Idity as to indicate that before long National banks in all parts of the coun try will be clamoring for the privilege of instituting it. The predicament of National bankers in Oklahoma, as well as the sharp shrinkage of deposits, seems to have served as a warning of other States; that is, they fear the example of Oklahoma in requiring State banks to institute a system of Insurance will be followed by a number of other Southern and Western States. The plan also seems to have advocates among bankers, who have less reason to fear such competition in the near future.
