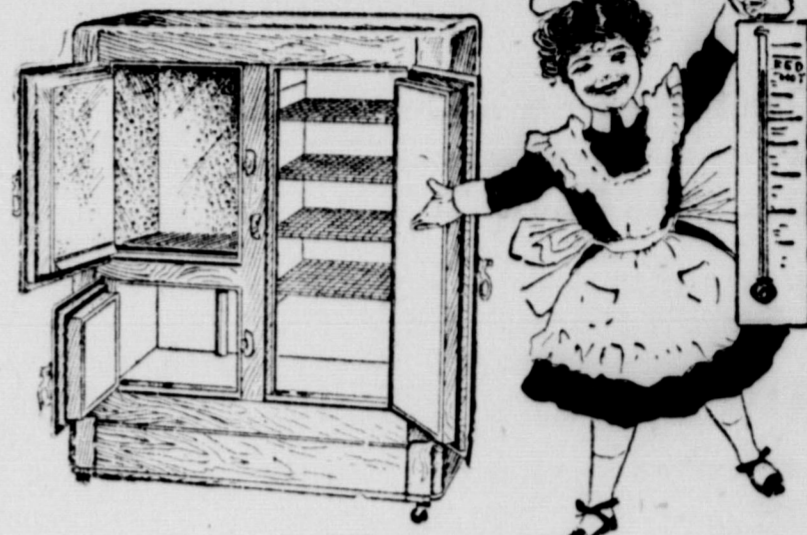

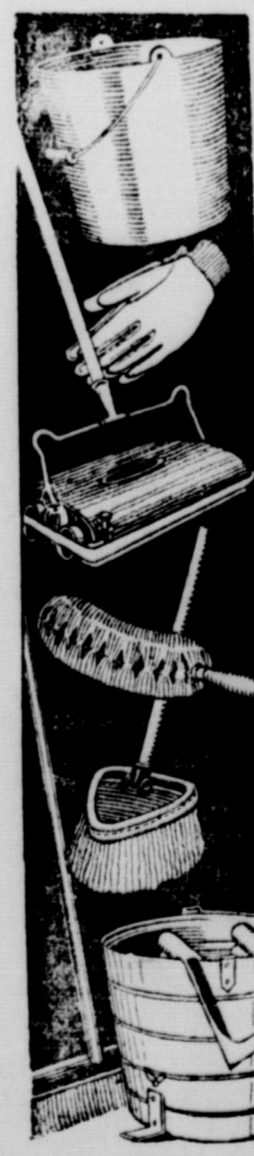

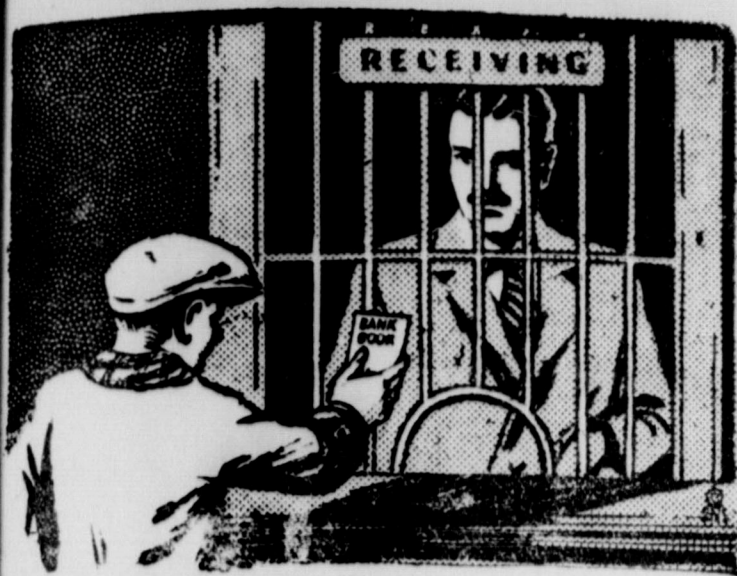

POULTRY COLUMN

(By F. W. Kazmeier)

Baby chicks want a square. Are you going to give it them? Don't over-heat or chill them. Don't feed too soon and not too late. Don't feed mold or must feed. Give them plenty of sour milk. Keep them free from lice and mites. Don't over-crowd them. Clean the coop often and thoroughly. Don't let the rats get them.

