City Council Hears Auditors Report Monday, August 11th

The Baird City Council met in their regularly scheduled meeting Monday, August 11th at 7:00 P.M.

The 1st subject on the agenda was the presentation of the 1979-80 audit by auditors Bruce Huff and Mike Singleton.

It was noted during the audit that since 1947 the city has chosen not to record depreciation expenses and that the city was in compliance with the bond indentures.

The auditors expressed that there would be several changes seen in future audits, now that the plant has been voted to sale. Several suggestions were made by Mr. Huff during the audit. Several of these were: (1) monthly reconciliation of the sub ledgers to the general ledger, (2) use of the city budget as the official authorization of expenditures, (3) assignment of deposit function to one employee, such as the city security, (4) endorsement of checks done immediately, (5) voided checks should be left on file, (6) consolidation of various bank accounts, (7) better records on detailed fixed assets, and (8) the possibility of replacing some water meters from an economic stand point. Mayor Brame, stated that the city had already established the process of cash deposit endorsements by the city secretary.

Second on the agenda was the canvass of the votes. There were 358 voters for and 196 against the sale of the power plant and distribution system to WTU for \$238,244.00. The motion was made and accepted to accept the vote. A resolution was then proposed to authorize

the sale of the plant to WTU for 248,244.00 payable to the city upon the date of sale. Mayor Brame and the city secretary, Kenneth Neel, were made authorized to make the sale without further delay. The motion was made by Scotty Mitchell and 2nd by Robert Martin and all were in favor.

Again, the bills were brought up, with the bills exceeding the cash available. It was pointed out that \$600 or \$700 of this months money was used to pay last month WTU bill, so once again the motion was made and carried to pay the bills as the cash is available.

Mayor Brame proposed a resolution to employ the Sherill Engineering Consultants for a \$1 token retainer, to take a look at our water distribution system to see what needs to be done, or replaced, what funds are available and etc. This resolution was quickly passed.

The last subject on the agenda discussed was the difficulty the Pioneer Lodge is having attaining water to supply their lodgers with ample water. Since June the Pioneer Lodge has had trouble getting water at all. The Lodge is on the end of a 1 inch line with at least 2, possibly 3 other homes. Mayor Brame felt that the city was obligated to provide water therefore the motion was made to replace the 1 inch line with 2 inch line at a cost of approximately \$500-\$600. Councilman Lee Roy Brooker made the motion, it was 2nd and all were in favor.

The meeting was adjourned and the next council meeting is set for September 8th at 7:00 P.M. in the City Hall.

New School Year Officially Begins Monday, August 18th

At 9 a.m. on Monday, August 18, 1980, the new school year will officially begin for all personnel of Baird School District. The teachers will meet at that time in the English Room at High School for the first of three in-service days.

Then on Thursday, August 21, the students will begin. On Thursday and Friday, August 21 and 22, school will dismiss and buses will run at 2:30 p.m. Afternoon kindergarten will meet from 12:00 until 2:30 on regular school days, beginning on August 21.

Breakfast will be served on each school day from 7:45 - 8:10 each morning. Prices are 35¢ for students and 60¢ for adults.

Lunch prices for this year are: Kindergarten through grade 3 - 60¢, Grades 4 - 6 65¢, Grades 7 - 12 70¢, Adult \$1.15.

The adult price is for a lunch, or a salad, or any portion thereof, and includes either milk or tea.

Three new teachers are on staff this year. They are Marianne Hooker, home-making; Gary Fox, high school coach and math; and Ray Lowe, junior high coach and history.

This will be the first year to teach for Miss Hooker and Mr. Lowe. Miss Hooker lives in Abilene and is May graduate of Baylor University. She did her student teaching at Robinson High School.

Mr. Lowe is an August graduate of Angelo State University. He graduated from Coleman High School. He and his wife, Raymona, are living at 405 E. 4th in Baird.

Mr. Fox, his wife Evalyn, and their son Wayne, a freshman, live in Baird at 238 West Third. He attended high school in Olden, Tx. and graduated from North Texas State in 1965 and has six hours towards his master's. He has taught in Ira, Miles, Oglesby, Gorman, Anna.

Opposition Over Power Plant Settled Saturday By Baird Voters

For over 2 years, the population in Baird has been split over the control of Baird's Municipal Power Plant. The voices of the citizens both for and against the sale have been speaking out over the issue by means of petitions, letters to the editor, and by word of mouth, for several years.

The issue has been a major topic in past City Council meetings also. In one meeting of the City Council, it was agreed upon, by the members, to attain bids for the sale of the plant. There were 3 bids proposed to the council 1 Bid was for the equipment alone for \$40,500 from the Coastal Maintenance and Engineering Inc. and 2 bids were received from West Texas Utilities One for the Distribution system only for \$145,724.00 and one for the power plant and distribution system both for \$248,244.00. A referendum was set for Aug. 9th by a 3-2 margin with the council voting to take the bid from WTU

for both the power plant as well as the distribution system for the amount of \$248,244.00.

