Approximately 32 students will compete in the Bee including students from Muleshoe Junior High School, Mary DeShazo Elementary, Three Way School and Bula.

First place winner will receive a \$15 check from the Journal and a plaque. She or he will also receive a pen and blue ribbon from the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and will represent Bailey County at the Regional Spelling Bee to be held next month in Lubbock.

Political Resume' Of County Hospital District

Facing a crisis five years ago, and facing the possibility of having no hospital open in Muleshoe in the near future, a group of concerned men formed a non-profit organization to purchase the two existing hospitals in Muleshoe to keep at least one hospital open.

At the time, Green Memorial Hospital did not qualify for federal medical programs because of the structure of the hospital. The West Plains Hospital was reduced to one doctor on the staff following the death of Dr. W.F. Birdsong.

Two polling places were designated in Bailey County. The two locations were at the Muleshoe City Hall and the Needmore Community Building. Boxes were not placed at West Camp, Three Way and Bula because of lack of funds.

Instrument, included the hour the polls were open and listed alleged illegal voters. The petition also claimed that other irregularities had been noted throughout the election.

The \$380,000 owed on the purchase of the two hospitals, the one operating hospital in Muleshoe faced another crisis. Despite constant remodeling and addition of new and updated equipment, federal inspectors termed the existing hospital "a borderline structure."

After enabling legislation was passed during the 1969 session of the Texas Legislature to establish the Bailey County Hospital District, an election was called for May 16, 1970 for a dual purpose.

Long lines marked an intense interest in the election on May 16, 1970 when 1474 people cast votes in the Hospital District election and the Bond election in Bailey County.

By ruling in favor of the hospital board, the judge by his decision, in effect, held that the contestants had failed to prove that there was not sufficient cause for the election.

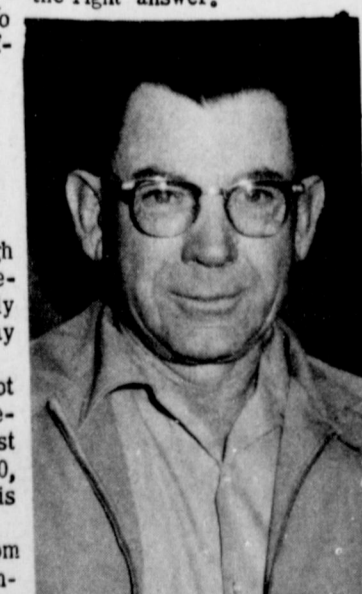
In authorizing the Journal to announce his candidacy for the office of director of the Bailey County Hospital District in the upcoming election, James P. Wedel made the following statement:

Attention: Boys 13-15

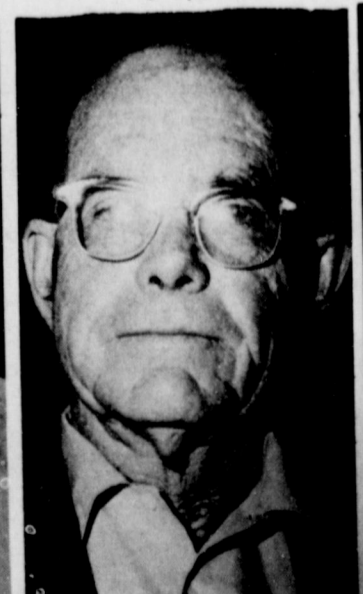
Attention boys age 13 through 15: If your birthday falls between August 1, 1956 and July 31, 1957, you are eligible to play Babe Ruth Baseball.

I had a narrow escape with death about four months ago and had we not had excellent doctors and a hospital I would not be writing this letter today.

I feel very grateful that the Bailey County Area has been blessed with the talented, skilled services of such a dedicated surgeon. With proper facilities people from miles around could reap benefits from his knowledge. The doctors in this area are greatly appreciated for their dedication and I am glad we have the access to their knowledge and skill.

