BSE Drives Cattle Prices Down

Effect not as bad as expected, local livestock exchanges report

by Margaret Hetrick

Some local cattle producers describe the outbreak of BSE, bovine spongiform encephalopathy, - (also known as Mad Cows Disease) - in the U. S. as a "potential disaster".

Only one case of the brainwasting illness has been found to this date - and that from an infected Holstein in Washington State.

An immediate effect, however, was a market decline in beef prices, and a ban on U. S. beef by a substantial amount of countries.

Apparently, the key to weathering the storm seems to lie in restoring confidence in U.S. beef.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has initiated serval courses of action since the outbreak, including a ban on meat from "downer" cattle (can not walk or stand on their own)

Cattle at a higher risk of BSE because of age will be tested more rapidly, and their meat will not be processed until test results are returned. Efforts to pinpoint the

TDH CONTINUES RABIES CONTROL

Bait Drop Program Successful

A decade of feeding hungry coyotes and gray foxes in the dead of winter has certainly caused canine and gray fox rabies to plummet.

In 1995 the Texas Department of Health (TDH) began the oral vaccination program. The plan was to create zones of vaccinated coyotes and gray foxes to first stop the spread of the rabies and then eliminate it.

Now, with stacks of favorable statistics at hand, TDH is again set to airdrop bait food filled with oral rabies vaccine over portions of south, central and west Texas.

In early January, about 2.7 million baits will drop from four specially-equipped airplanes flying across 47 counties.

The first flight takes of January 6, from the Zapata County airport in South Texas. The second portion of the drop will begin about Jan. 15 from the Kimble County airport in Junction, and the final phase will fly from the Pecos County airport in Fort Stockton beginning about Jan. 22.

Although the transmission

of the infection to humans is highly unlikely, it does happen with a variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease.

Since the outbreak of BSE in Britain in the 1980s, it is reported that 153 people

worldwide have contracted the human form.

In humans, as well as in cattle, the disease is brainwasting and eventually fatal, which explains the over all fear surrounding BSE.

No connection between Texas and the infected Holstein has been found, Texas state veterinarian Bob Hillman stated.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 15.5 million of the nation's 103.9 million cattle were in Texas. Texas cattle operations contribute \$16 billion yearly to the economy, the State Ag. Department stated.

Area cattle and livestock exchanges reported that the prices had not dropped as far as they had feared.



beginnings. No canine strain of rabies in Texas at all since 2001, and a significant drop in the number of gray fox rabies."

The number of canine rabies cases in South Texas declined from a high of 142 cases when the program began in 1995 to one in 2001 and none since then. Gray fox cases are down from an alltime high in 1964 to 61 in 2003 through October.

Appealing to specialized tastes, the customized baits offer a treat of fish meal to coyotes and dog food containing molasses and vanilla flavoring to gray foxes.

"The vaccine inside the baits cannot cause rabies in people or animals," Sidwa

Because baits contain a biological agent and are less likely to be eaten by wildlife if people have touched them, they should not be handled.

Sidwa emphasized that people need to get their pets vaccinated against rabies as required by law. A domestic animals rabies vaccination can be safely given even if the animal recently ate an oral rabies vaccination bait, he

5 Lifesavers For New Year from Texas Department of Health

It's that time of year when people make resolutions. You know the vows: clean out the garage, keep in better touch with friends and family, save money.

But there are some health and fitness resolutions that could save your life, according to Texas Commissioner of Health Eduardo Sanchez, M.D.

"If people would remember to do just five things, they could live longer, healthier lives," Sanchez said.

The five are:

•Eat smart

•Get fit ·Get shots

·Get checkups and screens; and

•Don't smoke.

Each of these suggestions alone is good for anyone to consider, Sanchez said. But together they provide a solid plan to help a person get healthy and stay that

First, more than 60 percent of the people in Texas are overweight or obese. Preliminary analysis by the Texas Department of Health (TDH) suggests that overweight and obesity cost an estimated \$10.2 billion in 2001 in Texas.

Healthy benefits come, nutritionists say, if people eat five to nine servings of fruit and vegetables a day. Other good choices include eating whole grains; taking smaller portions; selecting lean meat, fish and poultry; and reducing or eliminating fat, fried food, sugar and salt.

In addition to an improved immune system, people who eat smart may avoid or delay problems such as diabetes, high blood pressure, elevated cholesterol and triglycerides (fats in the blood) that can lead to heart disease and stroke.


