ON THE FARM

By the County Agent

Good Seed

The recent shortage of seed in the county and adjoining counties call our attention more forcibly than ever to the necessity of a few farms in the county making a specialty of producing good planting seeds. The recent shortage, is of course, an extreme condition, but each year there is a demand for good seed that are acclimated. There is an opportunity for some one, or more than one, to build up a paying seed business and at the same time do a good service for the entire county. It is hard to estimate the loss each year caused by planting inferior seeds, and seeds that have not been grown in this part of the State.

There is an opportunity for some farm to specialize in producing a good wheat seed that is adapted to our condition, that is a pure line seed, that will bring a good price, that will have a good milling value. Board County should furnish wheat seed, not only for ourselves, but for others in as much as it is one of the outstanding wheat counties of the State. Good wheat seed may scarce in the county this fall, due to the conditions, but it would be a good time to start in with some pure-line seed.

Cotton seed offers another opportunity that could be made profitable to the grower and a service to the community. It would also offer a plan for the standardization of a variety in a community where that particular variety is most profitable.

Milo maize, and the other grain sorghum seeds should be produced in the county. These crops offer an exceptional opportunity to those who are situated to grow them successfully, in as much as there are not many farms that specialize in seeds in our immediate section of the State.

Handling the Cream

In certain sections of the county there are ice trucks that make delivery of ice to the farm homes two or three times each week, which is certainly a convenient service, but would it not be possible to render another service on this same trip? If this ice truck was situated so as to pick up a can of sweet cream at

the various farms along this route and deliver to market, returning the empty cans on the next trip.

Many farms that produce only a small amount of cream find the expenses of delivering regularly too great during the very busy season. It seems to some that this plan should be worked out on a practical basis. Eggs could also be marketed in this manner. Why not perfect a plan of this kind?

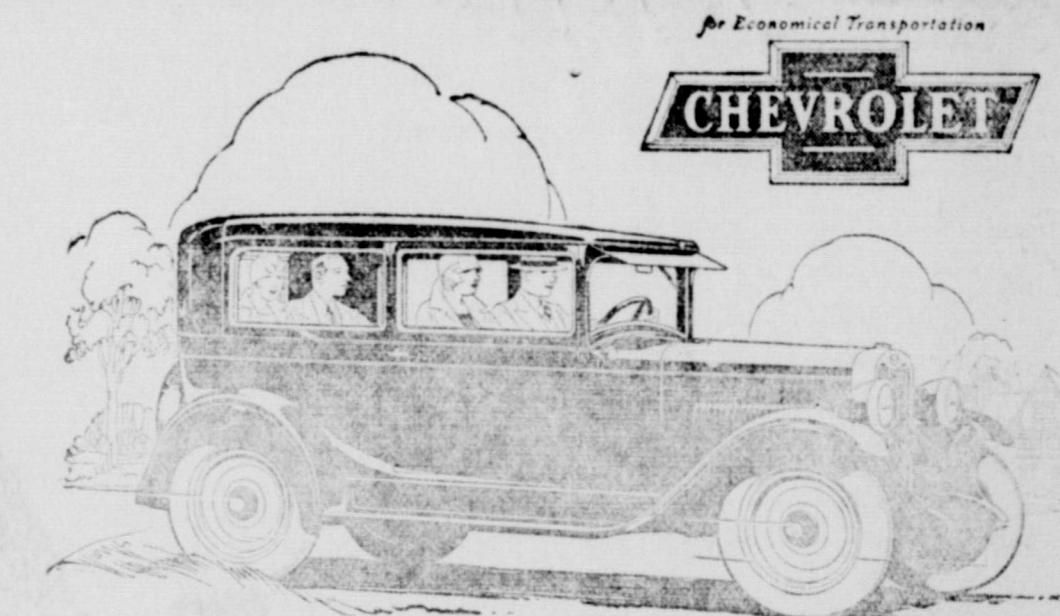

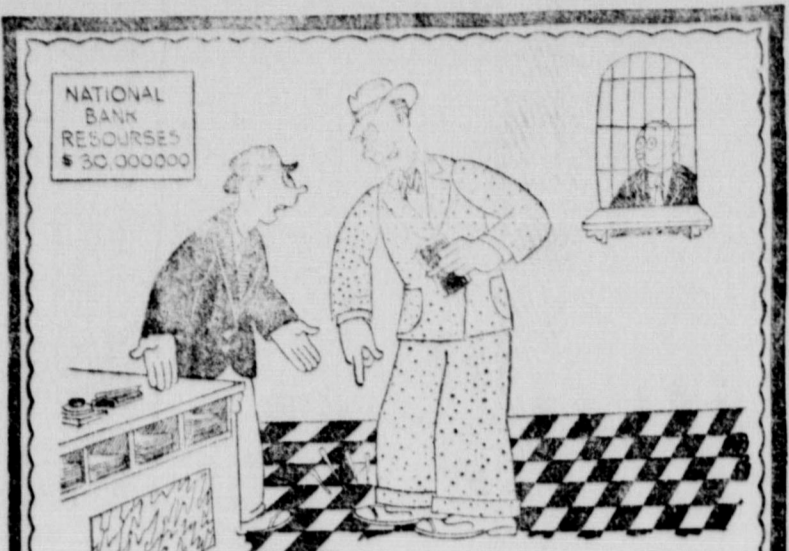