I was faced with the realization that I might not see my

baby daughter take her first step or my son graduate from high school. Accidents happen so quickly and pain is so real. I was grateful I didn't have to stand the pain for an ambulance ride to Lubbock or Clovis. We had a knowledgeable surgeon and dedicated doctors right here in Muleshoe and for the Grace of God I am alive.

I simply wish to express my appreciation to our medical team and to appeal to the people of this area to remember, accidents can happen anywhere and at anytime, without proper facilities and doctors, you or a loved one, could endure pain or even death without proper medical care.

My family has had considerable need for medical care in time past, I am grateful we have had a hospital in this area and I hope we will continue to have such facilities in the

future. A few dollars spent in tax dollars in Bailey County for a hospital with adequate facilities are minimal in comparison to going out of the county to a hospital for treatment when your family has to suffer being away from home, in money spent for motel rooms, food, car expense, etc, while you are undergoing treatment.

The majority of people are not faced with the fact that illness strikes us all--if we have adequate hospital facilities here in our county, we need not go to other areas for help.

Bentsen Speaks Out On Failure To Vote

One of the most unfortunate aspects of our Democracy is the failure of millions of Americans to exercise their right to vote. Year after year, in local, state and national elections, to eliminate the other causes of non-voting. We know what these are.

Remote and hard to reach registry locations, plus limited registration hours are two of them. No provisions for absentee registration, complex registration forms, and instances of discrimination are three more. These, I believe, are the problems which we should be working to eliminate. Voting ought to be broadly and actively encouraged in this country, and we can best do this by striking down the hurdles which lie in the path of a prospective voter.

I take pride in the fact that Texas has taken a giant step toward doing just this. Our state's newly enacted voter registration laws, which took effect in January 10 1972, will make registration much easier for everyone. This action was both necessary and appropriate, and in the interest of representative Democracy.

Consider that in 1970, the eligible voting population in Texas numbered 6.5 million, yet only 4 million persons were registered. Of those registered to vote, a mere 53.8 percent actually voted. While this figure may be due in large part to apathy, look at the percentage of those who were eligible to vote who finally did: 34 percent. This suggests to me that while voter apathy is a fact we must deal with, so, certainly, is voter registration. And it has been dealt with in Texas by striking down a lot of the complications which previously existed, in favor of more simple and direct procedures.

But what of the rest of the nation? It seems to me that the Federal government should do what it can to facilitate the widest possible voter registration across the country. The National Voter Registration Act of 1971 is now on the Senate Floor. I feel it deserves our support.

he was qualified to vote in Federal elections. The registration rolls would be kept open until 30 days before the election, a provision already applied to Presidential elections under the Voting Rights Act of 1970.

This act would in no way rob the states of their traditional powers over voter registration. It applies only to Federal elections involving Federal candidates. However, the Federal government would pay to the states what it felt was a reasonable cost of processing registration forms, so the system wouldn't entail direct, additional expenses to the states. Actually, it would merely shift some of the voter registration costs from the state to the Federal government, for Federal election expenses.

For those states which choose to adopt the simpler voter registration procedures for their state and local elections, the act would call for payment of bonus Federal funds to cover these expenses. In short, the act would not force states to have more open registration systems; it would help and encourage them.

I think it's time for those of us in the Federal Legislature to pass laws that help people to vote, rather than discourage them.

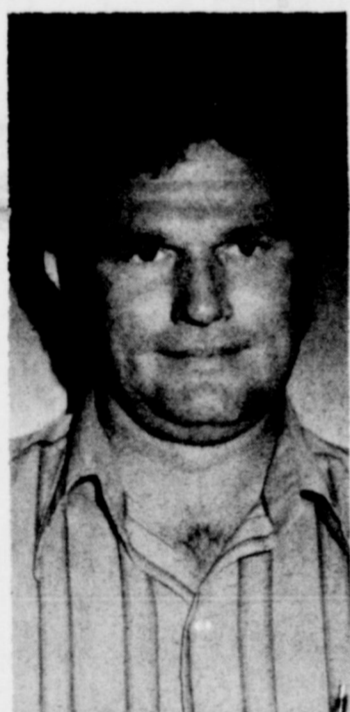

Answer: Enough to reduce the prevailing commercial rate in the area by 3 percent.

