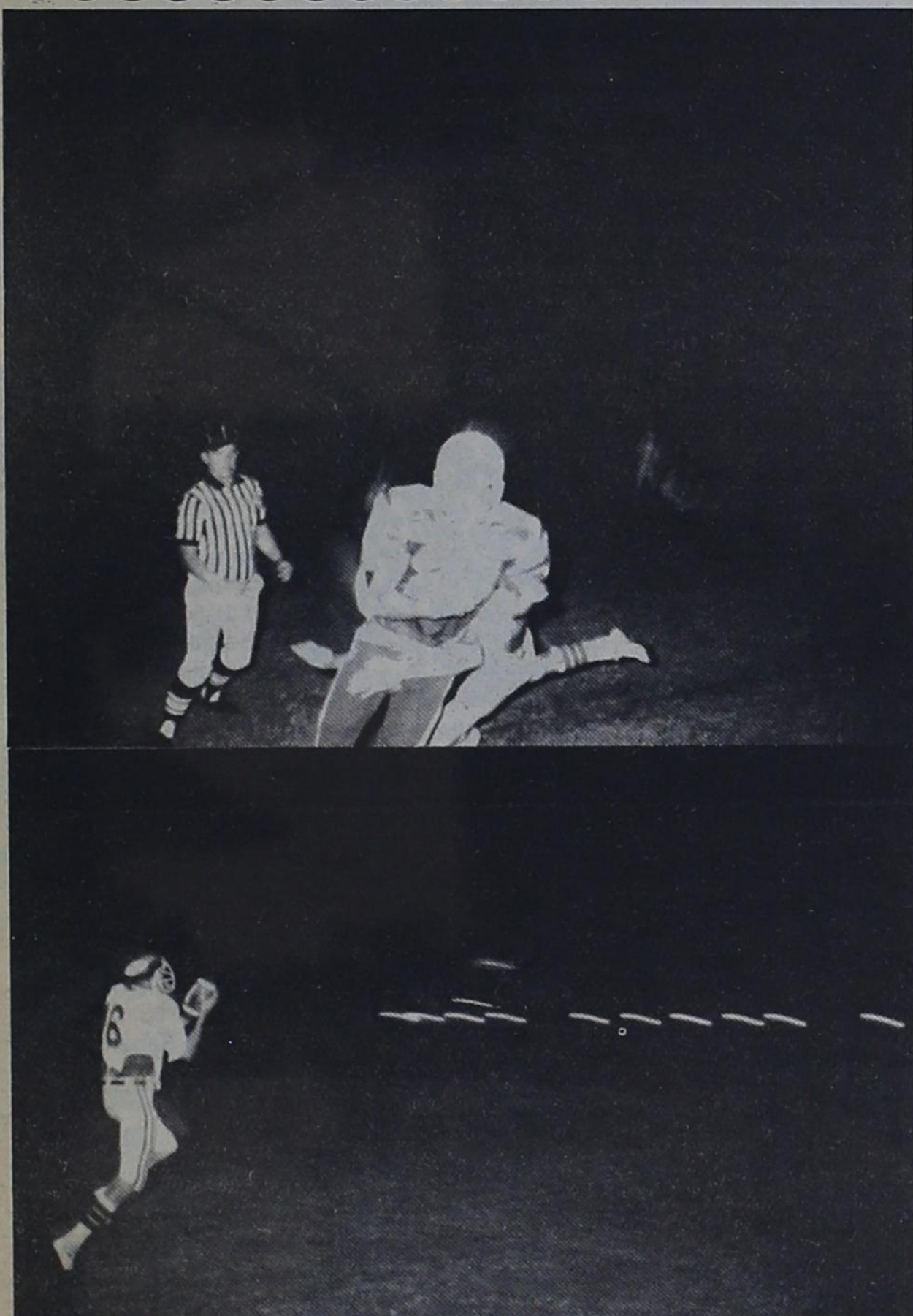

## Baird Bears Romp Over Hamlin Pied Pipers 21-7

BAIRD- The Baird Bears traveled to Hamlin Friday night to roll past the Pipers 21 to 7. Coach Edmiston was really proud of the team. He felt they had performed to their capabilities and there weren't near as many mistakes. He thought the offense did great, that their passing and execution was well done. The defense did their job extremely well. Overall, there was excellent teamwork carried out. The Bears had good field position most of the night. It was a good win.

