EDITOR'S COMPARISON

The great Panhandle and its people are coming into their own these days, and the work of the last few years has begun to result in a rich harvest of publicity and citizens. The Panhandle is now one of the best advertised and one of the most popular sections in the Union. Eastern Texas people have waked up to the fact that we of the Panhandle are outstripping them, not by a neck, but by many lengths. As a result much is being written by eastern Texas editors on the subject. Here is a sample from the Grand Saline Sun, and it is interesting reading for the people of the Panhandle:

"One thing that impresses us most of all the great attractions at Dallas fair was the splendid exhibits of farm and orchard products from West Texas and the Panhandle country. In looking about in agricultural hall we found only one East Texas county represented with an exhibit--Nacogdoches. Evidently Nacogdoches has an enterprising set of people, the only public spirited bunch in East Texas. It appears that way to us. It is no puzzle to us why hundreds of our farmers are moving to West Texas and the Panhandle every year, when we understand that every individual in those sections is a booster. They advertise their country and show what they produce to best advantage.

No wonder at all that the discontented East Texas farmer packs up his belongings and hikes west when he sees such fine exhibits at the Dallas fair from these sections and none from East Texas. It's no use saying that we can beat them on nearly everything grown--most people have to be shown, and we fail to do it. What's the use for a newspaper to talk for and boost its section when the people fail to back it up? Ah, well, after all, what's the use?"

The poor fellow is almost discouraged and has reached that weepy point of "what's the use?" Well, there is no use for eastern Texas editors to "whoop up" their country when the people are content to drag along the same old way they have been doing since the days of the Texas Republic. The times call for greater things, and that section of moral vineyard which fails to get up and hustle and let the world know it is on the map will enter the dead class and remain there.

While Eastern Texas is not so favored a land as the Panhandle yet its people could accomplish far more in the world's busy work than they are doing if they would make the effort. The man from elsewhere who makes a visit to Eastern Texas and then comes to Western Texas finds the contrast so great in favor of Western Texas that this country gets his citizenship and his investment; and he immediately joins the boomer society in the

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

Austin, Tex., Nov. 16.--The governor's proclamation was issued today as follows:

"I, Thomas M. Campbell, governor of the State of Texas, in obedience to memorial custom, do hereby call upon the people of Texas to freely join in observing Thursday, the 26th day of November, A. D. 1908, as a day of thanksgiving, and put aside their usual occupations and assemble in places of public worship on said day for the purpose of devoutly rendering praise and thanksgiving to "the giver of all good," for the many varied and peculiar blessings which have come to us as people during the past year. Health, prosperity and happiness has been our portion in a large measure. Peace and order have generally prevailed, and to every citizen has been permitted the inestima-

ble boon of living honestly by his own toil.

Conforming to the example set by the pilgrim fathers and in accordance with the proclamation of the President of the United States, let us generally and faithfully observe this appointed day of thanksgiving.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto signed my name and caused the great seal of the State of Texas to be affixed thereunto on this 16th day of November, A. D. 1908.--T.M. Campbell, Governor.

THE FIGHT ON TUBERCULOSIS

The dreaded disease, tuberculosis, has for many years been regarded as an incurable one, but the fight has never been entirely abandoned. "The Texas Anti-Tuberculosis association," says the Houston Post, "is one that the people of the State should encourage with their moral and financial support. Its object is to conduct a campaign of education in order that the frightful loss of life due to tuberculosis may be lessened and finally averted. It is estimated that tuberculosis costs the State 5800 lives annually, and when the economic value of these is considered together with the cost of the care of the sick, the support of orphans and other dependents, the money saved reaches a total of \$46,000,000 a year.

If it were proposed to tax the people \$46,000,000 annually to support the State government and its institutions, the voters would turn the State upside down, and yet this tremendous loss of life and money goes steadily on and the majority of the people pay no attention to it.

"The anti-tuberculosis movement is a world-wide crusade to control the most deadly of all diseases. Philanthropists and scientists have been grappling the problem a long time and wonderful progress has been made. It has been discovered that the disease can be communicated from one person to another--that it is contagious in other words--and that its terrible ravages are due principally

to this fact and the ignorance of people of common sense methods by which the spread of the disease may be prevented.

"The anti-tuberculosis association desires to educate the people as to the ways and means by which the disease may be prevented, even where people come constantly in contact with with it; It desires to inform those who have contracted it how to get well and how to avoid being dangerous to others. In this way much loss of life may be averted and possibly in a generation the malady may be stamped out entirely."