Unlike the election held on August 12, 1978, in which 596 votes were cast (323 against-273 for), the election held Aug 9th approved the sale of the city's 40 year old electric generating plant to WTU by a vote of 350 for to 196 against.

The sale is to go into effect as soon as the Texas Public Utilities Commission approves the move.

The plant has been closed since May 2 because "the cost had gotten so great we could no afford to operate it," and because it was not able to carry its rated load. But cost was the primary factor.

Voter turnout was about 50 percent.

Residents will now draw power directly from WTU; since May 2, the city has purchased power from WTU and then distributed and resold it to residents at a profit.

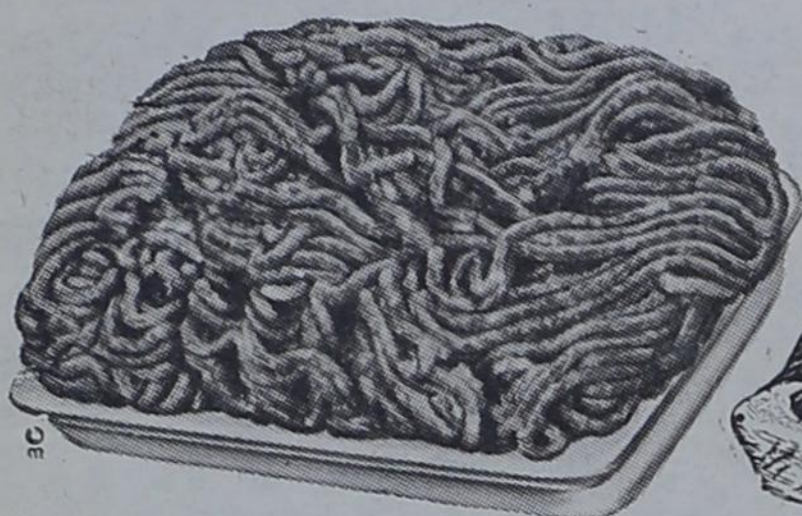

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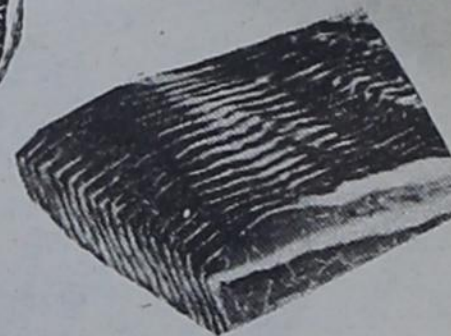

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

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Baird Independant Schools Increase Price Of Lunches

For the first time since 1976, Baird Independent Schools has raised the price of a regular student lunch. Lunches for students in kindergarten through

grade 3 will be sixty (.60) cents; grades 4-6 will pay sixty-five (.65) cents, while grades 7-12 will pay seventy (.70) cents. Breakfast prices will be thirty-five (.35)

cents for students and sixty (.60) cents for adults. Those qualifying for reduced-price meals will pay ten (.10) cents for each breakfast or each lunch.

Adult lunches will be \$1.15. For this price an adult may get the regular lunch, any portion of lunch, or a salad. Milk or tea is included in this price. No other a la carte items will be sold.

To comply with Public Law 205 enacted October 7, 1975, the schools will again be offering free and reduced-price meals to school children from families who fall within certain income eligibility brackets. The annual family income scale is as follows:

tion expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents of guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free or reduced-price meals for your children, complete the application you will receive from the school when you register your child, and return it to the school. Or you may pick up an application in the school offices at any time during the year.

Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the school superintendent.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application when you receive it.

Whenever possibly you are encouraged to pay by the week or month for your child's lunches. No tickets are available for breakfasts so students will pay each day.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child-feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Even though your children received free or reduced-price lunches during the past school year, application must be made each year. These should be returned to the school as soon as possible after the start of school.

This was a project that the sheriff's department has been working on for quite some time. The project has just recently been approved by the West Central Texas Council of Government.

The new dispatcher, will enable the sheriff's office to have 24 hour coverage three days per week. The Department is now working toward attaining permission for 1 more dispatcher which would provide 24 hour coverage, 7 days a week.