Litter Eating

Frequently a great mortality is caused by the chicks eating their own litter, especially during the time, after they are placed in the brooder. Before they are given their first feed, if the chicks are shipped to you, you may safely feed and water them just as soon as you receive them. If you do not want to feed them after receiving, keep them in boxes in which they came until they are ready to feed and water. Keep boxes in a room with a temperature of about 70 degrees. If you are hatching your own chicks, get them from a local hatchery, place them in a common chick shipping box in a room with a temperature of about 70 degrees, allow them to remain in the boxes until old enough to be given their first feed. In the past, thousands of chicks have died due to eating their own litter.

Cotton Seed Meal

It has been very carefully proven that cotton seed meal is not a very valuable ingredient in an egg mash, especially in large quantities. Heavy

feeding of cotton seed meal produces an egg that will not keep in cold storage. A large portion of the eggs produced in the spring go into cold storages. Everybody should be interested in producing a better egg, to help increase the consumption and bring about a better price. If you are feeding cotton seed meal, by all means, do not feed more than 7 per cent. We believe it best not to feed any at all and use meat scraps instead. At this time of the year, eggs must be produced that will stand up in cold storages. The best available information, at present, indicates we should discourage the feeding of cotton seed meal to laying hens, at least, until we know more about why cotton seed meal causes eggs to deteriorate in cold storages.

Farmers Most Profitable Way

Selling the raw material off the farm depletes the soil and at least is not profitable. Why not convert some of these raw materials into eggs and meat. Let the hens transform the raw material into a finished product. You gain these points, save on fertilizer bill each year, save on freight in the difference between transporting 100 lbs of raw material to 15 to 20 lbs. of the finished product. One hundred pounds of feed will produce 20 dozen eggs weighing about 30 lbs., the rest is returned to your farm as fertilizer.

Mulch Paper Aids Vegetable Growth

Those who visited Wichita Falls from Foard County last Saturday had an opportunity to observe the method of using the "mulch paper." This is used quite extensively in some sec-

tions of the United States, according to Charles Weeks. The paper looks much like ordinary roofing paper. It is placed on the ground over the seed bed. The plants are set in small cuts, which may be made with a pocket knife. The seeds are planted likewise.

According to Mr. Weeks, this holds the moisture, keeps the weeds and vegetation from growing and makes the soil bacteria grow faster, thereby causing a faster growth of the plants.

There are two grades of the paper, the lighter grade which was being used on the Weeks farms costs about \$3.75 a roll, which is a hundred square feet. It is said that the paper will last, if cared for properly, two seasons.

Mr. Weeks uses a lawn sprinkler in watering his garden through the paper.

Excellent Poultry House

The poultry house on the Weeks' farm seems to be exceptionally well adapted to this country. The convenience with which it is arranged, the ventilation, light and shutters which are arranged so as to keep out cold winds and rains when necessary add to the practicability of the house for the average farm, whether they are in the poultry business on a commercial scale or not.

The house is divided into three sections. Each section is twenty four feet square. The roosts are in the rear of the building about four feet from the floor. Immediately under the roosts is poultry wire netting, which permits the droppings from the birds to fall below, and not allow the birds to get under the roosts. The droppings are taken from the house through an opening in the back, nests are placed in the building, also feeds, water and etc.

Mr. Weeks plans to keep 1200 birds on 1 acre of land. He states that if they are cared for properly, they should net at least \$2,400.00 per year after paying all feed and keeping expenses.