Next, are you having trouble getting moving? You are not alone. Urban sprawl means more time in the car for many, and busy schedules make getting fit a challenge.

Think about ways you can start slowly and build your activity level. Just 30 minutes of moderate to brisk exercise daily strengthen your heart.

"Make it a family activity," Sanchez said. "Try fun runs, walks and other activities that can include family members of all ages."

Third, getting shots is something many adults don't think about; but pneumonia, one of the most serious infections for seniors, is easily prevented with a vaccine. While an influenza vaccine can't always completely cover all strains cir-

culating, it does provide protection, and is especially important for those at risk of serious complications or death.

"Check with your health care provider about what shots are recommended and when," Sanchez said. "Most adults should get vaccinated against pneumonia and flu, especially those over age 65."

Or when is the last time you had a tetanus shot? The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recommends adults get a booster every 10 years.

Fourth on the list is getting checkups and screens. Many people don't visit a doctor until a problem occurs. This procrastination can be

Pap smears, mammograms and colorectal exams can detect cancerous activity early

when treatment is most effective. Tests for cholesterol, triglyceride levels and blood pressure, along with a family history, can indicate if you are at risk for heart disease. People at risk of developing diabetes can prevent serious complications or death if the disease is diagnosed and managed.

And finally, it's been repeated often; but, again, smoking is bad for your health. Tobacco use can lead to deadly disease such as lung cancer, emphysema and stroke. When quitting, ask your doctor if nicotine replacement products are a good idea, get a friend to remind you of all the benefits of being smoke-free, and be patient-inany people quit several times before they kick the habit for good.



Tips for Eating Smart

- · Reduce portion size. If you eat out, order smaller portions or divide your entree and take half home.
- · Drink fewer sodas. Over a year's time, one can of regular cola a day at 150 calories equals more than 15 pounds worth of calories.
- Write down what you eat. You may be surprised by the incidental calories - a bag of chips here, some candy there, really add up.
- · Add fruit and vegetables. Substitute dried fruit for candy, add vegetables to soups, pasta, stir-fry dishes or casseroles.
- · Limit snack foods, foods high in fat or sugar and processed foods since they have more calories and fewer nutrients.

Tips for getting fit

- Take a step in the right direction. Walking 10,000 steps a day (about five miles) helps to maintain a healthy weight. A pedometer will help you determine your steps.
- · Go it on foot. Take the stairs instead of elevators, park farther from your destination and walk. Encourage your children to walk to school where feasible, walk or ride a bicycle for short trips instead of taking the car. It all adds up.
- Start small. Incorporate 10 minutes of exercise a day at first, then gradually build to half an hour a day to maintain weight or an hour a day to lose weight.
- The more television a child watches, the more likely he or she is to be obese. Consider activities as a family such as going to the park, playing catch or skating.

New Hire Reporting Notices **Mailed To Employers**

New Hire Reporting is Camp locations include: mandated by federal law under the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 (PRWORA) and requires employers to report new hires within 20 calendar days of their start date.

The TWC stated that they and the Texas Office of the Attorney General (OAG) have been working together to ensure that the notifications were mailed.

The notices contain the following:

New Hire Reporting: Good for Kids, Good for Employ-

Good for Kids: The OAG uses this information to locate parents who owe child support; Establish new child support orders; Enforce and modify existing orders; Issue income withholding orders.

Good for Employers: Lovers your taxes by returning overpayments recovered by TWC to the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund; Assists state agencies, such as the Texas Workers' Compensation Commission and TWC, in detecting fraudulent claims

and preventing overpayments; Reduces government spending on public assistance; Assists the attorney general in collecting child support payments for fami-

Employers need only report six basic items to the Texas Directory of New Hires: Company name; Payroll mailing address; Company federal employer identification number; Employee name; Employee address; Employee Social Security number.

The employers may choose any one of six reporting options: The Internet, including online submission and file uploads: visit www.oad.state.tx.us. select "Child Support" then click on "Employer"; A shareware software program that gener-

ates a file for submission; A file transfer protocol; An electronic file, mailed via diskette or tape; A hard-copy report of the workers W-4; Simply call 1-888-TEX-HIRE (839-4473) or fax the information to: 1-800-732-5015.

Information received from employers is entered into a statewide registry and then transmitted to the National Directory of New Hires.

New hires must be reported within 20 calendar days of hire. If reported electronically, new hires must be reported 12 to 16 days apart.