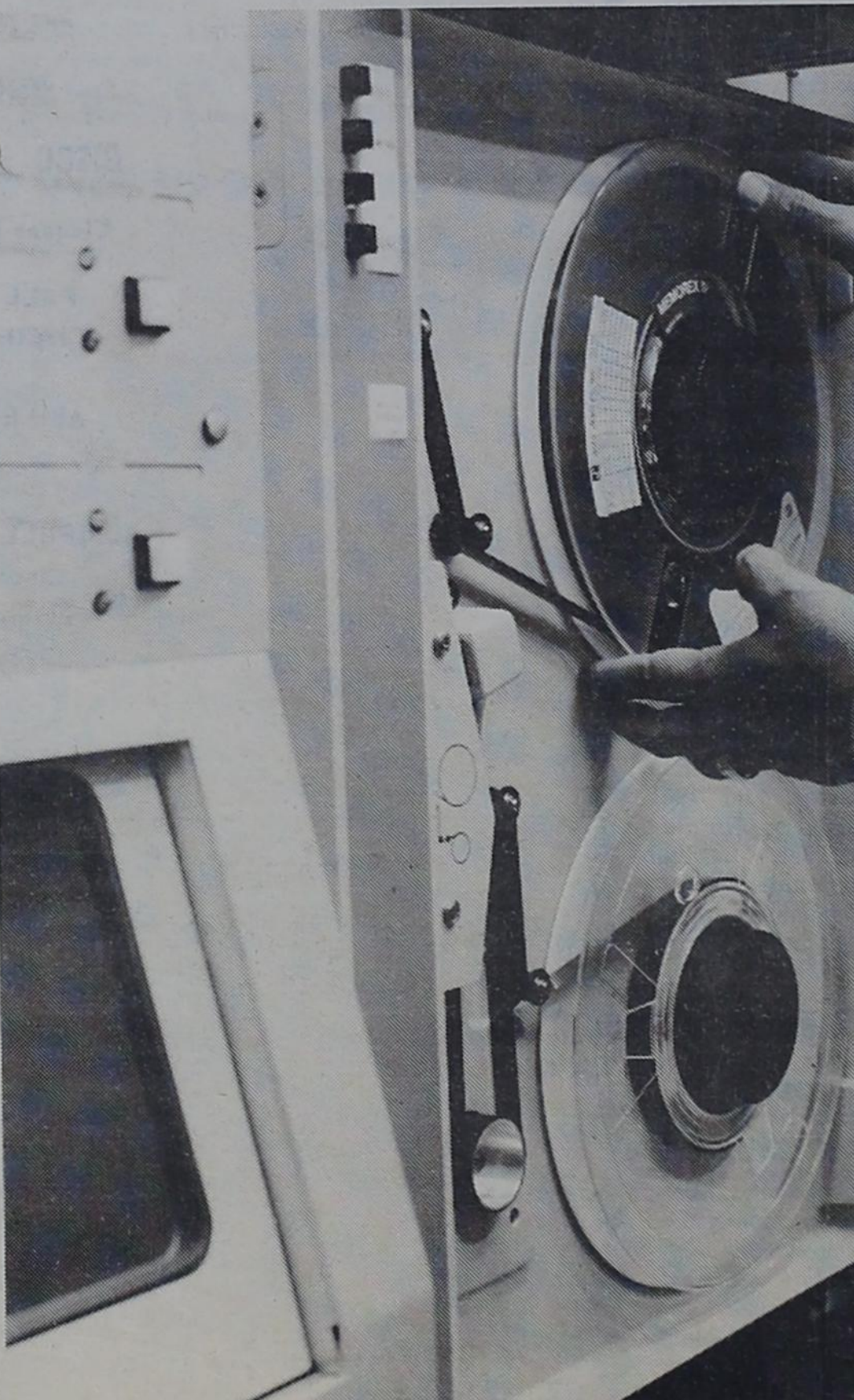

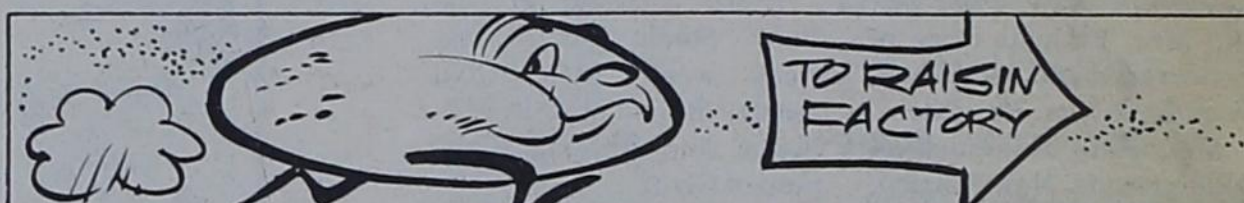

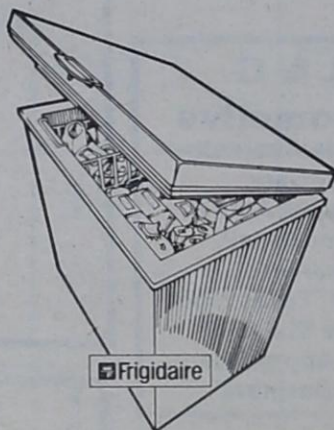
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
