
a big revival at the Baptist church here are rapidly maturing with the promise of a great season of religious awakening.

There has never been a "hang-over" during my administration.

Through the cooperation of the friends of public education, much progress has been achieved. The per capita apportionment has been fixed. for two years, enabling school officials to make their budgets intelligently; the per capita has been paid during each fiscal year without a deficiency, largely due to economy in text-book expenditures; the annual per capita cost of text-books has been stabilized at approximately one dollar; teachers' salaries have been paid promptly without discount; the rural aid appropriation has been increased from \$1,000,000 to \$1,-500,000, and the law revised so as to remove discrimination and to make it possible that each state aid school could carry out its contracts and that no state aid school should have a shorter term than six months; an increased amount has been given for industrial training and transportation and a generous bonus has been provided to stimulate consolidation; rural high schools have been established through provision for a unified county-wide system, planned by the county school board; rural schools have been standardized and county-wide seventh grade commencement encouraged; state college entrance examinations have been held by the State Department of Education whereby students of non-