8. Question: Who will be responsible for guaranteeing the loan?
Answer: The Regional Office.

9. Question: When will the agreement to guarantee the loan be given to the nonprofit applicant?
Answer: Upon approval of the initial application.

10. Question: Who will initiate and sign the agreement document?
Answer: The Regional Office.

11. Question: Who will determine that the interest charged on a loan is the prevailing rate in the area?
Answer: The Regional Office.

12. Question: When will the bonds of a public sponsor be purchased by HEW?
Answer: Upon completion of construction of the project.

13. Question: Does this mean that the public sponsor must arrange for financing during construction?
Answer: Yes.

14. Question: Will HEW sell the bonds purchased from a public sponsor to FNMA or another agency?
Answer: Yes.

15. Question: When HEW sells the bonds will HEW pay an interest subsidy of 3 percent to the purchaser?
Answer: HEW will pay to the purchaser an amount which would reduce the prevailing commercial rate by 3 percent.

16. Question: When will the agreement to buy the bonds be given to the public sponsor?
Answer: Upon approval of the initial application.

17. Question: Would HEW buy revenue bonds issued by a public sponsor?
Answer: Yes, if a financial feasibility study showed that the sponsor could satisfactorily amortize the loan.

18. Question: What is the maximum maturity period for a loan?
Answer: 25 years.

19. Question: What is the maximum loan that may be guaranteed or direct loan that can be made?
Answer: 90 percent of the eligible cost. The maximum is 90 percent for a loan or for a grant and loan combined.

20. Question: May an applicant obtain a Hill-Burton loan guarantee, or both grant and loan guarantee and also an FHA insured mortgage under Section 242?
Answer: Yes.

21. Question: In a project having both a Hill-Burton guaranteed loan and an FHA insured loan, may the Hill-Burton loan be subordinated to the FHA loan?
Answer: Yes.

22. Question: May a guaranteed loan or direct loan under Hill-Burton be used in part to refinance an existing indebtedness on a facility?
Answer: No.

23. Question: In a project involving both a grant and loan may a portion of the grant be split into a fiscal year for which funds have not yet been appropriated by the Congress?
Answer: No. All grant moneys must be available at the time the project is approved--no split projects.

24. Question: May an application for a loan include uncollected pledges?
Answer: Yes, but a statement must be obtained from a bank as to the value of the pledges. An actual letter of credit from a bank would not be required.

25. Question: Do costs allowable and nonallowable as set forth in Part 24-2 of the Health Grants Manual apply to loan as well as grant projects?
Answer: Yes.

26. Question: May legal or other fees incident to the loan be included in allowable project costs?
Answer: No.

27. Question: Since a loan will not be guaranteed or bonds purchased by HEW until completion of the project can interest paid be the applicant during construction be included in the loan?
Answer: No.

28. Question: Must a Hill-Burton guaranteed loan or a direct loan be secured by a first lien?
Answer: Yes, except as noted in question 21 above.

29. Question: What will be acceptable as security on a guaranteed loan or direct loan?
Answer: First mortgage, negotiable stocks or bonds, pledge of unrestricted and unencumbered income from an endowment or other trust funds, pledge of specified portion of annual general or special revenues of the applicant, or full faith and credit (tax supported) of a public body.

30. Question: In what manner will an applicant be expected to make payments of principal and interest on a loan?
Answer: Substantially level total annual installments.

31. Question: May an applicant be allowed to speed up the repayment of a loan without penalty?
Answer: An applicant may pay up to 15 percent of the original principal amount in any calendar year without additional charge.

32. Question: Is a loan guarantee incontestable in the hands of the applicant?
Answer: Yes, except in case of fraud.

33. Question: What will happen in case an applicant defaults in making payment?
Answer: If such default is not cured within 90 days the holder of the loan shall have the right to make demand upon the Secretary in writing for purchase of the loan by the Secretary.

