



THE NECESSITY OF BEING BAPTIZED

Many people have been taught that baptism is of little or no importance. Some believe baptism is alright, but not necessary in order to be saved. Some believe that a person is saved before he is baptized, but that he ought to be baptized because he is saved. What does the Bible say? Surely we all want to be-lieve and follow the Bible on this subject!

Baptism is plainly commanded. "And he com-manded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord." (Acts 10:48) Can we be saved without obeying a plain command of the Bible?

Jesus himself placed salvation AFTER baptism, not before it. He told His apostles to preach it thus. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. He that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16:15,16) Should we take the liberty to change things about from the way Jesus stated them? Are they any longer true if we change them to suit our-selves?

Peter. by the authority of Jesus, preached that baptism is necessary in order to have the remission of sins. "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins. and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2.38) Observe that repentance and baptism are for the same thing. If one has to repent in order to have remission of sins, then he must also be baptized in order to have remission of sins.

Baptism makes one a member of Christ's body. "For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body." (1 Cor. 12:13) Can one be saved without being in Christ's body?