With only 2 minutes of play gone, Greg Austin scored on a 41 yard play.

On Baird's second possession, the Bears drove 65 yards before Will Morgan scored from 2 yards out, with 4:44 left in the first quarter.

During the third quarter, Hamlin went 53 yards to score. Fullback Lester Stephens drove over from the two with 5:09 left in the quarter.

Baird quarterback Darryl Harris threw

to split end Davy Vestal for a 57 yard touchdown pass. This was Baird's final score.

Baird has 11 first downs, 211 yards rushing yardage and 95 yards passing yardage for a total of 306 yards. They completed 4 out of 6 passes and had 3 penalties for 17 yards.

The Pied Pipers had 10 first downs and 111 rushing and 39 passing yardage. They completed 3 of 21 passes and had 5 penalties for 34 yards. Hamlin lost 1 fumble.

This was Baird's second district game. Their district record is 2-0 and their season record is 4-3.

Baird will compete with the Jim Ned Indians Friday, October 26. The Indians are a tough team, but the Bears are busy preparing to play them now.

Everyone come out and watch Baird win its third district game.

The Junior Varsity will not have a game this Friday night.

## Two Males Arrested For Armed Robbery

BAIRD- Tuesday, October 16, the Highway Patrol, Sheriff Department and Clyde Police arrested Cecil Miller Jr., a white male, age 22 and Ronald Lee Watson, 19, on Interstate 20, west of Clyde, for armed robbery.

The two subjects had robbed a hitchhiker. Officers recovered five pistols. The car the subjects were riding in was stolen from Dallas.

Charges have been filed with the D.A. office.

Also arrested was Robert Gomez Quinones on Interstate 20 by Trooper

Parkhill for transporting illegal aliens. He had 10 aliens with him at the time. The Border Patrol came and took the aliens away. The Border Patrol has filed charges with the federal attorney.

In other news, the Texas Commission of Jail Standards inspected the Callahan County Jail, October 16.

The Sheriff's Department will receive the report within 30 days on what the County must do to have a jail.

The County Commissions will have approximately 45 days after receiving the report to act.

Born June 17, 1883, in Ontario, Canada, she was a Baptist. She married Roy W. Mizner in 1924 in Ohio.

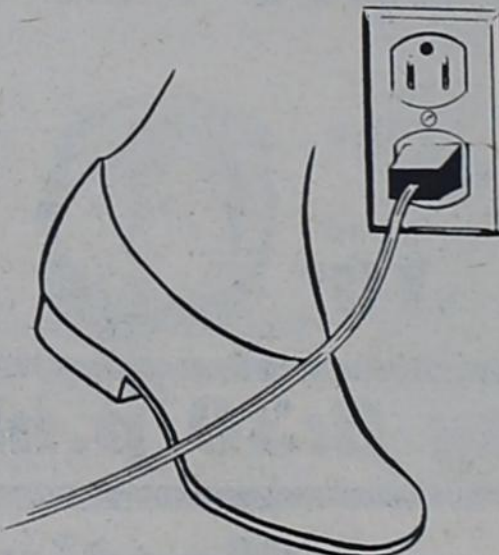
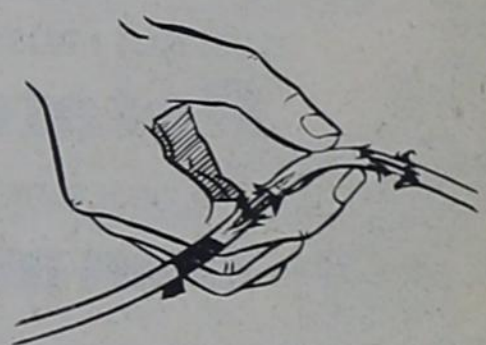

- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.