34. Question: May HEW recover any payments made by HEW in behalf of the applicant during default?
Answer: Yes, the Secretary of the HEW has the right to recover such payments from the applicant.

35. The applicant must provide to the State the opinion of legal counsel covering the following items:
a. A memorandum submitted with the application stating that there is or will be authority to finance, construct, and maintain the project, and to issue the proposed obligations, and to pledge or mortgage the assets and/or revenues offered to secure the loan guarantee.

b. A final opinion at the time of delivery of the bonds to the lender stating that the indebtedness of the applicant is duly authorized, sold, and delivered, and that such indebtedness is valid,

ficient notice given of the election, that there was not adequate time to vote, and that the two ballot boxes were not sufficient. Furthermore, the contestants or any other fatalities or irregularities that would void the election.

On Friday, August 21, 1970, the contestants filed a motion for a new trial. Unlike the previous filed document and petitions in the contest, there was no mention of illegal votes.

This was the first step to affect an appeal to higher court which would be the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo. The appellants, Chester Setliff and some 300 other contestants, who had brought suit in the 154th District Court here to set aside the election held May 16, 1970, contesting the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of taxable property and the issuance by the Bailey County Hospital District of bonds in the amount of \$950,000.

The appellants asserted five points of error in the election which was carried by a substantial majority of voters. On March 15, 1971 the Bailey County Hospital District was upheld by the Court of Civil Appeals for the Seventh Supreme Judicial District of Texas at Amarillo.

On April 3, 1971, the first Hospital Board election was held with only one incumbent being re-elected, Mrs. J.G. Arnn. Others elected to the board were C.G. (Grundy) Lewis, A.R. McGuire and Ernest Locker. During the past year, the Bailey County Hospital District Board has explored many avenues and discussed many different ways to secure the money for building a new hospital.

In February, a \$1.5 million federal loan was tentatively approved for the Hospital District to build a \$1.9 million, 50-bed hospital and purchase equipment by the State Board of Health.

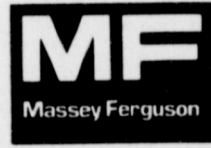

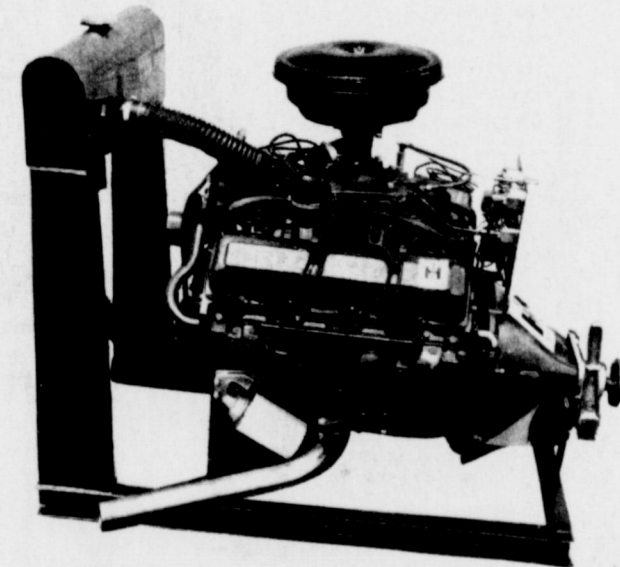

COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES

Many of you have heard the President outline his proposals for dealing with court ordered busing to achieve racial balance in public schools. Since that address, he has sent to the Congress a pair of legislative proposals in this area. One would impose a moratorium on new busing orders until July 1, of next year, or until the Congress passes substantive legislation, whichever is sooner. The second is the Equal Educational Opportunities Act--the substantive legislation the President would like for the Congress to approve.

The latter bill would encourage a quality education to be available at all schools and upgrading of currently substandard schools; and it would establish priorities for desegregation remedies imposing specific limitations on the use of busing.