The spread of this disease within the last few years has become almost alarming and the fight against it not being taken up any to early. 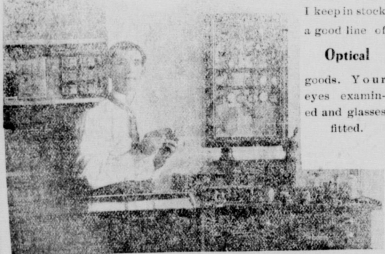

WILL KILL MOSQUITOES.

The chief of the sanitary service at Gaboon, French Africa, has found in the cactus a substitute for petroleum for the extermination of mosquitoes.

The thick, pulpy leaves are put in water and macerated until a sticky paste is formed. This is spread upon the surface of stagnant water, and forms an isolating layer which prevents the mosquito larvae from coming to the top to breathe, and thus destroys them through asphyxiation. The advantage over petroleum, which evaporates quickly, is that the paste can hold its place and consistency indefinitely—a week, month or even a year—while the development of the larvae is only about a fortnight.

Whitley's Improved Gold Medal.

The above caption is the name of an improved cotton which is the work of W. H. A. Whitley, who lives in the Good Creek Community in this county. We had occasion to examine a sample of this fine cotton which Mr. Whitley was showing in town last Saturday, and we are frank to say that it was the finest looking cotton we ever saw, excepting the long staple. Mr. Whitley has been giving his attention to the improvement of this cotton for several years and the result of his work along this line is very marked.

The difference in the appearance of this cotton and the common kind is so great, that one can not help being attracted by it. The bolls are full and much larger than the ordinary kind of cotton planted here. And Mr. Whitley says it is much easier picked because it fills out and opens better. He is still working on this and thinks there is yet room for improvement. He believes he has one of the finest kinds of the staple anywhere in the state, and while he is selling the seed of this cotton at \$1.00 per bushel, even at that price it is cheap. He says the cotton takes deep roots and stands dry weather exceedingly well, and where a good stand is had, under ordinary conditions the yield will go beyond a bale to the acre. The sample he had Saturday grew on sod land. Mr. Whitley is making this an especial study, because of his interest in the improvement in the grade and yield of the plant in this county.

ELECTRICITY IN SPAIN.

There were in Spain in 1901 only 861 electric power stations, of which 351 were for public lighting and 210 for private lighting. Since then the number of power stations for electric lighting has increased considerably, and it may be added also that the use of electricity in its many other applications has also increased and become general, but there is still a vast field for further industrial developments, as the supply of power which the country affords is yet far from being exhausted.—Scientific American.

Copper is of world-wide importance and the United States has over 3,000 copper mining companies. An American geologist points out that the world's supply is practically derived from less than 350 mines. This includes only localities supplying 100,000 pounds or more annually. Of such mines the United States contains 59; Japan, 35; Chili, 21, and Australia, 28; but three of these countries produce only 30,000 tons each. Mexico ranks next to the United States in production, while Spain ranks third. Five great mines yield three-fifths of the total production, and one mine alone contributes one-fifth.

Roads Fight Missouri's Two-Cent Rate

SHOT DOWN IN COURT ROOM

F. J. Heney, who has been conducting the prosecution in bribery cases in San Francisco, was shot down in the court room Friday by Morris Haas.

Heney had for years been a fearless prosecuting attorney in Arizona previous to the time of his having been called to San Francisco to fight the famous bribery cases in that city in 1906, and had been attacked once before when he saved his life by slaying his enemy.

Vengeance was sworn against Heney by Haas, whom he had cut from the jury in a case in court by revealing the fact that Haas was an ex-convict. This Heney did by presenting a photograph of Haas taken when he was in the pen. He acknowledged the truth of the evidence. He deliberately decided that, since his life was ruined by the revelations, he would take the life of Heney, and fired the shot that was at first thought to have been fatal, but from which Heney may recover.

It appears that the fact that Haas was an ex-convict was not generally known. He said that his life was ruined and that he had rather his children had never been born than to know that he had once been a convict.

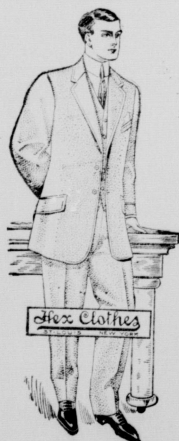