- ★ Don't place cords where they'll be tripped over or be subject to wear (under a well-travelled rug, through doorways).
- ★ Teach children not to play with or around electric sockets or equipment.
- ★ Don't use an electric lawn mower or hedge clippers when barefoot, or on wet grass or hedges.

## Veterans To Receive Income Report

COUNTY- On November 1, 1979, a large number of people receiving Veterans Administration benefit payments will receive an annual income report, which must be completed according to I.G. Mobley, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, persons receiving the card must complete it and return it to the VA before January 1, 1980, or have their benefit payments terminated.

Those receiving the income questionnaire card will be veterans, widows and children who are receiving nonservice-connected disability or death pension under the new pension law, which went into effect January 1, 1979. Also receiving the card will be veterans and widows who are receiving pension under the laws which were in effect prior to January 1, 1979, and dependent parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by military service.

Veterans, widows and children being paid under the new pension law, as

well as parents receiving dependency and indemnity compensation, should remember that their countable income may be reduced by any unusual family medical expenses they pay out in 1979. It is therefore important that the medical expenses be shown in the proper space on the income card.

Upon receipt of the card showing medical expenses for 1979, the VA will recompute entitlement and, if necessary, increase benefit payments retroactively to January 1, 1979. All VA claimants should report all of their income for 1979, and their anticipated income for 1980. Based upon the information shown on the card, a determination will be made as to whether VA benefits will continue in 1980.

The Veterans Administration is changing the toll-free telephone number for the Waco Regional Office which is effective November 1, 1979. The new telephone number is: 1-800-792-3271.

Dear Editor:

To the people of Callahan County- In March of 1978, the people of Callahan County witnessed the birth of the beginning of one of the best small community Ambulance services anywhere. A minimum service was expected at that time, but through the efforts of a few interested citizens and a first class ambulance crew, the service expanded to a point that would supply the needs of the people. My personal thanks to the original committee and former Mayor C. Lee Smith for supporting the needs of the service.

A few months ago, exception was taken by members of the governmental agencies that agreed to support the service. Some of them decided that we could not afford to have such a complete service and decided to cut back on funds. The service then had to fall back on the small amount of reserve funds to keep the service going. Sure there was an increase in personnel and in salary, but not any higher than any other professional service would pay, if you call two dollars an hour high wages.

The agencies have now decided that personnel should be cut back or cut out completely and use volunteers to work the service. Who can volunteer for hours and hours of work, standby, paperwork, and have time to maintain the mobs which support their family. The number of qualified people necessary to do this are not available in this area.

Due to the lack of funding the Ambulance service will not function after October 31, unless other arrangements are made. There are a few people who are still working toward a solution to the problem. Those people are the employees and the interest

members of the committee.

There are a few possibilities providing the citizens of this County will support the proposal.

I urge all of you to make your feelings known to the Ambulance Service so that their efforts to save this service will not be in vain. They need to know how you feel toward the service in order to pursue plans to present to you for approval.

If you don't get behind them and support their efforts, you will lose a valuable emergency service.

It is not my only concern that the employees will lose their jobs, but the real tragedy is that a life or lives may be lost because there will be no one to answer the call that has the necessary training to support that life.

We owe it to ourselves, our family and our dear friends to make every effort to avoid the loss of this very necessary emergency service. God gave us this love to spread among all people and the responsibility to help each other in time of need. It is my prayer and I hope you will pray that we may be shown the way to continue this vital service to our fellow citizens. Please send a card or letter to them at Box 428, Clyde, Texas 79510.