The bill would state that courts may not impose busing until all other remedies have been exhausted. And it would specifically terminate all busing orders, including prior ones, after five years unless specifically re-ordered, and then terminate desegregation orders at the end of 10 years as long as good faith is shown by the school districts.

Most importantly, the legislation provides that upon application of a local educational agency, any existing busing order would have to be reviewed by the courts and modified to comply with the Act.

It is this last, and I think most important, provision which offers hope to the many situations in our state in which busing has already been ordered by the courts.

As you know, I have consistently opposed compulsory busing to achieve racial balance. I have supported a high quality education for all our young people without regard to race; but I have viewed busing and continue to view it as a waste of time and money.

Since the President's address, I have heard from many of you expressing either your support for his recommendations or your opposition to compulsory busing.

I can assure you that I shall continue my efforts in the Congress to prohibit compulsory busing and to provide a quality education for our young people.

The President, in recommending his legislative action, also said that the Congress should give serious consideration to a Constitutional Amendment to prohibit compulsory busing. I would have preferred a stronger endorsement of this approach for I believe it would have lent important emphasis to this method of solution.

The Constitutional Amendment process is, admittedly, cumbersome. Passage requires a two-thirds majority in each house of Congress plus ratification by three-fourths of the state legislatures. While a majority of the Congress seems to favor a Constitutional Amendment to prohibit compulsory busing, a two-thirds majority is not now in evidence.

But simply because the procedure is cumbersome is no reason to give up efforts in this direction. A Constitutional Amendment would be the surest method of achieving the goal. While the Supreme Court has the power to void Acts of Congress,

it has not the power to rule unconstitutional a Constitutional Amendment.

Action is needed more rapidly, however, than a Constitutional Amendment can be passed. So, while we pursue a Constitutional Amendment, we must also work in behalf of legislation which is also designed to prohibit compulsory busing, even though such legislation runs the risk of being voided later by the Supreme Court. Both approaches must be pursued simultaneously by the Congress.

Part of the problem of providing a quality education is meeting the increased costs of education, not only in our public schools but in our private and postsecondary schools as well. Earlier in the Congress, I offered two bills which would help meet educational costs. One would provide a tax credit of up to \$350 annually to any individual taxpayer who directly bears the financial burden of sending a student to school; the other would offer a tax credit of up to \$100 annually to persons, and \$1,000 annually to corporations, which make contributions of that size or larger to educational institutions. These bills would expand the financial resources for private and post-secondary schools and at the same time alleviate the tax burden for those individuals bearing the costs of increased school tuition and fees.

The provision of a high-quality and equal education for all our young people is the goal to be achieved. But taking action which balances educational opportunities between races by lowering some educational opportunities is wrong. Compulsory busing lowers educational opportunities. It forces school districts to spend financial resources, already spread too thinly, on buses and drivers instead of books and teachers. It forces students to spend time on buses instead of with their studies or on the educationally broadening extracurricular activities associated with school. We must not lose sight of the goal, as the courts seem to have done. We must provide a high quality education at every neighborhood school.

