much that the people of Crowell are steadily making it one of the substantial little cities of this country. This is reflected more now than ever before in the building of scores of modern homes.

SOME HAIL SUNDAY

Most of the stones were large and therefore too scattering to cause crop damage that the small stones cause.

The hail storm caught R. D. Oswalt and family five miles north of town as they were coming from Quanah and force of the wind drove the water through the hood of their car, killing the engine, so they came to a standstill in the middle of the storm and patiently waited for the falling ice to cease before advancing further. The big stones went through the top of their car but did not break any of the windows.

Postal Receipts Show Steady Gain for Last 4 Years

Since that time the increase has been steady, so steady in fact that it reflects the growing condition of the country possibly more than the growth of business in any other business institution in Crowell.

ORDER AND NOTICE OF ELECTION UPON THE QUESTION OF AUTHORIZING COUNTY ROAD BONDS AND LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

THE STATE OF TEXAS, County of Foard.
On the 28th day of March, A. D. 1927, the Commissioners' Court of Foard County, Texas, was convened

in regular session, the same being the third day of same, at the regular meeting place thereof in the court house of Crowell, Texas, with all the members of the said court present, viz: J. E. Atcheson, county judge; A. B. Wisdom, commissioner precinct No. 1; D. A. Sollis, commissioner precinct No. 2; E. V. Halbert, commissioner precinct No. 3; W. F. Thomson, commissioner precinct No. 4; Mrs. Ida Reavis, county clerk;

when there came to be considered the following petition of more than fifty of the property taxpaying voters of said county, to-wit:

Petition for Election upon the question of authorizing county road bonds in county that has no road district

THE STATE OF TEXAS, County of Foard.

To the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Foard County, Texas:

We, the undersigned resident property taxpaying voters of Foard County, Texas, respectfully pray your honorable court to order an election to be held in and throughout said county to determine whether or not the bonds of said Foard County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$400,000.00, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said county, not later than thirty years from their date, for the purpose of construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said county; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property of said county, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

And it appearing affirmatively to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty resident property taxpaying voters of said county.

And it further appearing affirmatively to the court that the amount of bonds proposed to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said county;

It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed by the Commissioners' Court of Foard County, Texas, that an election be held in and throughout said Foard County, Texas, on the 27th day of April, A. D. 1927, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order to determine whether or not the bonds of said Foard County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$400,000.00 bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum and maturing at such time or times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than thirty years from their date, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said county, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all the taxable property of said county, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

In the event such bonds shall be authorized and issued then ad valorem taxes are to be levied annually on all taxable property within said county sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of S. B. No. 287, General Laws enacted by the 39th Legislature at its first called session in 1926.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and of this county and who are resident property tax payers in this county shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition, to issue such bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the issuance of the bonds and the levying of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof."

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

At the county court house, clerk's office, in Crowell in voting precinct No. 1, with W. W. Griffith, as presiding officer;

At county court house, county judge's office in Crowell in voting precinct No. 2, with J. H. Self as presiding officer;

At county court house, tax assessor's office in Crowell in voting precinct No. 3, with A. T. Schooley as presiding officer.

At county court house, county court room in Crowell in voting precinct No. 3, with S. S. Bell as presiding officer;

At school house building in Margaret in voting precinct No. 5, with W. A. Dunn as presiding officer;

At Thalia Garage building in Thalia in voting precinct No. 6, with Walter Johnson as presiding officer;

At Thalia Gin office building in Thalia in voting precinct No. 7, with W. S. Tarver as presiding officer;

At school house building in Foard City in voting precinct No. 8, with W. A. Barker as presiding officer;

At Black School House building in Black Community in voting precinct No. 9, with W. W. Nichols as presiding officer;

At Vivian school house building in Vivian community in voting precinct No. 10, with J. M. Marr as presiding officer;

At L. O. O. F. building in Rayland in voting precinct No. 11, with T. F. Lambert as presiding officer;

At Good Creek school house building in Good Creek community in voting precinct No. 12, with J. T. Dashi as presiding officer.

The manner of holding said election and canvassing and making returns thereof shall be governed by the general laws of this State when not in conflict with the provisions of