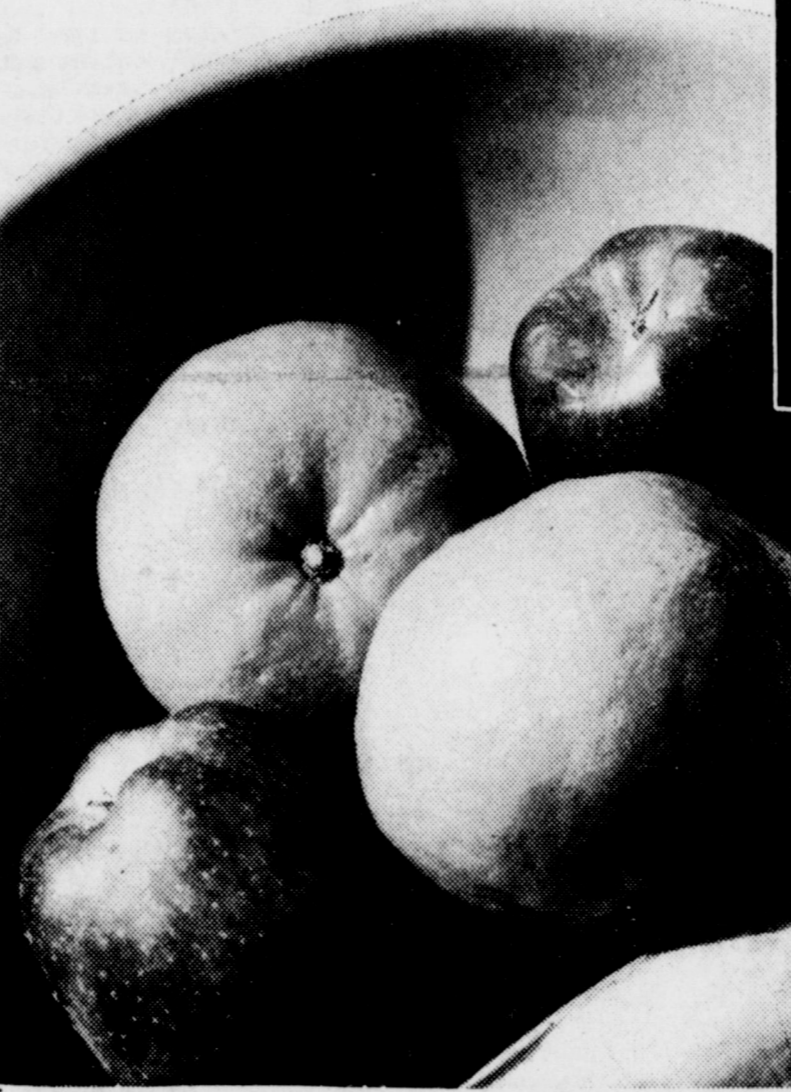

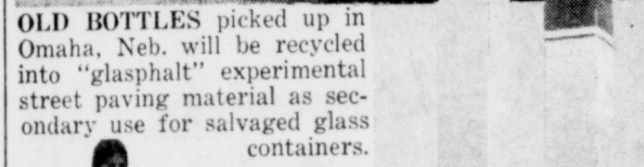

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 4981 East Dakota, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License No. 2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in a weather modification operation designed to decrease hailfall and enhance rainfall, for and on behalf of the Plains Westher Improvement Association located at P.O. 1. Targer area within which hailfall is intended to be decreased and rainfall enhanced can be described as that total area within the boundaries of Hale County.

The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 1,000 square miles include a 3cm radar system cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
4. The person in charge of this program shall be Thomas J. Henderson, Atmospherics Incorporated.
5. The program may be operational at various times throughout the period from 15 April 1972 through 30 October 1972.

Economic Stabilization

This column of questions and answers on the President's Economic Stabilization Program is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service. The column answers questions most frequently asked about wages and prices.

Q. Do landlords need approval from the Internal Revenue Service before increasing rent?

A. Aside from requests for exceptions to the rent regulations, landlords must obtain approval of rent increases in only one case. That is where the rent increase is based on a capital improvement not required by local law or the terms of a mortgage or deed of trust and 1/2 percent of the cost of the improvement allocable to the residence would result in an increase of over 10 percent in the monthly rent. Approval should be obtained from the landlord's District Director of Internal Revenue.

Q. Will the import surcharge have to be refunded to customers at all levels of distribution?

A. No. The lifting of the import surcharge imposes no requirement that refunds be made. The surcharge paid on inventoried items is an allowable cost and may be considered in pricing.

Q. Are cost increases as a result of the revaluation of the dollar allowable?

A. A company may apply its base period markup to the inventoried cost of imported items plus transportation costs of such items. Since the cost of items added to a company's inventory may vary to reflect the revaluation of the dollar, there may be like items of inventory which differ in price, depending upon whether the company seeks to pass through the costs it paid as a result of the revaluation of the dollar. Tier I firms must prerotently before raising prices to reflect these revaluation costs.

Q. Can an employer take advantage of the Pay Board's exception for cost-of-living increases by giving his employees such increases any time he chooses?

A. No. Such a benefit is available only if the cost of living increase is pursuant to a generally accepted escalator formula. It can not be subject merely to the whim of the employer. Moreover, such an exception would be subject to prerotification requirements for Category I wage and salary increases or to reporting requirements for Category II wage and salary increases.

Q. Are rental units in a multi-family dwelling in which the landlord resides exempt from rent controls if the landlord owns more than four such units in this building and another building?

A. No. Such units are not exempt if the landlord or member of his family own or have an interest, directly or indirectly, in more than an aggregate of four such units, or if the units are not rented for a term longer than month-to-month.

Questions and Answers

Q. Is an ambulance service considered a noninstitutional provider of health services under the stabilization regulations?

A. No. While an ambulance service may in fact provide health services, these services are incidental to its primary job--furnishing emergency transportation. Since ambulance services do not provide health services as their primary function, they may not be considered noninstitutional providers of health services under stabilization regulations. However, they would qualify as a service industry and would be governed by regulations applicable to services.

Coloring Boiled Easter Eggs

COLLEGE STATION--Mom, grab your Easter basket and head for the supermarket! It's time to color Easter eggs again.

"Because white shells dye in clear, bright colors," said Houston consumer marketing specialist Mrs. Gwendolyn Ciyatt, "white-shelled eggs are generally in heavy demand just before Easter."

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialist said that the demand sometimes pushes the price of eggs up, while some markets may feature specials in eggs for coloring.

Brown shells don't take color in quite the same way as white shells, but they do give unusual color effects.

"They're often a good buy for special decorating," Mrs. Ciyatt said, "They're good for decals, transfers or fine paint brushes."

Mothers often ask whether

children should eat dyed cooked eggs. A statement that the color is harmless may be found on the package containing Easter egg dyes.

"These usually are food dyes," Mrs. Ciyatt said, "Though the dyed eggs are hard-cooked, it's best to eat them within a day or two."

The specialist said to remember to cook eggs for coloring just as any hard-cooked egg. Put the eggs in cold or lukewarm water and bring them to a boil. Remove from heat and let them stand for 20 minutes. Cool eggs promptly. (This makes the shells come off easily and prevents dark rings on the yolks.)

Once the kids have had their fun hiding and finding Easter eggs, you might want to use some of the eggs in these recipes.

"Again, remember to use them within a day or two from the time they were boiled," Mrs. Ciyatt said.

DIFFERENT EGG SALAD
1 No. 2 can baked beans
4 coarsely chopped, hard-cooked eggs
1/2 cup minced onions

1 Tablespoon chili sauce
1 Tablespoon mayonnaise
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1/4 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper

3 slices crumbled crisp bacon
3 Tablespoons snipped parsley
Drain beans; add eggs and onion. Toss in combined chili sauce, mayonnaise, mustard, salt and pepper. Serve in chilled salad bowl; sprinkle with bacon and parsley. Makes four servings.

SCALLOPED EGG AND SHRIMP
1 cup milk

2 Tablespoons flour
2 Tablespoons butter
4 eggs, hard-cooked
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup shrimp
1/2 cup bread crumbs

Make white sauce of butter, flour, salt and milk. In buttered casserole, place alternate thin layers of white sauce, shrimp, sliced eggs and crumbs. Brown in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) When ready to serve, garnish top with slices of eggs.

Bailey County Census Shows 689 Farms

Bailey county showed a total of 689 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Statistics Administration (SESA). In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 641. Of the county's total farms in 1969, 606 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, compared with 589 in 1964. The report also shows average farm size in the county was 690.3 acres, and average valuation of these farms (land and buildings) was \$159,411. Other figures from the report are:

2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$1,373,117; in 1964, \$1,512,760.

3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$18,249,636; in 1964, \$9,975,596.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold, including family farms using this type of business structure, eight of the county's \$2,500-and-over farms are incorporated.
